

BW Threshers Join Cagers In Winning Double CBL Championships

When Big Walnut's Threshers won Central Buckeye League titles last week, they joined the 1977-78 boys and girls basketball squads as the only teams in the history of the school to claim double conference championships.

The Eagle boys won their first-ever CBL crown with a 60-point decision over the Dutchmen, while the girls captured their sixth straight trophy with a 70-point margin of victory over Olentangy. It was also the girls eighth league title overall, including two in the Mid-OhiO Conference.

Limited Funds Plague Bry-Air Porter Road Repair Rep Speaks To Chamber

Limited funds for road work continue to plague Porter Township trustees at their regular monthly meeting last week.

Clerk R. Marvin Collins reported \$6,600 available in road accounts with approximately \$6,000 already committed for dust control on oil in the township's gravel roads.

Last month, trustees voted to cut the amount of dust control oil by one-fourth. Only 150 feet of oil will be applied in front of each house, with 100 feet on each side. Oil will be applied in a single strip only in the center of each road and no intersections will be oiled.

Township residents are arranging for an additional oil for 40¢ a gallon by contacting a township trustee immediately. Oil application is tentatively scheduled for May 20, weather permitting.

The township's 2 1/4 mill fire levy will be on the ballot June 7. Collins, who is also one of Porter's volunteer firemen, reported firefighters and other interested persons will be taking information literally to the voters prior to the vote.

In addition, public meetings have been scheduled June 4 and 5 to discuss the fire department's financial needs and answer questions.

Trustees opened and accepted a bid of \$3,870 from the Whitley Insurance Agency covering township buildings and vehicles. Whitley, which already held Porter's account, was the only agency to respond to the public appeal to

bids.

Senate Keavage noted Prosecuting Attorney Duncan Whitney told township officials not to expect a decision on Porter's zoning case before July. The case, which seeks to have Porter's zoning resolution declared invalid, is set for Aug. 28 at the Delaware County Courthouse.

Trustee Ellis Lewis and John McDavid reported on several places in the township where problems have been apparent due to recent heavy rainfall conditions.

Township employee Rick Lewis pointed out that several mowers needed to the grader and mow and recommended grading the north end of Porter Central and the west end of Chambers Roads.

County Sets Hearings On Trash Operation

THREE JULY PUBLIC HEARINGS WILL DISCUSS RATES, RULES, REGULATIONS

Delaware county commissioners this week set up a series of special meetings regarding the county's proposed new trash transfer station, including three public hearings in the new transfer station.

Public hearings will be held July 11, 18, and 25, in the commissioners' office, first floor of the courthouse, to discuss the rules, regulations and fees for the county's Solid Waste Disposal District, including the operation of the new transfer station.

Commissioners will open bids June 2 for the construction of the physical facilities of the transfer station. The following Tuesday, June 9, commissioners will hold a hearing on their plans, specifications and estimates for the proposed station.

On June 14, the commissioners hope to ratify all their previous actions for the county's interim solution for trash disposal, with the public hearings on rules, regulations and rates for the station that following in July.

Commissioners are purchasing a 43-acre site just north of Delaware city on U.S. 42 for the transfer station. The transfer station, itself, will use about five acres of that land.

Construction is already under way on the site, the commissioners say.

Buckeye will collect the trash from the transfer station and take it to a landfill near Bellefontaine for eventual disposal.

Buckeye has submitted a proposal to cover five years of operation of the plant, the time in which, presently, commissioners are hoping to have their own permanent solution such as building a new landfill in this county.

The commissioners will have to pay \$60,000 for the new transfer station.

In March, commissioners sent out a letter to county trash haulers notifying them of the upcoming amendments to the county's rules and regulations for the Solid Waste Disposal District. In that letter, commissioners point to the setting of rates and licensing requirements for all commercial haulers, and a mandate that "all garbage and trash generated within the County Garbage and Trash Disposal District must pass through the County Transfer Station."

This requirement will be strictly enforced to the benefit of all concerned to assure cost effective rates and to carry out the legal responsibilities of the district.

License requirements will include that each hauler file as a part of their license application a map showing their route, the number of customers, and the days said routes are scheduled for pick-up.

Though no actual fee has yet been set, Buckeye Waste did propose a \$4.00 per cubic yard fee for trash disposal under contract. The county has also added another 30¢ per cu. yd. to cover the cost of the building of the station.

One local hauler, Bill Kingrey, uses several unincorporated areas, reports he is presently paying \$2.00 per cu. yd. at the Delaware city landfill, and could pay as low as \$1.50 per cu. yd. at the site in the unincorporated area of Delaware county, excepting Oxford twp., is a part of the county's Solid Waste Disposal District. Oxford twp. has its own landfill, for township residents.

Absentee Voting Opens for June Special Elections

Absentee voting period for the June 7 special elections of the area is now open, as the Board of Elections has absentee ballots.

Director Nettie Lukas reports her office has absentee ballots for the special elections in Porter twp., Highland and Northridge school districts, and the Westerville city precinct.

Persons wishing to vote absentee should go to the Board of Elections office to receive a ballot.



Summary Orange Bread
1 pkg. yeast
1 cup warm orange juice
1/2 cup butter
1 tsp. salt
4 cups whole wheat flour
1 Tbsp. grated orange rind
Dissolve yeast in orange juice. Add butter and salt. Gradually add remaining ingredients, beating well. Cover, let rise until doubled. Turn out and knead. Place in loaf pan and let rise a while.

Bake at 375 degrees 40 min.

Carrot Cake
Beat together:
1 1/2 cup vegetable oil
4 eggs
1 1/2 cup sugar or 1 cup honey
2 cups grated carrots
1 cup chopped nuts
Sift together:
3 cups whole wheat flour
2 1/2 tsp. baking powder
2 tsp. baking soda
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1 Tbsp. cinnamon

Fold in 4 egg whites stiffly beaten. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes. Makes 2 layers.

Andams Bread
1 1/2 - 6 1/2 cups flour
2 tsp. salt
1/4 cup yeast (dissolved)
1/4 cup margarine (softened)
1/2 cup molasses
1 cup very hot tap water
1 cup corn meal
Combine 2 1/2 cups flour with the corn meal, salt and dry yeast.

Add the softened margarine. Add in 1/2 cup molasses and 1/2 cup hot water. Add 1/2 cup more flour or enough to make a thick batter. Beat 2 mins. more at medium speed. Add enough flour to make a thick dough.

Turn out onto a lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, about 5 mins. Place in a greased bowl, turning to grease the top. Cover, let rise in a warm place, free from draft until doubled in bulk, about 1 1/2 hours.

Punch down, divide in half. Form each into a loaf and place in two greased bread pans. Cover, allow to rise until doubled in bulk, about 45 minutes.

Bake in a hot oven (375 degrees) about 30-35 minutes.

Amaracito Pound Cake

1 1/3 cup cake flour
3/4 tsp. baking powder
3/4 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cups butter cut into pieces
3/4 cup sugar
4 large eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
2 Tbsp. amaretto

Stir together flour, baking powder, salt, and set aside.

With electric speed cream butter and sugar 'till fluffy; add eggs, one at a time, beat until very smooth, about 5 minutes.

Add vanilla and amaretto, and beat for 1 minute more.

Add flour, 1/3 cup at a time; beat until very smooth. Pour into

a greased, floured loaf pan, bake at 325 degrees for 50 minutes until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

Cool 10 minutes on a wire rack, remove from pan and cool completely.

Chocolate Lb. Cake -- substitute 1/2 cup cocoa for 1 cup of flour. Substitute 2 Tbsp. Kahlua or any coffee liqueur for amaretto.

Sift and **Add:** 2 cups flour
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup medium chopped walnuts

Pour 1/2 into greased pan and add: the following mixture:

1/4 cup sugar
1 Tbsp. cinnamon

Pour remaining batter on top.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes or until done.






