

Westerville Absentee Voting Closes Mar. 31

Residents of the Westerville School district are reminded they have until noon next Saturday, Mar. 31, to make application for absentee ballots for the Apr. 3 Special Election.

Delaware County Board of Elections Director Dorothy Woldorf says six persons have requested absentee ballots so far. She adds the Delaware elections office will be open Saturday morning, Mar. 31, for persons wishing to make application and vote absentee.

Persons in the Westerville district will vote on three issues Apr. 3, two directly for the school system, and the third, for the Westerville Public Library.

The larger of the two school issues is a 1.05-mill capital improvements bond issue which

would be collected over a period of 13 years. The additional millage would bring in \$2,730,000 for Westerville Schools for improvement and repair of existing school district sites and facilities, and land acquisition for expansion of the bus compound.

The second school issue, for .15-mills, would raise \$319,000 for the school to purchase new school buses, a food delivery truck, and a communications system for the bus fleet. That bond issue would be collected over a four-year period.

The Westerville Public Library issue asks for approval of a .4-mill tax to be collected over a period of 23 years. That bond issue would raise \$1,450,000 for the library for constructing an addition to and remodeling the library, furnishing and equipping the addition, and improving real estate for off-street parking.

The library issue is on the Special Election ballot with the school issues as the library serves the same area as the school district.

Voters in Genoa precincts and the Westerville precinct which is in this county will go to the polls Apr. 3.

General Telephone To Lay New Cable in Cheshire

Major telephone cable construction project for growth is underway here, announces General Telephone Co. of Ohio.

John L. Anderson of Delaware, customer service manager, said the project will add cable facilities in the northwestern portion of the Cheshire Center exchange.

"There has been a sharp increase in the number of lots being platted and sold along Alum Creek Lake," Anderson said. "We must be in a position to meet the demand for new telephone service when homes on these lots are completed. The new cable also will provide facilities for the increasing demand for private lines or lines with fewer parties."

New cable will be placed north on S. Old State Rd. to the intersection of Peachbrook Rd. The new cable also will continue west along Peachbrook Rd. and connect with a new buried cable on Platt Rd.

"The new cable will be placed on poles. It was not designed to be buried owing to plans by Delaware County to widen and improve some of these roads," the manager noted.

General Telephone serves 1,228 customers in the 36 square mile Cheshire Center exchange.

County School Office Has Open House

Delaware county Board of Education will hold an open house Sunday to show the public its expanded facilities at 22 Court St., behind the county courthouse.

County School Superintendent Smith Ruman says the office's new location has about four times as much space as that formerly inhabited in the courthouse basement. The school office moved last November to the former home pictured above.

In the second photo, Ruman poses with part of the county school's film library, which, he reports, now has around 700 films.

Bottom photo shows the sliding doors between the main office lobby of the school board and the board's actual meeting room. Ruman says the old doors can be closed to remove any meeting in progress from any business being transacted in the lobby.

With ample storage area in both the attic and the basement of the building, the school's office now has separate rooms housing its special education supervisors and its psychologists. Including two secretaries, the office has desks for nine employees, with the board's meeting room serving as a work area for the 14 other specialists employed by the county board but working in the individual schools in the county.

Open house Sunday will be from 2-4 p.m., and Ruman says everyone is invited.

An Experience of The Heart, Part II

Well, back to the hospital again this time for a heart catheterization to determine where and how much damage was done by the heart attack about which I have previously written.

Since the heart floor was full, I was put on the N. Old NC as well as this year's July Fourth celebration and other projects.

While there, I did my usual twice a day walking which seemed strange to the other patients. They thought I should be on the psychiatric floor.

Incidentally, there were six prisoners as patients who meant six guards, 24 hours a day, to watch them. That helps eat up the tax dollars.

Any of you who read my first article might recall that I found the hospital not exactly a place of peace and quiet, as I was being in the scale at 5:30 a.m. The neurology floor had its own version.

At 5:30 a.m. (that must be the magic hour) a cart loaded with ice cubes was wheeled to the room door. The worker then proceeded to drop lots of ice into lots of empty plastic pitchers so that everyone could start the day with a nice slug of ice water. This was interesting. (I had some very inspiring thoughts!)

This, along with the method of delivering medications during the night made the 10 p.m. - 5:30 a.m. period very enjoyable. Two nurses, who had much to discuss with each other, came in, turned on all of the lights and dispensed the medication, never missing a beat. They no doubt, had previously worked the

hard-of-bearing floor.

My roommate, may be rest in peace, added to all of this by super snoring. He was a pro. I think that is what finally got him.

Getting back to the catheterization, for those of you who might be interested, a heart catheterization is a procedure where usually the artery in the arm is opened and a plastic catheter is inserted and guided up through the artery into the heart. At specific places, dye is released and pictures are taken to determine the severity and location of circulation problems. It is really not too long

a procedure - perhaps 40 minutes.

The week previous, my hair had got so long that I had to have a haircut. I came into my home to get a haircut. In our conversation he mentioned that his father had had a heart attack. I asked him if he had had "cath". He replied yes, and that his dad said it was the worst pain that he had ever experienced. (I was sorry I had opened my mouth by this time.)

Not having enough brains to stop them to determine the actual cause, I asked him how it came out. "He needed open heart surgery," was the reply.

Assuming that everything had gone okay, I asked him how his dad was now. The reply, "Oh, he died on the operating table." Desperate now into any small amount of good news, I said that I assumed his dad was along in years. The reply, "Oh no, he was much younger than you." Hummmmm - no encouragement there.

I figured, "Oh well, I've lived a full life. After all, I've seen downtown Columbus on a Saturday night, so I go ahead with the 'cath'."

In all seriousness, the "cath" went very smoothly. The only real discomfort was a sore arm from the incision and a hang-over from the pills given me prior to the surgery. If it were advised to go through it again I would do so.

The final results will not be known for about 10 days. I was told, however, that I do not need open heart surgery at this time, which was great news to me.

I was to be released the next day. (Check-out time is 2 p.m.) 2 p.m. came and went, but thinking that things were a little behind schedule, I relaxed. (I'm learning.) By 9 p.m., no action. The cardiologist had forgotten me. Oh, well, what's another \$100? (A lot, after taxes!)

That's the story to this time. I am somewhat disappointed that things didn't turn out better. I was hoping that it was all a big mistake due to eating some lousy seafood that didn't agree with me. I do appreciate the fact that the surgeon was to keep his knife in it's sheath.

JVS Board Adopts Calendar for Next Year

Delaware County Joint Vocational School Board of Education, at its regular meeting last Thursday night, adopted the school calendar for the 1979-80 year.

The calendar was developed in cooperation with the participating city superintendents and JVS faculty committee input, according to Dr. John Toth, superintendent. All schools will open for instruction on Tuesday, Aug. 28.

JVS will be closed Sept. 20 for Little Brown Jug Day, Dec. 24 through Jan. 1 for Christmas recess, Mar. 31 through Apr. 4

for Easter vacation and school will end June 5.

School To End June 6

Board amended this school year's calendar to make up the one day in excess of five calamity days allowed that school was closed because of adverse weather conditions. Make-up days for students will be June 6 (originally June 5) and teachers' work day in June 7 (originally June 6).

Upon the recommendation of the superintendent, board employed Paul Reese, Jr., to substitute cosmetology teacher for the remainder of this year.

Board Takes Other Action

In other action the board voted to authorize the treasurer to advertise for property insurance bids, to be opened at 12 noon on Wednesday, Apr. 4.

—employed Norma Ashley, former treasurer, as consultant to the treasurer, Rosalyn Reese, for an additional maximum of 40 hours;

—granted permission to Dorothy Ketterlin, guidance counselor, to attend the American Personnel and Guidance Association Convention in Las Vegas, Nv., Apr. 2-6, with the board paying half the actual costs.

Members recessed the meeting till Mar. 26 at 6 p.m., when they will meet with teachers on negotiations.

Superintendent Reports

Dr. Toth reported to the board that 31 CTE courses in adult education would be offered beginning Mar. 26 at the JVS.

He also reported the trouble shooting contest was held Mar. 14 and 15 at the school.

He said current enrollment in 154 students was present students from October 1979. Attendance for the month of February shows that an average of 89.2% of students were present for each day, slightly below the state-wide average of 91% for joint vocational schools, he also said.

Highland Board Denies Dress Code Revision

Highland Local School Board of Education passed a motion to deny the request for revising the dress code, at its regular meeting Mar. 13.

Reasons, as listed by Supt. Richard VanHorn, were that it would be more difficult to enforce than the present rule, it would cause an area of conflict between non-athletes and athletes, it has the potential danger of reversing an image the school has been able to achieve; and for friction among different segments of the student body as it only affects a small portion.

On the positive side, VanHorn said the revised code would be a minor change, mousetraps are presently stylish, the code is a personal thing and it requests only small movements.

In other action the board accepted the resignations of This Leo effective Mar. 30, as her husband took a job out of state and the resignation of Alberta Stokovic, effective at the close of the contract year.

"We're luckier here (at Big Walnut) than most," said an older

lady who has no one close in school now but, nevertheless, keeps up with what's happening, "but I do believe that the reason levies aren't passed is because of the troubles at schools."

Another lady who gets around believes lack of discipline is getting out of hand. "The teacher's hands are tied," she says. "Things have got to get tougher."

She lists the advantages that children have today, such as Future Farmers of America, Future Homemakers of America, DECA, vocational training, etc., as the good things going for schools now.

Several seem to feel that if judges would get tougher, attorneys would remember that not only do students and parents have "rights" but so do school administrators, teachers and students who do obey the rules, and so on down the line, then our problems would be fewer and we could turn out better citizens (more positive-thinking!).

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Dental Hints
By Michael S. Anthony, D.D.S.

After periods of constant use, ranging from many months to many years, the denture wearer may begin to notice that changes in the condition of his/her mouth have caused the dentures to be ill-fitting, loose, frequently uncomfortable. Fortunately, this does not necessarily mean that it is time to have new dentures fitted. Most usually, depending on the extent and cause of individual mouth changes, the old dentures can be professionally refitted, enabling the wearer to use them comfortably and satisfactorily for an indeterminate length of time.

But, true to the do-it-yourself practices that save many Americans money in areas involving auto repairs, remodeling of houses, broken window replacements, etc., some denture wearers go out and buy a kit that purportedly will allow them to refit their own dentures "at great savings." Such kits usually provide some type of plaster—sheet or putty—that is placed under the denture, and through a bit of guesswork, the wearer is supposed to mold this plastic to fit his mouth; the resulting filler adhering to the denture is to "make it fit like new once again." Uh-huh!

The fallacy of the whole idea comes to light when the dentist finds that the do-it-yourself refit is not usually harden, and he is left with a mouthful of ill-fitting plastic. The chances of the fit of his dentures changes properly, slip, slide, and often cause him to start in the hope of better luck, usually end with the wearer wishing he'd never begun.

When your dental refines dentures, he uses material scientifically developed and specifically designed to form a lasting, accurate contour of your mouth. The end product—the denture—is produced under heat and pressure, thereby bonding it firmly to the denture, resulting in a well-molded lining. The denture "cured," having a surface that will not alter it. The newly-fitted denture should be comfortable, function efficiently, because dental Home refitting kits seem cheap but you have added unnecessarily to the cost of refitting, to say nothing of the health irritation. WHEREAS, THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF SUNBURY HAS REVIEWED AND GRANTED AN EIGHT AND SEVEN-TENTHS (8.75) PER CENT COST OF LIVING INCREASE IN SALARY RATES EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1979, AS SHOWN IN SECTION III EMPLOYEE RATES;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF SUNBURY, DELAWARE COUNTY, OHIO, that all prior ordinances concerning pay classification and salary rates are hereby rescinded and superseded by this ordinance, members elected thereto concurring.

SECTION I - DEFINITIONS

a. FULL-TIME EMPLOYEE
Any new employee who is designated as a full time employee when hired. Any person employed by the Village of Sunbury, Ohio, who has been assigned and worked Twelve Hundred (1200) hours or more at regular pay during thirty-two (32) consecutive weeks. Days of vacation and sick leave shall be considered regular work days of eight hour each.

b. PART-TIME EMPLOYEE
Any person employed by the Village of Sunbury on a temporary basis and who does not meet or exceeds to meet the requirements of a full time employee.

c. ANNIVERSARY DATE
The month and day when an employee meets the requirements of a full-time employee, and that month and day in succeeding years during which he shall retain full employee status.

d. VACATION
A full-time employee of the Village shall be entitled to fourteen (14) consecutive days of vacation after one year of employment. Employees may not work in LIEU OF VACATION.

e. LEAVE OF ABSENCE

A leave of absence not exceeding three (3) working days may be granted in writing by the Mayor because of death in the immediate family of the employee. Such leave shall not be deducted from vacation leave credit.

f. IMMEDIATE FAMILY

Immediate family consists father, mother, sister, brother, child of legal guardian of the employee or spouse.

g. SICK LEAVE

Sick leave shall accrue at the rate of one and one-quarter (1 1/4) day for each month of actual service and may be accumulated up to a maximum of One Hundred Twenty (120) days.

Sick leave may be granted in writing by the Mayor for absence due to the employee's illness or injury. In cases that employee is off three days or more doctors certificate shall be required before returning to work.

h. HOLIDAYS

Full time employees of the Village shall be entitled paid holidays as specified by the State of Ohio.

i. TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT

Upon termination of employment any unused vacation leave accrued by a full-time employee shall be compensated for on a pro-rata basis at 1/12th of the regular vacation rate for each complete month worked since his most recent anniversary date. Termination of employment will terminate and annul all sick leave credited to an employee.

j. RETIREMENT AGE

The mandatory retirement age for Village Employees is to be seventy (70) years of age.

SECTION II - SALARY INCREMENTS

Salary increments within established pay ranges shall be a means of recognizing experience and continued service. The pay range for all positions shall be divided into four salary increments. A through D. Advancement from one salary to the next higher will be based on merit along with the following requirements:

SECTION IV - OVERTIME COMPENSATION

Overtime shall be paid to all employees at one and one-half times the normal rate for all authorized overtime worked in excess of 40 hours per week.

HOLIDAYS - Any employee who works a holiday will be paid their regular salary plus 8 regular hours. If not worked they will receive regular salary. If holiday constitutes overtime they will be paid time and one-half for eight hours overtime plus an additional eight hours for the holiday.

SECTION V - ESTABLISHMENT OF PAY SCALE

The exact pay rate for each employee and designation as full-time employee, when applicable, within the classifications and grades shown in Section III, shall be recommended by the Mayor.

SECTION VI - DUTIES

A. Duties to be performed by persons in the Department of Administration & Finance shall be established by the Mayor or his delegated representative.

B. Duties to be performed by persons in the Department of Public Safety, Street Maintenance & Water and Sewerage shall be established by the department heads with the approval of the Mayor.

SECTION VII - COMBINED POSITIONS

If, in the discretion of the Mayor, he finds that one person can fulfill the duties of one or more of the positions in any department, he may combine the positions and with the approval of Council designate a new position classification rate.

SECTION VIII - PAY PERIOD

Village employees shall be paid bi-weekly. The pay period shall begin and end on days designated by the Village Clerk-Treasurer.

SECTION IX - COST OF LIVING

a. On January 1, of each year the cost of living index for the past year shall be reviewed by council and adjustments shall be made to the "Salary Increments and Rate of Compensation" in Section III commensurate with the increase or decrease as shown by the cost-of-living index for the year. The adjustment shall be a maximum of fifteen percent (15%) for any one year.

b. Upon determination by council that adjustments shall be made in accordance with (a) above, they shall appropriate funds, if available, and if not available, then an increase shall be refused.

SECTION X - SUNSHINE CLAUSE

It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION XI - EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the public peace, health and safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the Village of Sunbury, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force immediately upon passage and approval by the Mayor.

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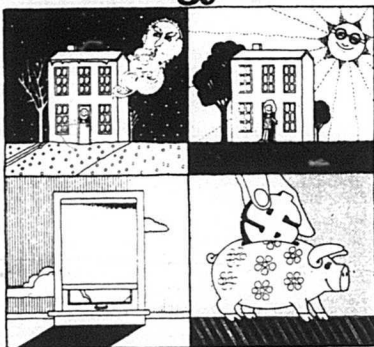

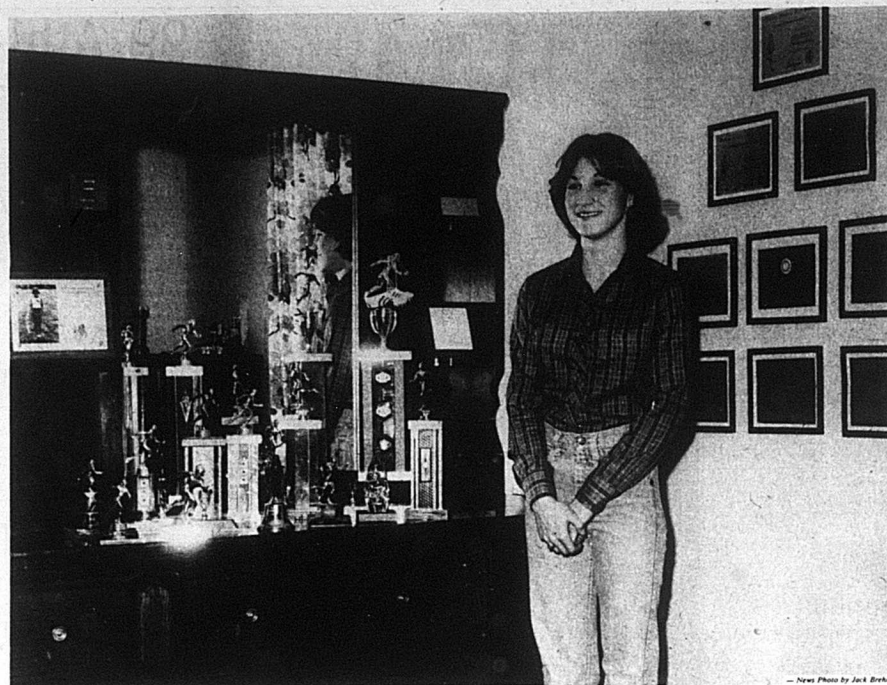

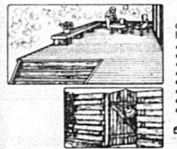

ORDINANCE NO. 79-670
 AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPERSEDING PREVIOUS ORDINANCES NOS. 534, 611, AND 77-651, CONCERNING WATER AND SEWER SERVICE TO THE VILLAGE OF SUNBURY, OHIO, ITS INHABITANTS AND OTHER USERS, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, it is deemed necessary and advisable to establish certain rates and charges for water service and sewer service to be rendered to the Village of Sunbury, Ohio, and to its inhabitants and other users which will produce sufficient revenue to pay the operating and maintenance expenses of its waterworks system and to provide for the payment of and extending and improving said waterworks system;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY the Council of the Village of Sunbury, Delaware County, Ohio, members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1. That Ordinances Nos. 534, 611, and 77-651 are hereby amended and superseded by this Ordinance.

SECTION 2. That commencing April 1, 1979, the quarterly charges for the water service rate shall be increased by fifteen per cent (15%).

SECTION 3. That commencing April 1, 1979, the quarterly charges for the water service rate shall be one hundred ten (110%) per cent of the water service rate.

SECTION 4. That commencing April 1, 1979, the following shall be the rates charged for the supply of water services and for the sewer service and tap fees:

The foregoing charges are minimum not maximum charges and the Village reserves the right and is obligated to increase the same at any time should the revenues of the waterworks system prove insufficient to pay the operating and maintenance expenses and extending and improving said waterworks system.

SECTION 5. That commencing April 1, 1979, the charge for bulk water being sold to bulk water haulers shall increase from \$1.00 per thousand gallon to \$2.00 per thousand gallon.

SECTION 6. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances previously adopted by the Village of Sunbury, Ohio, concerning water and sewer service and procedures for the Village of Sunbury, Ohio, not specifically amended herein, are to remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 8. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 9. This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure in that the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the Village require the establishment of revised rates to support the financing of the cost thereof, and the immediate effectiveness of which ordinance is necessary, and it shall take effect and be in force upon its passage and approval by the Mayor.

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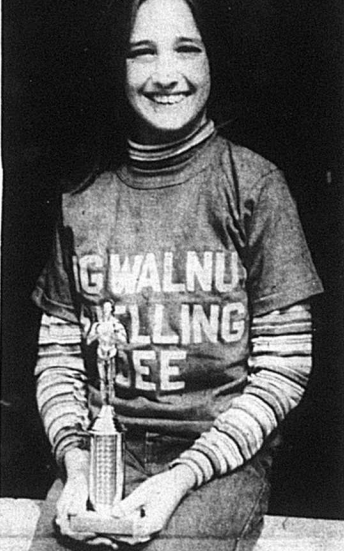
