Three Area Men Face Drug Counts

Three area men indicted in secret indictments Aug. 9 for drug-related cases have all entered guilty pleas and are free on bond.

Carl O. Scott, 23, 2967 N.H. 3, Apt. 4, Sunbury, appeared in court Thursday to plead not guilty to a count of trafficking in marijuana. He allegedly sold grass to an undercover agent in Sunbury May 16.

Michael F. Jones, 23, 3648

Cheshire Rd., Delaware, pled not guilty to two counts, trafficking in marijuana and drug use, his arraignment Aug. 16. He too, had reportedly sold drugs to an undercover agent in Delaware.

And Ronald L. Green, 28, 3773 E. Powell Rd., Westerville, pled not guilty to a count of trafficking in marijuana. His sale to an agent allegedly took place at a bar south of Delaware, Aug. 14.

Three others were indicted

Aug. 9 in connection with local incidents.

Michael C. Russ Powers, 28, not of Columbus and formerly of S.R. 37E, was charged with two counts of theft. Powers allegedly stole a truck from the Dede Prue home, 1500 E. S.R. 37E, July 13, in a pickup truck cap from Larry DeWitt, 1240 S. E. 16th St., July 14.

Powers pled not guilty at his arraignment last Tuesday, and is facing a \$500 recognition bond.

He was indicted Aug. 19 in a break-in at the Cheshire Market was indicted for breaking and entering. Michael Sean Murphy, 19, Whitehall, and two S.M.V.'s were captured in the early morning hours after an alarm was sounded at the market at 504 Cheshire Rd.

Murphy entered a plea of "not guilty" Aug. 20, and is up to a recognition bond.

He was indicted for a break-in at a residence on motorcycles June 20 just prior to the second man's crash into a tree along Big Walnut Rd., was

indicted for one count of involuntary manslaughter. Keith R. Reed, 21, who the Patrol reported was driving a stolen motorcycle at the time of the fatal crash.

In two other recent cases, a 23-year-old Big Walnut man was placed on five years probation Aug. 10 after having pled guilty to stealing checks while staying with John W. Sneed. Edgar E. Bloomfield, 3100 Big Walnut Rd., had charged his pic to one count of theft at a hearing on July 20.

In other action the board reviewed and approved the 1984-85 High School Handbooks: Student Handbook, Program of Activities, Art Handbook, Vocal Music Handbook, and the Instrumental Music Handbook.

A recommendation to cooperate with the Licking County Board of Education for the delivery of commodities was approved along with a recommendation to participate in the Disadvantaged Public Program Fund which will be used for health services in the district.

Lincoln High School was approved as a Volunteer High School Assistant Volleyball coach.

The board also approved the 1984-85 Free & Reduced Price lunch policy.

Other actions included progress on the high school roof and Harford furnace. Fred Boudinot, District Transportation Supervisor, reported on this year's bus inspection by the State Highway Patrol. All vehicles were approved as ready for the new school year. The board approved the sale of a used bus.

The board was informed that

the repair of the football field lights was proceeding and they would be ready for the first home game.

All board members were present. The next regular meeting of the board is Monday, Sept. 16.



Share?

Gardens are amazing things. We fret about them being too early, too late, too wet, too dry, too hot, too cold, or too something else. However, it seems most gardeners end up with more of what they want than they can eat or can, and sometimes even more than they can give away.

The recent rains after a dry spell in most areas have given the late garden crops a real boost and we find ourselves looking for new recipes and ways to use that bounty.

Cucumber vines seem to be outdoing themselves just now and along with pickles from Jayne Smith's book, "Pickle Heaven," for Christmas Pickles, Jayne received the recipe from Myrtle Smith at Nestle's several years ago and says it's the best and easiest recipe she has ever used.

Christmas Pickles
Wash and pack cucumbers in gallon jar. Add:

4 Tbsp. salt
4 Tbsp. powdered alum

4 Tbsp. pickling spices
1 cup vinegar

Fill jar with water. Put lid on and shake.

Put away in cool, dark spot until December (or November, for Thanksgiving).

Then open and discard solution.

Wash pickles and jars.

Slice pickles into chunks

or spears, or any desired shape.

Mix new solution to cover pickles.

8 cups sugar and 8 Table-

spoons water.

Add to pickles. Stir carefully a couple of times as until sugar is dissolved (usually three or four days or longer). Refrigerate.

Keep a long time in refrigerator. Syrup will be very thick.

Recently, I tried the following recipe which would be a change of pace for you readers who enjoy cucumber and onion salads. It's very refreshing and might just be the right touch at dinner some hot day.

Cucumber Cheese Ring

1 pkg. (3 oz.) lime gelatin

1 cup boiling water

1 pkg. (3 oz.) cream cheese, softened

3/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

1/2 cup prepared horseradish

2 Tbsp. lemon juice

1 cup drained shredded or ground unpeeled cucumber

1/2 cup olive oil, gelatin in boiling water. Add cream cheese, mayonnaise or salad dressing, salt, horseradish and lemon juice. Beat smooth with electric or regular mixer.

Chill till partially set. Stir in cucumber and sliced green onion. Chill in 3 1/2-cup mold till firm.

Makes 5 or 6 servings.

Peachy Lemon Custard Pie

Slice 2 or 3 peaches into rind and juice of 1/2 lemon.

Mix together:

3 eggs

1 1/2 cups sugar

1/2 cup cream or milk

1/4 cup melted butter

1 Tbsp. cornmeal

Add peaches and lemon and mix thoroughly.

Pour into prepared 9" pie shell. Bake at 375 degrees for 40 minutes.

Zucchini Pie

2 cups zucchini, grated with rind and juice

2 Tbsp. flour

3 eggs

1/2 cup salt

1 Tbsp. vanilla

1 Tbsp. margarine

Sprinkling of nutmeg and cinnamon on top

Place grated squash and rest of

ingredients in blender. Blend till creamy. Pour into unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

Zucchini just seems to grow and grow. We are grateful to Anni Hanecock for this yummy sounding pie recipe to help use some of them.

Making Use of God's Bounty

Stir in flour mixture. Stir in hour zucchini and walnuts.

Drop by spoonfuls on greased cookie sheets. Bake at 325 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes or until very lightly browned.

While warm, drizzle lightly with Lemon Frost. Makes about 4 or 5 dozen cookies.

Lemon Frost: Mix well 1 cup confectioners' sugar and 1 1/2 Tablespoons lemon juice.
