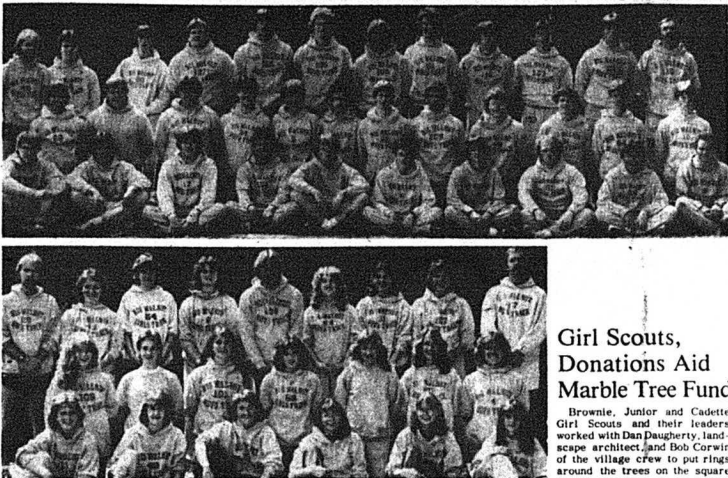

BW Thins Join Cagers In Winning Double CBL Championships

When Big Walnut's Thins defeated Central Buckeye League rivals last week, they joined the 1977-78 boys and girls basketball squads as the only teams in the history of the school to claim double conference championships.

The Eagle boys won their first-ever CBL crown with a 60-point decision over rival Dublin while the girls' collected their sixth straight trophy with a 70-point margin of victory over Oentangy. It was also the girls' eighth league title overall, including two in the Mid-Ohio Conference.

Girl Scouts, Donations Aid Marble Tree Fund

Brownie, Junior and Cadette Girl Scouts and their leaders worked with Dan Daugherty, landscape architect, and Bob Corwin of the village crew to put rings around the trees on the square Saturday. After removing grass and weeds from around the trees, the girls spread chips around the trees to make mower rings and help prevent the trees from being damaged during mowing, according to Polly Brehm.

Daugherty led the trees by drilling holes in the ground and filling the holes with fertilizer. He made 10,000 holes and used 100 pounds of fertilizer. If all the trees on the square were put together, there would be one tree 90' in diameter, figures Daugherty.

"Marble Tree Fund" received contributions from Mr. and Mrs. Curt Hill and from Bill Haller for the continuing care of the trees on the village square. Funds are used to feed, spray, maintain, and replace trees as needed. Most of the funds are contributed by the Fire Market, but many funds are given by individuals who enjoy the square.

County Sets Hearings Trash Operation

THREE JULY PUBLIC HEARINGS WILL DISCUSS RATES, RULES, REGULATIONS

Delaware county commissioners this week set up a series of special meetings regarding the county's proposed new trash transfer station, including three public hearings in July.

Public hearings will be held July 11, 18, and 25, in the commissioners' office, first floor of the courthouse, to discuss the rules, regulations and fees for the county's Solid Waste Disposal District, including the operation of the new transfer station.

Commissioners will open bids June 2 for the construction of the physical facilities of the transfer station. The following Thursday, June 9, the commissioners will hold a hearing on those plans, specifications and estimates for the proposed station.

On June 14, the commissioners hope to ratify all their previous actions for the county's interim solution for trash disposal, with the public hearings on rules, regulations and rates for the station then following in July.

Commissioners are purchasing a 143-acre site just north-east of Delaware city on U.S. 42 for the transfer station. The county has also already sent a letter of intent to hire Buckeye Waste Control company, Dublin, to operate the station. Buckeye would collect the trash from the transfer station and take it to a landfill near Bellefontaine for eventual disposal.

Buckeye had submitted a proposal to cover five years of operation of the plant, the time in which, presently, commissioners are hoping to come up with their own permanent solution, such as building a new landfill in their county. R. D. Zande & Assoc., Dublin, is the county's consultant on the trash problem, and has drawn up the plans and specifications for the new transfer station.

In March, commissioners sent out a letter to county trash haulers, notifying them of the upcoming amendments to the county's rules and regulations for the Solid Waste Disposal District. In that letter, commissioners point to the setting of rates, new license requirements for all commercial haulers, and a mandate that all garbage and trash generated within the County Garbage and Transfer Station be disposed of through the County Transfer Station. This requirement will be strictly enforced to the benefit of all concerned to assure effective rates and to carry out the legal responsibilities of the district," the letter stated.

License requirements will include that each hauler file as a part of "their license application a map showing their refuse routes, the number of customers, and the days said routes are scheduled for pick-up."

Though no actual fee has yet been set, Buckeye Waste did propose a \$4.00 per cubic yard fee for trash dumped under its contract. The county has now added another 30¢ per cu. yd., to cover the cost of the building of the station.

One local hauler, Bill Kingrey, who serves much of the Sunbury area, reports he is presently paying \$2.00 per cu. yd. at the Delaware city landfill, and could pay as low as \$1.50 per cu. yd. at Mt. Vernon.

One of the unincorporated areas of Delaware county, excepting Oxford township, is a part of the county's Solid Waste Disposal District. Oxford town, which has its own landfill, for township residents.

Absentee voting period for the June 7 special elections of the area is now open, as the Board of Elections has absentee ballots.

Director Nettie Lukas reports her office has absentee ballots for the special elections in Porter twp., Highland and Northridge School districts, and the Westerville area.

Persons wishing to vote absentee may either apply and actually vote in one trip to the courthouse, or they may request that ballots be sent them through the mail. Lukas says the elections office needs the voters correct name and address, reason for wishing to vote absentee, and signature in order to process absentee applications. Elections office will be open Saturday June 4, 9 a.m. until noon, at which time the period for making absentee applications ends. Office in the courthouse basement is open daily 8:30 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

He is also a member of the Ohio State Bar Association and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Program Advisory Board.

County Board Hires Secretary Thursday Night

Delaware County Board of Education hired a new secretary to the superintendent last Thursday night.

The board approved hiring Byrdene White as the new secretary for the Superintendent's office. The board gave her a one year contract at a salary of \$10,722.

Board members also decided to use the treasurer as the media center secretary instead of hiring a new person to fill the position. Superintendent John H. Ryan said this would save the board around \$9,000-\$10,000 per year.

Members approved the contract with the Speech and Hearing Center. Ryan said that by having the contract with the center, people would not have to drive into Columbus.

Ryan told the board that he has heard nothing about Senate Bill 133 that has gone to the Ohio House. He said he felt the Ferguson Act should be repealed. He said it is "worthless," but he said that a new law "should be fair to everyone, and should not take away management rights." He said he does not object to a negotiation bill, but "both sides should benefit if it is passed."

Limited Funds Plague Porter Road Repair Rep Speaks To Chamber

Limited funds for road work continued to plague Porter Township trustees at their regular monthly meeting last week.

Clerk R. Marvin Collins reported \$6,600 available in road accounts with approximately \$6,000 already committed for dust control oil on the township's gravel roads.

Last month, trustees voted to cut the amount of dust control oil by one-fourth. Only 150 feet of oil will be applied in front of each house compared with 200 feet last year. Oil will be applied in a single strip only in the center of each road and no intersections will be oiled.

Township residents can arrange to purchase additional oil for 40¢ a gallon by contacting a township trustee immediately. Oil application is tentatively scheduled for May 20, weather permitting.

The township's 2 1/4 mill fire levy will be on the ballot June 7. Collins, who is also a member of Porter's volunteer firemen, reported firefighters and other interested persons will be taking informational literature to each township residence prior to the vote.

In addition public meetings have been scheduled June 4 and 5 to discuss the fire department's financial needs and answer questions.

Trustees opened and accepted a bid of \$3,870 from the Whitney Insurance Agency covering township buildings and vehicles. Whitney, which already held Porter's account, was the only agency to respond to the public appeal for

bids.

Jessie Kavage noted Prosecuting Attorney Duncan Whitney told township officials not to expect a decision on Porter's zoning case before July. The case, which seeks to have Porter's zoning resolution declared invalid, was heard April 25 at the Delaware County Courthouse.

Trustees Ellis Lewis and John McDavid reported on several places in the township where problems have been apparent under recent heavy rainfall conditions.

Township employee Rick Lewis pointed out some repairs needed to the grader and mower and recommended grading the north end of Porter's Central and west end of Chambers roads.

Neither rain, nor snow, nor heat will deter the U.S. Mail, nor the average sports fan. I learned that lesson well last weekend.

My husband thinks that the four seasons of the year are spring, summer, fall and winter, but Basketball, Baseball, Football and Hockey. So last Sunday, my husband and his friends were not about to let a little bit of icy rain, hail, sleet, nor 20 mph winds deter their first baseball game of the year.

While I was sitting at the kitchen table with several of the other wives, bemoaning the fact that our husbands were outside catching double pneumonia and generally behaving like a pack of unruly cub scouts, I mentioned that it was my week to write Care To Share.

Now, it's not that I don't like to write Care To Share, but I will admit to not being the world's greatest cook. I do not have a complete file system of exciting, original, kitchen-tested recipes, so I was feeling a bit desperate about this week's column.

My friends began to write down recipes to help me out. So, this

column is dedicated to friends... wet, soggy, baseball-loving friends, and warm, dry, very patient friends.

P.S. My husband's team won.

These first three recipes are from Beth Mills (girlfriend of the second baseman).

Summery Orange Bread

1 pkg. yeast
1 cup warm orange juice
1 Tbsp. butter
1 tsp. salt
4 cups whole wheat flour,
2 Tbsp. honey
1 Tbsp. grated orange rind
Dissolve yeast in orange juice. Add honey and stir well. Gradually add remaining ingredients, beating well. Cover, let rise until doubled. Turn out and knead. Place in loaf pan and let rise a while.
Bake at 375 degrees 40 min.

Carrot Cake

Beat together:
1 1/2 cup vegetable oil
4 egg yolks
1 1/2 cup sugar or 1 cup honey
2 cups grated carrots
1 cup chopped nuts
Sift together:
3 cups whole wheat flour
2 1/2 tsp. baking powder
2 tsp. baking soda
1 1/2 tsp. salt
1 Tbsp. cinnamon

Fold in 4 egg whites stiffly beaten. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes. Makes 2 layers.

Anadama Bread

5 1/2 - 6 1/2 cups flour
2 tsp. salt
2 pkgs. yeast (undissolved)
1/4 cup margarine (softened)
1/2 cup molasses
2 cups very hot tap water
1 cup corn meal
Combine 2 1/2 cups flour with the corn meal, salt and dry yeast.

Add the softened margarine. Add the molasses and hot tap water a little at a time. Beat 2 mins. at high speed. Add 1/2 cup more flour or enough to make a thick batter. Beat 2 mins. more at medium speed. Add enough flour to make a thick dough.
Turn out onto a lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, about 5 mins. Place in a greased bowl, allowing to grease the top. Cover, let rise

in a warm place, free from draft until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Punch dough down, divide in half. Form each into a loaf and place in two greased bread pans. Cover, allow to rise until doubled in bulk, about 45 minutes.
Bake in hot oven (375 degrees) about 30-35 minutes.

greased, floured loaf pan, bake at 325 degrees for 50 minutes until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.
Cool for 10 minutes on a wire rack, remove from pan and cool completely.

Chocolate Lb. Cake - substitute 1/2 cup cocoa for 1/3 cup of the flour. Substitute 2 Tbsp. Kahlua or any coffee liqueur for amaretto.

Sour Cream Coffee Cake
Cream: 1/2 cup butter, preferably unsalted
1/2 cup sugar
4 large eggs
2 eggs
1 Tbsp. vanilla
1 Tbsp. amaretto

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Eagles Win CBL Track Championships

DREAM COMES TRUE FOR BOYS AS BW EARN 1ST LEAGUE CROWN IN 14 YEARS

For several members of the Big Walnut boys-track team, it was a moment they had long been waiting for. Now, poised and standing in front of the pressbox on their own track were the seniors accepting the Central Buckeye League trophy from retiring Commissioner Robert Whiteside.

Despite a rainstorm, the cluster of athletes held the prize high in the air and began their one-lap victory journey around the track. Just minutes before, the Eagles had assured themselves of a CBL "Buckeye" Division championship, the school's first-ever title since winning the Mid-Ohio Conference meet some 14 years ago. Interestingly, the MOC crown was also won at the Eagle all-weather facility.

BW dominated its division with 157 points and outdistanced second place Dublin, who scored 97. Marysville came in third with 81. Berley totaled 67. Olentangy had 59 and Buckeye Valley tallied 31. Over in the Central, Academy looked up the title with 182 points and was followed by North Union (113), Grandview (64), Jonathan Alder (52), New Albany (48) and West Jefferson (32). "Our seniors worked hard for this win and they really came through with some great performances," commented Coach Jim Boyd as four veterans topped the field in the shot put, high jump, hurdles and 3200-meter run. "It was a great team effort as the underclassmen provided the depth to give us the runaway win," he added.

Leading the way with double victories were Mike Murphy and Bob Bower. Mike successfully defended his shot put title of last year by tossing the ball 50-2 on Saturday to edge out Dublin's Brian Murphy (no relation) and surprised the field in the discus on Thursday with a new meet record 146-5 throw, shattering the old mark by over 7 feet, and improving his best this year by over 10 feet.

Bower established himself as the new school record holder in the 110-meter high hurdles as he zipped over the wooden barrier in 15.2 seconds, besting the previous record of 15.3 set by Bob Bower in 1979.

Besides claiming seven of the 16 categories, the Eagles' superiority was also evident in the rest of the field. BW produced five seconds, four thirds, two fourths, three fifths and two sixths. Medals and ribbons were awarded during Saturday afternoon action.

Battling for a runner-up berth in the pole vault, which was determined on number of misses, was Chip Klindinst as he cleared 12 feet even. McClary tied Earl Ramsey's 20-year old 100-meter dash record in going 11.1 and went 23.2 to get another second in the 300-meter race.

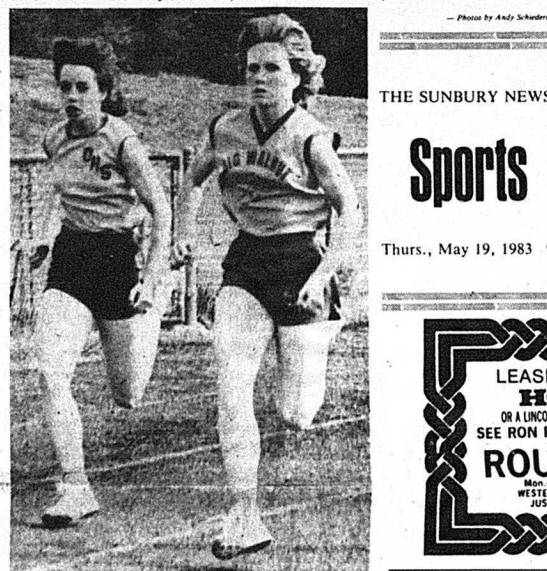

the five-year old record of 1:47.5 formerly held by Bea Hutson, Sally Stith, Katy Mudre and Patty Saunders which they set at the 1978 state meet and the 1:47.8 effort of Columbus School for Girls during the 1979 CBL event.

The 400 relay with Tammy Dally, Morton, Graham and Jennifer Spiert ran a 51.2 in tying the meet standard with the 1980 BF team. Jeanna Stone took championship honors in the high jump as she cleared the bar at

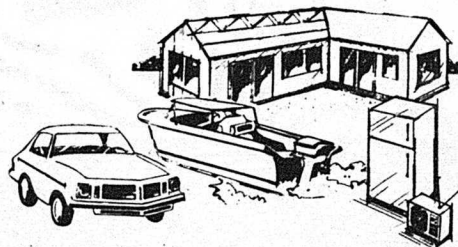
