

# Community's July 4th Plan 'Comes Together'

"Just like on The A Team, 'I love it when a plan comes together.'"

That's what the Big Walnut Community's July 4th coordinator, Carl Martin, told The News this week as plans for the Friday evening, all-day Saturday, Fourth celebration began.

Martin is a board member of the Big Walnut Area Chamber of Commerce, which oversees the 4th, operating the Flea Market on Sunbury's square to raise the funds to pay for the rest of the activities.

"It looks as though we're in pretty good shape," Martin says. "Now if the weather just cooperates."

Martin points out parade marshalls and honored guests have been finalized over the past week as the Sunbury-Galena Rotary Club sets plans. Parade marshalls will be representatives from the new Sunbury Component Industries plant being built here, while ruling in the Chamber of Commerce's convertible will be a local winner of a state essay contest on the U.S. Constitution.

Rotary representative Doug Laber reports Sunbury Components vice presidents Matsuoto and Kaj, as well as chief engineer Takahashi, will be honored guests in this year's parade. "Possibly even the plant's president, Masuda, will be able to be one of our marshalls, depending on whether he can be in town that day," Laber adds.

With a parade theme of "We the People . . .," who would be more fitting as honored guests in this year's festivities than Big Walnut Elementary's Kevin Shrigley, the second grader who is one of 46 Ohio students whose essays on the Constitution are being judged in a national contest.

Kevin, son of Gary Shrigley, 4616 Wilson Rd., wrote an essay on "What the Constitution Means to Me and to Our Country," competing against some 1,327 other Ohio grade schoolers, according to the Ohio Dept. of Education. With him and his dad, Saturday, will be his teacher, Billie Hoag, from the Big Walnut Elementary.

Sally Kilburn says she and her husband, Glen, had 85 entries for the parade, as of Monday. "We just got another one over the weekend," Sally reported.

Parade entries must be pre-registered to be judged, and all entries will be lining up along S. Old 3C beginning about 9:30 a.m. Saturday. "For those who haven't registered, just meet us at the Nestle parking lot. There'll be someone there to send them on to where they belong," Sally adds.

Bikes and trikes need only show up to be judged with the judging beginning about 9:15 a.m. Bikes and trikes, as in past years, will gather at Sparks' School lot, southwest corner of the Sunbury square, and join the parade from there.

And, once again, marching units will join the parade from the Nestle parking lot. The procession will march up Columbus St. on the west side of the square, along Cherry St. on the north side, to the Baptist Church corner at Morning St., and then out

Granville St. to East St., and into the high school.

Marching units will include the combined Big Walnut Marching and Alumni Marching Bands, under the direction of Paul Shivers. The bands practiced Monday, Wednesday and tonight, Thursday, to ready themselves for Saturday. Alumni band members are able to purchase at any of the practices, T-shirts to wear as their uniforms, according to Valerie Hamill.

Emcee of this year's parade will once again be Glenn Evans, relating what he sees from the reviewing stand on the northwest corner of the square.

Rosette and ribbon awards will be staged on the high school front lawn following the parade, says chairman Laber.

## Friday Open Festivities

The parade is always one of the major attractions to the July Fourth, but this year, once again, activities begin the night before, at the high school.

Big Walnut Jaycees are again in charge of high school events, and they say Robin's Ride out of Whitehall will be set up and running Friday evening. "We hope to have the midway going by 6:00," says Jaycee coordinator Jim Hildreth.

Hildreth and Joyce Pinson are planning the high school events, and they say the Jaycee Kiddie Tractor Pull will be Friday evening as well. "We'll have classes for boys, ages 3 & 4, 5 & 6, and 7 & 8, and two classes for girls, ages 3, 4 & 5, and 6, 7 & 8," Joyce reports.

Joyce also says local concessions and booths, including Lulu's Lock-up, by the BW Cheerleaders; Face Painting, Galena J.M.Y.P.; Go Fish and Darts; Balloons, Big Walnut T.I.'s; Dunking Machine, BW Girls Softball; Pop Tarts, Sunbury UMYF; and a Lemonade-Shake stand, compli-

ments of the Jaycees, will all be operational. Midway will be located on the west side of the high school.

On the east side, second annual Big Walnut Farm Power of the Past Antique Tractor and Farm Machinery Show will be set up, in the courtyard area. Todd Blockwell, coordinator, says enthusiasts from around the Central Ohio area will bring their hi-and-miss engines, antique tractors, "and maybe even one old thresher" to begin setting up about 3:00 p.m. to show throughout the evening.

The Farm Machinery Show will continue Saturday, following the parade, until 5:00 p.m. Anyone with questions can contact Blockwell, at 965-1593, or Forrest Hale, 965-1452.

Then, at 8:00 p.m., "The Good Times" square dance band will strike up its chords as couples gather to swing their partners in front of the grandstand at the football field.

Tractor Pull, Chorus Returns

Souped-up garden tractors and the voices of the Community Chorus will return to this year's 4th, on Saturday.

But the day begins at 7:00 a.m. as the gates at the Flea Market on the square open. Chamber organizers Dan and Eva Jane Williams say they've set "over 200 dealers' pre-registered for spaces in this year's Market. Once again, gate admission is 50c."

The Big Walnut FFA Alumni group is planning to serve food on the square, using the log cabin area for serving, as they've done in past years.

Following the parade, the Midway re-opens at the high school, as does the Farm Machinery Show and the Harlem Garden Club's "We the People . . ." Flower Show. Flower show will be staged in the cafeteria, and be

open from 11:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. for all to enjoy.

Judging will be done Friday evening, beginning at 6:30, by a certified Ohio Garden Clubs Association judge. Classes are open to young people, age 18 and under, and adults, 19 and over. Entries must be in place by 4 p.m. to be judged, and complete lists of categories and rules can be picked up at either the Community Library or Sunbury News office, or from one of the garden club members.

Also opening after the parade at the high school is the BW Jaycees' dinner concession, including Bar-B-Que Chicken or Bratwurst. Pinson reports the Jaycees will sell a quarter chicken, brats or hot dogs, fixin's for the sandwiches, potato salad and drinks, throughout the afternoon and evening.

At 12:30 p.m., weigh-ins for the Jersey Pullers Tractor Club's Garden Tractor Pull begin behind the school, with pulls beginning at 1:30. Entry fee is \$5.00,

with cash paybacks for first, second and third place in each category.

Classes are open to whoever wants to pull, "so drop your mower deck and bring them on," says organizer Ken Buell.

Five classes will pull in each of two categories, turf tires and bar tires, with weights ranging from 700 lb. for the 6 and under horsepower tractors, to 1100 lbs., 13-20 hp. Quads and 3-wheelers will also pull, with classes depending on what entries show up.

At 2:00 p.m., on the high school front lawn, the Kingston Jr. Farmers 4-H Club will again be staging its Fun Frolies, with competitions by ages in the sack race, wheelbarrow race, 3-legged race, water balloon toss and egg toss. Winners will vie for T-shirts, as well as coin prizes.

Then, at 4:00 p.m., in the western corner, Jerry and His Friends Stambaugh will present a puppet show for the little ones. This is Jerry's third year performing.

### Treasurer To Be in Sunbury Next Thursday

County treasurer Madge Conklin reminds eastern county taxpayers that she will be in Sunbury for the collection of second half real estate taxes next Thursday, July 9.

Madge says she and one of her deputies will set up shop in the Sunbury municipal building, 9 a.m. until 3 p.m., to take payments of taxes in person.

Deadline for the payment of second half taxes is Monday, July 20, Conklin adds.

## County Accepts 9-1-1 Group's Study

Delaware county commissioners Monday approved a tentative proposal for the implementation of a 9-1-1 emergency answering service for this county.

Franklin county officials are just putting their new "enhanced 911 service" in operation this week, but Delaware county resi-

dents can't look forward to using a system before the fall of 1988, at least, says county administrator Don Fisher.

Fisher says that with the adoption of the 9-1-1 planning board's recommendations Monday, the county must now come to grips with determining how the

system will be funded. "If they go with some type of tax levy, it wouldn't be on the ballot before next May, and then the system wouldn't be operational until the fall of 1988," he explains.

The commissioners adopted the plan which must now be adopted by each of the local governing bodies which the system would serve. The proposal calls for the 9-1-1 county service to be used throughout all Delaware county, excepting in Delaware city, Westerville and Dublin. Westerville and Dublin are being served by Franklin county's system, while Delaware city would have its own 9-1-1 system.

Local governments have until Aug. 24 of this year to either agree or disagree with the proposal, Fisher adds. They were briefed on the proposal at a meeting last Thursday.

The local study group recommended Delaware county's 9-1-1 system be pretty much the same as Franklin's - called the "enhanced 9-1-1." With that system, a caller's name, address, and calling history, plus all the emergency agencies serving that location, comes up on a screen in front of the dispatcher.

Delaware county would have two primary Public Service Answering locations, and two secondary. Primary answering-dispatching locations would be either at the county-owned building next to the courthouse which formerly housed the library, or in the building now housing the sheriff's office.

Secondary answering services, with not as sophisticated equipment, would be at the new sheriff's office, U.S. 42 just outside Delaware, and at the Ohio Highway Patrol Post south of Delaware.

In Delaware city, the answering post would be at the Delaware Police Dept., the report says.

As far as costs, the study group's proposal says all telephone subscribers using the service would be charged monthly network fees for maintenance of the telephone system. United Telephone customers would have a fee of about \$6c per subscriber; General Telephone customers, 12c per month.

Report estimates the county cost of operation would amount to an average of \$318,987 per year over the first five years. First year, including a \$156,000 price tag for the computerized dispatching equipment, would be \$310,940 for the county's system. Delaware city's system would average \$22,945 per year over the first five years, with the initial start-up year of the city's operation coming in at \$90,777.

The report, based on current tax evaluations, says the county would need a .73-mill levy to pay for its system, while Delaware would need a .0125-mill levy.

Commissioners will now await word back from the local governments before continuing on with the proposal.

The board approved estimates from Engineer Fred Stultz' office for the re-sealing of four roads in this area; set a date for a public auction of surplus property; and awarded a bid for a new van for the county home.

Auction will be July 11 at the county garage facility, 30 Channing St., Delaware. Calling will begin at 10 a.m., and an advertisement will appear in next week's News listing the items to be sold.

Ohio Bus Sales, Inc., Canton, was awarded the contract for the couch for the county home. Total bid was \$28,000, of which \$15,300

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### Elections Office Workers Wonder Of Fall Interest

Delaware county Board of Elections workers are wondering why more persons haven't yet picked up their nominating petitions for this fall's local elections. And, the board officials remind that Monday is the last day for registering to vote in the Aug. 4 Big Walnut Special Election.

"We're wondering why more people haven't picked up petitions, or even filed," says Deputy Director Virginia Sheets. "Usually we've had several filings by now, and we've got just one filing so far."

Director Kay Gordon adds that candidates for local offices this fall must file their petitions by 4 p.m. Aug. 20 in order for the name to be on the November ballot.

Kay explains that one trustee and the clerk in each township; village mayors, clerks and two councilmen as well as two members of the board of public affairs; and two members of the Big Walnut Board of Education as well as Delaware County Board of Education are up for election in November.

"So we have lots of local offices and not much interest, yet," Kay adds.

Monday is the deadline for registering to vote or up-dating voter registration for the Big Walnut election. Election offices will be open its regular hours, 8:30 to 4:30 daily.

The Community Library in Sunbury can also take voter registration and changes, 10:00 to 5:00 Friday and Saturday, and 10:00 to 8:00 Monday through Thursday.

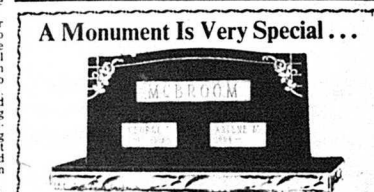

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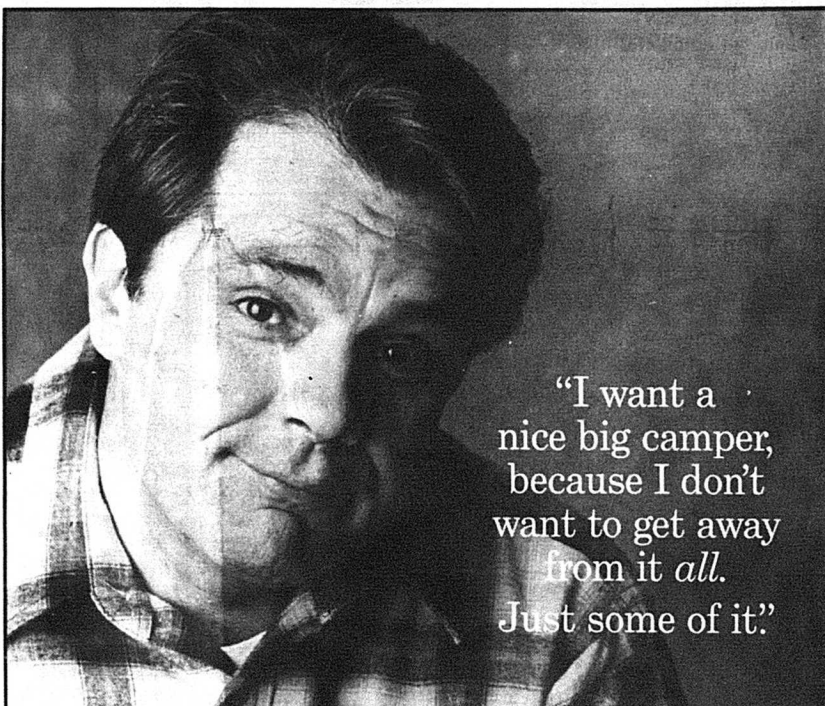
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## Care to Share?

As we celebrate the 200th anniversary of the writing of our U.S. Constitution and the writing of the articles for the Northwest Territory, I was reminded of a speech given by former President Herbert Hoover.

On the occasion of his 88th birthday and during the dedication of his library, he mentioned that the doors of opportunity in our great country are open to every boy and girl - modestly citing his own life as one example, as he came from a very poor but proud and hard-working family.

On this 4th of July, let us remember that Hoover said in that speech: "America lives because its life is in the hearts of her people, in their religious faith, in their love of freedom and of our country."

In browsing through some old recipes - some 100 to 200 years old - I noted that wine and Bourbon were used in their cooking. Could it have been because they had no baking powder until around 1855

or 1860? My grandmother, who came from Virginia, used to tell how a hickory rod was used to whip eggs and cream!

Here is a cake that she used and which I've found to be easy and quick to make. We called it -

### Iron Skillet Cake

Break an egg into a cup and fill it 1/2 full of fat (I use Crisco oil). Then fill it full (to 1-cup line) with milk.

Into a bowl, mix the following:

1/2 c. sugar  
1 c. flour  
1 tsp. baking powder

Dash of salt.  
Add the mixture in the cup to the flour, sugar mixture and stir, adding your favorite flavoring - vanilla, lemon, or nutmeg.

Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. I use a square oven-proof dish - but Grandmother used an iron skillet, hence the name.

Would you like to decorate this "quick" cake for this holiday?

Spread top and sides with whipped topping and chill till ready to serve.

When ready to serve, cut Jellied Cranberry Sauce in 1/2" thick slices, lengthwise, into strips 1" wide. Drain these strips well on absorbent paper.

Now - place fresh or frozen blueberries in rows in upper left-hand corner of cake - to resemble stars on the flag. (It might be necessary to piece the cranberry strips to make them long enough for the cake.) Let the flag pretty with the red, white and blue colors?

Our family used to mention "Fruit Dumplings" that our grandparents enjoyed. I finally found a recipe for -

### Strawberry Dumplings

1/2 c. sugar  
1/2 c. water  
1/2 tsp. vanilla

In saucepan, bring sugar and water to boil and simmer, uncovered, for 5 minutes. Add vanilla.

Sift together to make dough, the following:

1 c. sifted flour  
4 Tbsp. sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt  
Cut 4 Tbsp. butter into flour mixture till crumbly, or just barely holds together.

Place 2 1/2 c. fresh hulled strawberries in casserole and pour the hot sugar mixture over them. Drop the dumpling dough by spoonfuls over these berries and "sprinkle" with sugar.

Bake at 450 degrees for 25-30 minutes.

minutes till dumplings are done. Serve warm.

Of course, on July 4th we need to serve Punch, to keep our throats from being parched.

Oh, yes, be sure to "save the bubbles", as they add refreshing sparkle and Zing! At the last minute, just before serving, carefully pour the carbonated beverage down the side of the glass.

Also, for soda success, begin by "muddling" a little amount of the sherbet or ice cream with the sauce.

Patio Punch Soda  
1 can (40 oz.) red Hawaiian fruit punch, chilled

1 (12-oz.) can frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed

3 (1-qt. ea.) bottles cranberry juice cocktail, chilled

1/2 gal. raspberry sherbet

1 qt. ginger ale, chilled

Combine concentrate and cranberry juice - stir well and chill.

Just before serving, pour into 4-qt. punch bowl. Add scoops of sherbet.

Slowly add ginger ale. Garnish with mint sprigs.

Makes 50 (4-oz.) servings

One more "old" recipe I'd like

to share:

Fried Elderberry Flowers

2 eggs

1/2 c. milk

1/2 c. flour

1/2 tsp. sugar

1/2 tsp. salt

4 unsprayed elderberry blossoms (with stems 5"-6" long)

Beat eggs in milk. Add flour, sugar and salt, mixing well.

Holding blossoms by stems, dip into batter. Fry in deep hot fat till light brown. Sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. (A frying pan with 3 Tbsp. of hot lard, or oil, works well.)

NOTE: To be safe, you'll probably want to use farm field blossoms, rather than those from roadsides.

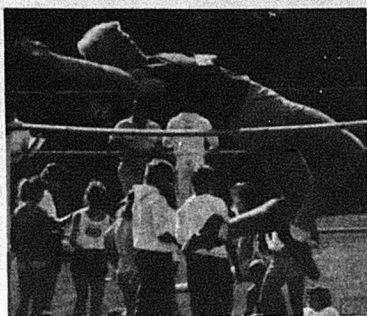

That session has been changed to Monday, Aug. 3 at 7:30 p.m. in the high school library. Coaches, team and representatives, as well as the public, are asked to attend.

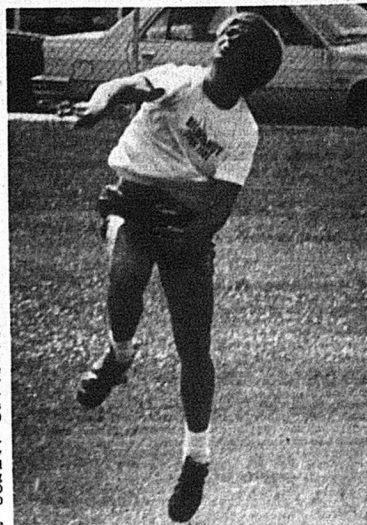

## "EXPLAINING SPECIALTIES"

People often wonder about the various specialty designations in the field of dentistry and what they offer their patients. The major specialties are:

Prosthodontia: Specialty of artificial tooth replacement;  
Orthodontia: Straightening of natural teeth;  
Exodontia: oral surgery;  
Pedodontia: Children's dentistry;  
Periodontia: Diseases of the gums;  
Endodontia: Root canal therapy.

Can't all dentists perform these different services? Yes and no, depending on what state you're looking at and which specialty is being considered.

For example, prosthodontia is practiced by most general dentists so there aren't many who limit their practice to this work.

In some specialties in nearly 1/3 of the states, a dentist may specialize by simply limiting his practice to that type of care. However, it is becoming more difficult to establish a practice in this manner.

Will a "general dentist" refer you to a specialist if he feels you should have specialized care? Of course he/she will do so if the need is there.

If you have been putting dentistry off in general it would seem that it is logical to start with a "general dentist." Then you would take other steps if necessary to meet your personal needs.
