

## Council Approves New Apartment Units

Sunbury council last Wednesday approved final plans for the apartments which are being built north of Cherry St. on the former Miller property.

Construction crews began moving earth Thursday for the Sunbury Square development, being built by T & H Properties, Columbus. Plans call for 80 apartments, 24 condominiums and 12 twin-singles in the development.

Council voted unanimously to pass the final plan for the development on recommendation from the Planning and Zoning Commission, which met Sept. 30.

Council also voted 4-0 to accept a 30-day binder from Ohio Govern-

ment Risk Management for temporary liability insurance for the village. Solicitor Craig Paynter explained a current policy through Whitney Insurance Agency lapsed as of midnight Wednesday morning.

"I consider this (Risk Management's) to be a better plan," Paynter told council as he mentioned a new policy from Whitney Insurance was quoted at \$49,000, compared to one from Ohio Risk Management for \$22,000. Paynter asked that council accept the 30-day binder from Risk Management while studying the two quoted policies.

Mayor Bob Reed told Walnut St. resident Larry Dixon the village would send a letter to Trenton two officials to see what they want to do about speeding on the south end of the street. Dixon had last been to council a year ago, but the village determined his section of the street is in the township and not the village.

Council held a second reading on an ordinance setting new sewer connection fees, ranging from \$1,200 for a building with a three-quarter inch water tap, to \$84,000 for one with an eight inch water tap. Mayor Reed explained the first reading had been earlier this spring when water tap fees were considered.

Village also held first readings on two other ordinances. One names Birch Hydro Cleaning Specialists, Inc. Fredericktown, as low bidder to maintain the wastewater treatment facility settling lagoons, at a price not to exceed \$44,000.

The other is an ordinance naming Stults & Associates, Inc., Delaware, as the village's engineering firm to oversee the water treatment plant improvement project, at a price not to exceed \$76,000.

Councilmen Len Weatherly and Dave Mayhew were absent.

## Even With Levies, BW Will Be Still 'In Red'

Superintendent Carl Martin said the Big Walnut Local School District will be roughly \$500,000 in the red even if all three levies—the \$13.30 mill levy for general property tax, the one-quarter percent income tax for five years and the \$500,000 renewal for three years pass Nov. 2.

Martin reported this at Monday evening's Big Walnut Board of Education meeting when Martin Stahl, school finance consultant with the State Department of Education, made a presentation about the school district's finances.

"You try to get (levies) passed as you go along," Stahl said. "It is easy to get into this situation, referring to Big Walnut's financial situation."

Stahl explained the projection of operational revenues and expenditures for the school district. He reported that the operational revenue shortfall is projected to be \$1,622,245 in fiscal year 1994 and \$2,239,069 in fiscal year 1995.

The general fund cash balance for the school district is projected to be in the 'red' by \$1,524,580 for fiscal year 1994. The district is projected to have a negative balance of \$3,806,649 by the end of fiscal year 1995.

"There's a sizeable deficit if you look at the carryover balance," Stahl said. He said the district needs to bring in more revenue or cut expenditures or both, but he said he does not know how Big Walnut could cut much more.

"Industry is what you need. The millage is never reduced; it is always there," Stahl commented. Martin said he is concerned that the new apartments, condominiums and twin-singles will bring many more children to this area.

Enrollment in Big Walnut Local schools is 2,612 students, as of Oct. 1. Individually, Harrison Street has 327 students, Big Walnut Elementary, 411; Souders Elementary, 516; Big Walnut Middle School, 631; and Big Walnut High School, 727.

Martin said the district employs around 115 full-time equivalent, 15 special education and five vocational teachers and three guidance counselors.

He also reported that an informational packet about the Nov. 2 levies will be distributed door to door by volunteers.

The board members—Gary Moserley, Mike Stumpf, Phyllis Taylor, Jim Hildreth and Jim Heine—approved making three 5-hour cook positions into three 2.5-hour cook

positions effective this Friday. Martin told The News that no one will be laid off.

Martin said this move will save around \$100,000 in salaries and some benefits.

The following teachers received increased salaries due to their taking additional education, thereby qualifying for the increases: Jim Forgrave, Judy Fisher, Robin Moodepaugh, Patsy Jenkins, Ron Walters, Amy Davis, Jackie McLaughlin, Lisa Morgan, Donna Fulford, Terri Layman, Pam Smith, Kim Wooley, Rita Cavicchia and Carolyn Grunneir.

This salary increase for additional education is part of the teachers' contracts. Board president Jim Heine said the district encourages its teachers to get additional education.

The following received 1-year contracts: Mary Ellen Stamm, supplemental as Harrison Street computer coordinator; Alycia Boyer, supplemental for high school drama production; and Kelli Enderby, limited teacher contract as reading tutor at Big Walnut Elementary.

Board members accepted a \$150 donation from the Westerville Bicycle Club.

## Delaware SWCD Sells Pond Fish Through Nov. 1

Delaware Soil and Water Conservation District is selling pond fish now through Nov. 1.

The SWCD has for sale 1- to 3-inch and 3- to 5-inch bluegills, 2- to 4-inch largemouth bass, 3- to 5-inch and 5- to 7-inch channel catfish, 1-inch yellow perch, and 1- to 12-inch white amurs (grass carp).

The recommended stocking rate for new ponds is 500 to 1,000 largemouth bass for every surface acre of water. Channel catfish may also be stocked in one-half acre or larger ponds at 100 per acre. The stocking rate for amurs varies according to the percent of pond covered by plants, according to the Delaware SWCD.

All fish must be prepaid and ordered by Nov. 1 at 2 p.m.

A tank truck with aerator from Fender's Fish Hatchery will distribute the pre-ordered fish Tuesday, Nov. 2, at 3 p.m. at the district office, 29 Grandview Ave., Delaware.

## Farm Bureau Rep Says CAUV Averages Change

CAUV figures for farm lands in Delaware County, 1990 values are being dropped and 1991 values are being added in the 5-year averages.

The corn price of \$1.50 per bushel for 1986 is also being dropped, and a new price of \$2.45 per bushel, for 1991, is being added. This results in a higher crop price in the formula, White adds.

And, interest rates for 1986 are also being replaced by interest rates for 1991, resulting in decreased capitalization cost, White says. "These two factors result in a higher value when computing CAUV," the Farm Bureau rep explains.

"The increased agricultural land values may result in smaller differences between market value and CAUV. However, tax rates are still significantly lower because of CAUV," White concludes.

CAUV is Ohio's Current Agricultural Use Valuation, placed into law in 1975 to keep taxes in line with the value of land for farming vs. development.

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## Szymusiak's 'Artists' Create Prints for '68 Bucks

Dave Szymusiak did not play on the 1968 Ohio State Buckeyes football team that tackled the college sports world to win the Rose Bowl, but he can picture what it was like being part of that undefeated team.

In fact, the Sunbury resident has many ways to picture the young national champion Buckeyes through art prints that he commissioned artists to draw.

Those art prints have special meaning for Szymusiak because they were created for tomorrow evening's "One Moment in Time" 25th anniversary reunion dinner honoring the 1968 team. This sold-out dinner will be held in the facility symbolizing that winning team's coach—the Woody Hayes Athletic Center.

Szymusiak's company, Artists for Athletes, was selected to honor the 11 players who played in that game and later became All-Americans. His artist, Don Huber, honored them by personifying each in art prints created with pencil.

Szymusiak will give one-third of the prints to the reunion dinner. Those prints will be sold during the dinner's silent auction, with proceeds going toward the Woody Hayes Athletic Scholarship Fund, which is supported by the 1968 national championship team. Szymusiak will give another one-third of the respective prints to the All-Americans.

The 11 All-American Buckeyes whom Szymusiak's artist honored were David Foley, Rufus Mayes, Jim Stillwagon, Rex Kern, Jim Ois, Ted Provost, Jack Tatum, Jan White, John Brockington, Mike Sensibaugh and Tim Anderson.

They and around 60 other members of the winning 1968 Buckeye squad will be recognized for topping off the 10-0 season by defeating the University of Southern California, including Heisman Trophy recipient O.J. Simpson, by 27-16.

Szymusiak says that championship season was special because Ohio State was the last Big Ten football team to win a unanimous national title.

"They were never expected to win. It was a young team, a lot of sophomores," he says.

Guests such as James Rhodes, who was governor at that time, and O.J. Simpson, whose team was beaten by Ohio State in the Rose Bowl, are expected to be on hand to honor the champions. Bob Hope, who was grand marshal of that year's Rose Bowl Parade, may also come to Columbus in order to pay tribute to

The Kern print is one of several art prints of the 11 All-American Buckeyes that will be sold during the dinner's silent auction. Proceeds will benefit the Woody Hayes Athletic Scholarship Fund, Szymusiak notes.

The print in the left of above picture shows Senator Dick Schafrauth (R-19) during his Ohio State University football days when he was the captain in 1959 and his time as a Cleveland Brown, where he played for the 1964 championship team.

Artist Don Huber of Ottawa created all of the prints for the 1968

Buckeye dinner reunion. Larry Zelma, co-chairman of the event and part of the 1968 team, approved the prints, according to Szymusiak.

Szymusiak says this year's Buckeyes are carrying on the 1968 team's tradition by wearing black numbers on their jerseys and by having a 5-0 record so far. The 1968 team had a 10-0 record, winning the Rose Bowl by defeating the University of Southern California.

The owner of Artists for Athletes, Szymusiak began his company in part due to his and son Zac's interest in collecting football and basketball cards and athletes' autographs, allowing them to meet many athletes.

Zac, a freshman at Big Walnut High School, is so interested in the business that he would like to become an artist.

the 1968 team. Szymusiak's company, like the 1968 Buckeyes, has become successful in a short time and the churn more quickly than he expected.

The former Adelphi Cable Communications Co. marketing representative founded his company May 5.

He says the company began with one artist. Now it has seven, and soon it will have 12.

Those artists include Don Huber of Ottawa, who created art prints of the 1968 Buckeyes, Amy Spencer, a Big Walnut High School graduate who attends the Columbus College of Art & Design, Mike Giettle of Lancaster, and Alex McDaniel.

"The artists are what make the company, without them I wouldn't have the company. I'm not an artist. All I can draw are stick figures and smiley faces," he says.

Szymusiak says he finds artists by putting advertisements in university newspapers. So far, he has put those advertisements in 60 of those newspapers.

"I like to give young artists a chance. There are more starving artists out there than not. Most of them just want a chance to draw," he says.

Szymusiak says he became interested in founding Artists for Athletes when Weeb Ewbank, head coach of the Super Bowl champion New York Jets, told him that he was running out of ideas for charity fund raisers.

Szymusiak and son Zac, who is a freshman at Big Walnut High School, collect football and basketball cards and athletes' autographs.

"We enjoy meeting athletes. We get to know the athletes and become friends," Szymusiak says. "I think it would be a different way to raise money for charity," Szymusiak explains.

Jan Janowicz, an Ohio State University Heisman Trophy winner, was the first athlete whom Szymusiak commissioned an artist to draw.

His artists have drawn everyone from Senator Dick Schafrauth (R-19), who was the captain of the 1959 Buckeyes and a Cleveland Browns player, to Bernie Kosar, a Cleveland Browns quarterback.

Since Szymusiak began Artists for Athletes, he has attended and donated art prints to 90 charity golf tournaments.

Szymusiak says he became involved with the silver bucks because of the 1968 championship team through All-American Buckeye Jim Stillwagon. It began when Szymusiak was told to find an artist to draw an art print

### Health Dept. To Offer Free Microwave Tests

Delaware county residents interested in free microwave safety testing have until next Tuesday, Oct. 19, at 4:45 p.m. to make an appointment with the Delaware City-County Health Department.

The microwave testing will take place Monday, Oct. 25, and Tuesday, Oct. 26. A health department representative will visit scheduled homes to perform a safe and efficient test to check that residents' microwaves are not emitting harmful radiation while in use, according to the health department.

Microwave ovens produce radiation during the heating process. Those microwaves are a form of "electromagnetic" radiation; that is, they are waves of electrical and magnetic energy moving together through space. They fall into the radio frequency band of electromagnetic radiation and should not be confused with x-rays, which are more powerful, according to the health department.

Microwaves have three characteristics that allow them to be used in cooking: they are reflected by metal; they pass through glass, paper, plastic and similar materials; and they are absorbed by foods.

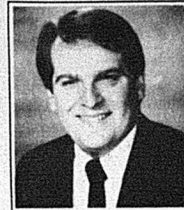

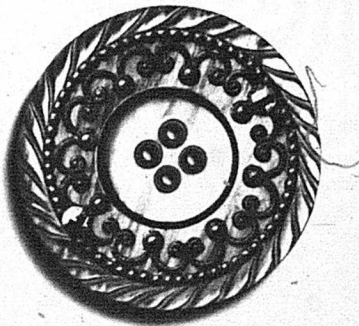

## What Can You Do With Zucchini?

At last! I finally finished canning zucchini, using various recipes, some of which will be given as gifts at Christmastime.

Zucchini, a green-skinned, soft-shelled squash, shaped like a cucumber, is available all year.

The following pickle recipe is easy to can for later use.

**Zucchini Pickles**  
1 qt. distilled white vinegar  
2 cups granulated sugar  
1/2 c. salt  
2 tsp. celery seed  
2 tsp. turmeric

1 tsp. dry mustard  
5 lb. (5-6") zucchini, unpeeled, cut into 1" slices  
1 qt. (4-5 medium) thinly sliced onions

Combine first 6 ingredients in saucepan and bring to a boil. Pour over onions and zucchini and let stand 1 hr., stirring occasionally.

In saucepan, bring mixture to boil and simmer 2 minutes. Continue simmering while packing into jars to within 1/2" of top. Make sure vinegar solution covers vegetables.

Process 5 min. in boiling water bath.

Makes 6-7 pints

**Zucchini Casserole**  
3-4 zucchini, sliced (Can use any kind of squash)  
1 can Cream of Chicken Soup  
1 cup sour cream  
1 cup chopped onion  
1/8 oz. pkg. Stove Top stuffing (1 cup) - Use Chicken or Herb stuffing  
1 c. margarine

Boil squash 5 minutes and drain. Combine stuffing mix and melted margarine.

Combine onion, soup, squash and 1/2 of stuffing mix. Spread in greased casserole. Add sour cream. Top with rest of stuffing mix.

Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes.

One of my neighbors, **Pauline Maloney**, shared this recipe. I have not yet made it, but it sure sounds delicious.

**Chicken & Zucchini**  
4 chicken cutlets (about 1 lb.)  
Salt & pepper  
2 Tbs. olive oil, divided  
2 medium zucchini (1/2 lb.) cut into matchstick-thin strips  
1 large clove garlic, minced, or garlic powder

2 Tbs. of fresh basil leaves plus sprigs for garnish

Sprinkle both sides of chicken with salt and pepper. In large nonstick skillet over medium high heat, heat 1 Tbsp. olive oil.

Cook half the chicken cutlets 5-7 minutes or until cooked through, turning once. Remove chicken to large serving platter; keep warm.

Repeat with remaining chicken. Remove to serving platter, keep warm.

In remaining 1 Tbsp. olive oil over medium heat, cook zucchini, garlic and salt. Sprinkle with basil leaves, stirring frequently.

Remove skillet from heat, stir in basil. Spoon zucchini mixture around chicken. Garnish.

**Lime Deposits**  
Next time you need to remove lime deposits from faucets, fixtures, lawn sprinklers, etc., save yourself some money by using plain old Hydrogen Peroxide - from the drugstore. The peroxide softens the lime just as easily as over-the-counter lime removers, but is much cheaper - and probably safer.

**The Eucalyptus Tree**  
Can reach a height of over 250 feet. Its vast network of roots can literally drain marshy areas, and has been used to eliminate malarial swamps.

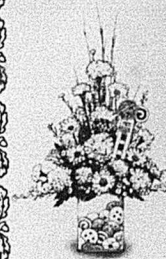

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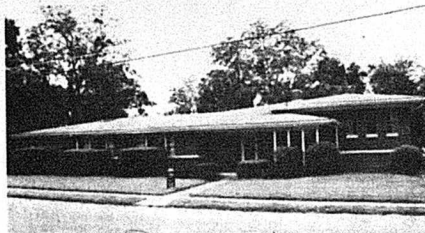

**DIABETES AND  
YOUR EYES**

Diabetes is more than out-of-control blood sugar. It can affect the heart, the kidneys, the skin, the blood vessels and, most especially, the eyes. That's why a diabetic's eyes should be examined on a regular schedule, ranging from every three months to every year.

Temporary blurring may be caused by a blood sugar imbalance and usually clears up when blood sugar returns to normal. However, temporary glasses may be needed.

The optometrist pays particular attention to the special vision risks - such as diabetic retinopathy - that accompany advanced or long-term diabetes. Sometimes, the leaking of retinal blood vessels will cause changes that permanently affect vision. In order to spot any changes before the patient even notices blurring or other symptoms, the eye doctor may dilate the patient's pupils in order to view the retina fully. Where vision is severely affected, a wide variety of low-vision aids can help.
