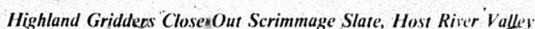

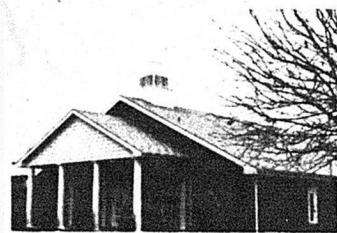

CWS Depot Will Be Open Sept. 13

Church World Service Clothing Appeal truck will stop at Asbury Church, 35 W. Lincoln, Delaware, which serves as the local CWS Clothing Depot.
It will pick up several thousand pounds of clothing, self-help kits, and other goods collected by area churches, civic groups, and individuals, reports depot coordinator Nancy Rietz.
These donations will be used for emergency needs and self-help programs by Church World Service throughout the world.
Last year, our community donated about 2,600 pounds through this program," Nancy says.
"Especially needed this year are layettes, infants and preschool clothing, light and medium weight men's clothing, new or clean used blankets, full skirts of worn-in kind, new bars of laundry soap, washable cotton-blend fabric - a minimum of two yards up to whole bolts can be used," Rietz says.

WHEN GUM POCKETS FORM

Does toothbrushing or eating hard foods make your gums bleed? If so, you can be sure that some inflammation is going on. Pockets of bacteria may have developed around some of your teeth.

Gum tissue has two parts. The lining or surface tissue is called the epithelium. The dense supportive tissue that lies under it is called connective tissue. In the early destruction phase called gingivitis, bacteria attack the gum lining and connective tissue. Your body sends cells to fight the bacteria, but some of them are destroyed in the process. When these cells die, enzymes and other

substances are released that contribute to the destruction of gum tissue and bone. As the disease progresses you may notice that your gum tissue looks red and shiny. It may also look slightly puffy or swollen and bleed more easily.

Fortunately, gum disease, even at this stage, is reversible if you get the treatment you need from your dentist. The longer you delay treatment, however, the greater your chances of losing teeth.

Care to Share?

Gardens are amazing things! We fret about them being too early, too late, too wet, too dry, too hot, too cold, or too something else. However, it seems most gardeners end up with more of certain things than they can eat or can, and sometimes even more than they can give away.

The recent rains after a dry spell in most areas have given the late garden crops a real boost and many find themselves looking for new recipes and ways to use that bounty.

Cucumber vines seem to be outgrowing themselves just now and along with pickles from Jayne Swope comes this recipe for Christmas Pickles. Jayne received the recipe from Myrtle Smith at Nestles several years ago and says it's the best and easiest recipe she has ever used.

Christmas Pickles

Wash and pack cucumbers in gallon jar. Add:

- 1 Tbsp. salt
- 4 Tbsp. powdered alum
- 4 Tbsp. pickling spices
- 4 cups vinegar

Finish filling jar with water. Put lid on and shake.

Put away in cool, dark spot until December (or November, for Thanksgiving).

Then open and discard solution, and wash pickles and jars.

Slice or cut pickles into chunks, slices or spears, or any desired shape.

Mix new solution to cover pickles.

8 cups sugar and 8 Table-

spoons water.

Add to cut pickles. Stir carefully. Stir a couple times a day until sugar is dissolved (usually three or four days or longer). Refrigerate.

Keep a long time in refrigerator. (Syrup will be very thick.)

Recently I tried the following recipe which would be a change of pace for you readers who enjoy cucumber and onion salads. It's very refreshing and might be just the right touch at dinner some hot day.

Cucumber-Cheese Ring

- 1 pkg. (3 oz.) lime gelatin
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 pkg. (3 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 1 tsp. prepared horseradish
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 2 Tbsp. lemon juice
- 1/4 cup drained shredded or ground unpared cucumber
- 1/4 cup finely sliced green onion

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add cream cheese, mayonnaise or salad dressing, salt, horseradish and lemon juice. Beat smooth with electric or rotary beater.

Chill till partially set. Stir in cucumber and sliced green onion.

Chill in 3 1/2-cup mold till firm.

Makes 5 or 6 servings.

Rains have caused the cabbage-heads to split and they are often hard to cut and too large to use in the usual manner. With a food processor and Annabelle Banning's recipe, using that cabbage to make sauerkraut is an easy project.

Sauerkraut

Shred cabbage and pack into quart cans. To each quart, add:

- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1 tsp. vinegar
- Fill each quart with boiling water and hand-seal. When finished "working" remove lids and clean off, then re-seal completely.

Jean McCleeny, a former News employer, was fortunate to have a whole bushel of peaches. She had used them in many ways but when she got down to just a couple of peaches, she thought her family just wouldn't eat another sliced peach. So like many smart cooks, she made up her own recipe. Jean says, "I felt like pie. It's good!"

Peachy Lemon Custard Pie

- Slice 2 or 3 peaches into rim and juice of 1/2 lemon.
- Mix together:
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup cream or milk
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- dash salt
- 1 Tbsp. cornmeal

Add peaches and lemon and mix thoroughly. Pour into prepared 9" pie shell. Bake at 375 degrees for 40 minutes.

Last week Mary E. McCurdy, our Marengo correspondent, requested a zucchini cookie recipe. Here is one Jean gave us for this recipe column when she worked here. It also is very good.

Lemon Zucchini Cookies

- (Delicate, soft cookies)
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 tsp. (or more) grated lemon peel
- 1 cup shredded unpeeled zucchini
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- Lemon Frost (optional)

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt; set aside. In large bowl of mixer, cream butter and sugar until light. Beat in egg and lemon peel until fluffy. At low speed, or with rubber scraper,

stir in flour mixture. Stir in hour zucchini and walnuts. Drop by rounded tsp. on greased cookie sheets. Bake at 325 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until very lightly browned. While warm, drizzle lightly with Lemon Frost. Makes about 4 or 5 dozen cookies.

Lemon Frost: Mix well 1 cup confectioners' sugar and 1/2 Tablespoon lemon juice.

Zucchini just seems to grow and grow. We are grateful to Ann Hancock for this yummy sounding pie recipe to help use some of them.

Zucchini Pie
2 cups zucchini, grated with rim
1 cup sugar
2 Tbsp. flour
1 cup milk
3 eggs
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. vanilla
1 Tbsp. margarine
Sprinkling of nutmeg and cinnamon on top

Place grated squash and rest of ingredients in blender. Blend till creamy. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 1

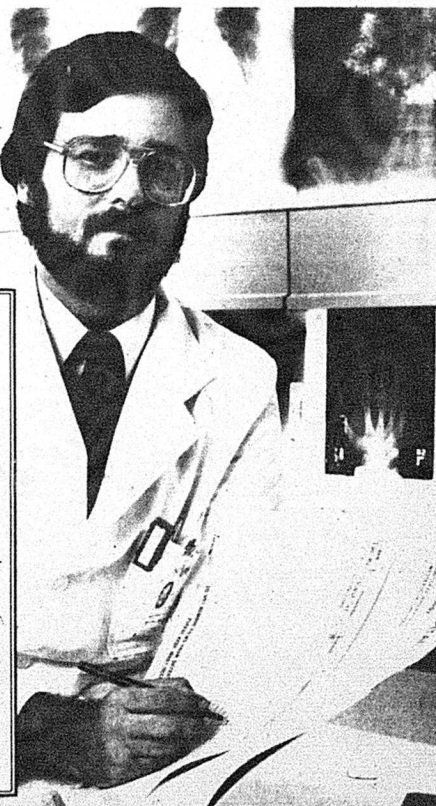

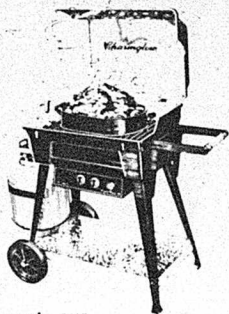

WW II Bomber Team Reunites After 39 Years

World War II B-17 bomber crew got together Aug. 11 for the first time in 39 years to reminisce and meet each other's families.

Six of the nine-man crew were able to attend the reunion, reports Mrs. Kenneth Paul, Columbus, whose husband was a waist gunner on the plane. Ken is a native of Sunbury.

Top photo shows the entire crew taken at their base camp in Foggia, Italy, in the fall of 1944. Squatting in front are Leland Bagby, pilot; Irvin Raer, waist gunner; and Paul Standing, crew chief. Behind them are John W. Baker, engineer; John Franks, tail gunner; Robert E. Bergeron, copilot; James B. Bawly, navigator; Joe Burkhardt, radio man; and Lorran Magers, ball turret gunner.

Bottom photo shows six of the men, today, in a snapshot taken at the reunion. They are, left to right: Franks, Bagby, Baker, Magers, Raer and Paul. Paul called the night before the reunion, from his home in Hampton, Va., and pledged to make the next get-together planned for 1987. Burkhardt is dead, and

organizers have still been unable to locate Bergeron.

The Pauls and the Bakers, 5129 Worthington Rd., Westerville, hosted the first reunion, running down the current addresses of the others and coordinating the event. The Bagbys came from Citrus Heights, Cal.; Magers, Mountville, W.V.; Franks, Okemah, Ok.; and Raer, Danville, Ill. Baker, a native of Texas, met his wife Rosemary, who works at Nestle in Sunbury, when he was stationed at Lockbourne AFB near Cincinnati and settled in Delaware county following his service time.

"You know, we all thought it was quite an accomplishment to get all nine back from the war as a team," Mrs. Paul says. Raer, on one mission assigned to another flight crew, had been shot down and spent the last months of the war in a German POW camp. And Franks caught some shrapnel in his arm during one mission, "but no more serious injuries did any of them have," Mrs. Paul adds.

She reports the team formed in the summer of 1944, at McCall AFB, Tampa, Fla., and returned to the States, Flag Day, June 14, 1945. After being together nearly a year the men went their separate ways, keeping in some casual contact until the reunion was finally planned this past year.
