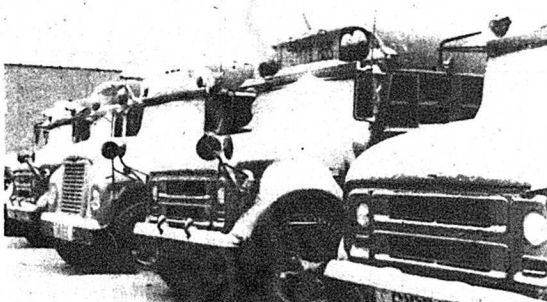

## Neighbor Appeals Variance

Neighbors to a proposed senior citizens housing complex in Sunbury filed a Notice of Appeal of a variance recently granted to the owners of the land.

Gary and Charlene Gilbert, 119 Stone St., filed their appeal this week in Common Pleas Court. The appeal is of a Jan. 25 decision by the Sunbury Regional Planning and Zoning Commission.

According to the suit, Gilberts are appealing the commission's decision granting Samuel P. Calabretta and his company, Tempo III, variances for setback lines and square footage requirements for the property at 122 Stone St.

Property in question is that which partially contained the former Greenwald Associates, Inc., business which burned in September, 1981.

# GOP Will Have Three Races in May

Newly elected Porter (two trustees) filed his petitions last week seeking the Republican nomination for the Delaware county Recorder's seat, making a race there as well as for the two commissioners' seats up for election in this May's Primary.

Thomas C. Thorne, 3646 Condit Rd., Centerburg, filed his petitions for the recorder's office, challenging incumbent Dorothy Conant in the Republican Primary. Deadline for filings for the Primary was last Thursday.

The recorder's race joins the two contests for the commissioners' seats on the May GOP ballot. As reported last week, John Schaefer, Powell and Kenneth Cressy, Delaware, will be vying for the seat being vacated by current commissioner Ken Reed.

And, Don Huddleston, Kibbourne, will be challenging incumbent Merle Law, Delaware, for his Jan. 3 term seat. One Democrat, Daniel J. McNamara, 2338 Cheshire Rd., Delaware, filed petitions seeking a commissioner's post. McNamara, who lost to Fay Parrott in the 1982 General Election, will face off against the winner of the Huddleston-Law race in this fall's election.

Two other Democrat candidates filed petitions last week. Kenneth D. Cox, 3246 S. Section Line Rd., Delaware, filed to run against incumbent Republican Joan Lawrence, Galena, for her 87th Ohio House seat this fall.

Current Judge Thomas E. Loudon, 1520 Marysville Rd., Delaware, filed to run for re-election as Probate and Juvenile Judge. Loudon will also be on the Democrat ticket in May.

Other incumbent officeholders whose term expires this year filed his petitions for re-election this past week. W. Duncan Whitney, 2500 Panhandle Rd., Delaware, is seeking another term as county Prosecuting Attorney, on the GOP ticket.

As reported last week, other current officeholders seeking re-election this year include: Common Pleas Judge Henry E. Shaw, Coroner Stewart H. Russell, Treasurer Madge L. Coklin, Engineer Fred L. Seults, and Sheriff William B. Lavery. All are Republicans.

Brown Has Only Levy

In other filings, elections director Nettie Lukas reports Brown (top) will have the only township levy on the May ballot, asking for renewal of a 4-mill road and bridge levy for five years.

Both Highland and Centerburg Schools have levies, of which the local board has been notified. Highland is seeking a 3.3-mill additional permit improvements levy for three years.

And, Big Walnut and Oentantey Schools both have levies in May. Big Walnut's is a 3-mill

continuing levy for operating expenses, and Oentantey's, a 4-mill permanent improvements levy to be collected for five years.

Committeemen File, Too

Mrs. Lukas also points out that Central Committee posts for both parties will be up for election in May in every precinct. "Actually, we have both Democrats and Republicans seeking committee-man posts in 53 precincts each, out of the 85 in the county. I think that's some kind of a record," Nettie adds.

Three precincts on this side of the county will have races for committeeman posts, as the filings show. In Trenton B. precinct, Sherman R. Conant, 152 Dent Rd., is being challenged by Maryanne Day, 733 S.R. 6055, for the Republican committeeman.

In Berlin B. Melinda D. Robinson, 222 S. 3 H's & K Rd., Galena, and Donald R. Ross, 2024 S. 1 B's & K, will be on the GOP ticket. And, in Berlin A precinct, Jennifer J. Schmidt, 1630 Dale Ford Rd., Delaware, and David B. Searies, 818 N. Old State Rd., Delaware, are seeking the Democrat central committee post.

Clerk Reports Car Titles Issued As Up

Delaware county Clerk of Courts Betty Porter reports figures showing sales of automobiles once again picked up last year following a bleak sales period in 1982.

According to her year-end report, Clerk Porter says the Title Dept. of her office issued 21,097 car titles in 1983, which represents 961 more than for 1982, but is still substantially lower than the 21,973 in 1981.

The clerk's office collected \$2,106,161.94 in sales taxes on motor vehicles last year, one percent of which is retained in the county. That figure is half million dollars more than in 1982 and 1981, but the office reminds that new procedures for reporting the sales tax on auto sales transactions, especially for used cars, is also responsible for the increase.

The office issued 896 boat titles last year.

Another seeming sign of a better local economy in 1983 was the fact that the Clerk of Courts legal dept. had over 300 fewer Certificate of Judgments filed than in the year prior. In 1982, the legal dept. filed 643 CJs compared to just 352 last year.

Total number of cases in the

Clerk's office was down last year, to 1,374 from 1,453 in 1982. Civil cases filed totalled 280, while 229 criminal cases were new to the court, and 333 divorce dissolution cases were filed.

Clerk's office processed 355 passports last year, 75 real estate licenses, issued 68 duplicate hunting licenses and processed 176 notary commissions.

Porter reports revenue taken in by her office in the form of fees paid into the county General Fund exceeded the expenses of her office by \$38,944 last year.

That figure compares with \$28,444 in 1982, and \$44,588 in '81.

Apr. 9 Is Voter Registration Deadline

With candidate filings complete but for possible write-ins, the Delaware county Board of Elections reports that voter registration is the next main deadline. Cut-off for voter registration for those wishing to vote in May will be Apr. 9, director Nettie Lukas says.

Lower photo shows the Big Walnut School buses, parked in the drifting snow at the garage on Sedgwick St. Classes were, of course, called off Tuesday, and again Wednesday, as crews worked to clean off county and township roads.

Most area businesses closed early Tuesday, as did government offices. As we all know, it got worse after the photos were taken. But once the sun came back out Wednesday and the winds subsided, we found we were a long way from being as bad off as the Blizzard.

Village, county and state highway crews worked a losing battle all day long and into the night, trying to keep arteries open from the drifting snow. But as evening wore on and Wednesday morning came, most area roads were at least passable, and many were in great shape.

In Sunbury, volunteers worked throughout the evening and early night keeping the roads open while regular town crews took a break. And, BSTAG firemen were available in cases of need.

Mayor Bob Reed reports that the auxiliary policemen Dwayne Wampler, Wayne Ross, Joe Shlad and Norm Nelson on the radio, helped Patrolman Gary Hall with patrolling and in case of emergency.

## Hartford Fair Will Have Some Changes

Hartford Fair Board has started preparations for the 125th Hartford Fair, says President John McDavid.

The fair will be held Aug. 6 through 11.

Fair board officers are: McDavid, president; Robert Griffith, vice president; William Arter, secretary; Larry Hughes, assistant secretary; and Stanley Hall, treasurer.

Some of the changes for this year's fair include a gate fee that will include admission to all board sponsored activities says McDavid. The fee will be \$3 per person, over age eight.

Night shows will include: Monday, motorcycle show; Tuesday, truck pull; Wednesday, demolition derby; Thursday,

auto thrill show and open horse show; Friday, mud wrestlers and Saturday, horse pull.

Policy for camping facilities will also change this year, says McDavid. He explained a permit will have to be submitted before July 31.

McDavid says the board is now deciding where improvements are needed for this year's fair. He also reports Kiddie Day will be every day from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. The fee will be \$3, which is not included in the gate admission.

Extra events are also being scheduled, such as a horse show pitching contest; tobacco spitting contest; homemaker demonstrations; a magician, as well as 4-H Band contests.

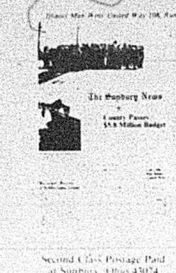

### WRITER EXPRESSES OPINIONS REGARDING BISTAG FIRE CHANGES

Dear Editor  
In regards to the letter in the Jan. 26 News concerning the fire board's suggestion to appoint a chief from out of the district, I am totally against this whole idea. When BISTAG has one of the better departments around, with none of its members being full-time firefighters in Columbus, Upper Arlington, and Sharon township, there seems to be no reason to get a man who is not even on a full-time dept or experienced what these men have experienced. I feel, and have heard, that getting a man from another department and appointing him as BISTAG's chief would be a put down to those members already on the department that are capable of this position. And that it would disturb the whole function of the department since this man would not know how this department functions.

One man on BISTAG that has shown interest for the position as chief and is capable of the job is Chris Catto. He has been on the dept for a number of years and is a full-time firefighter. He has had extensive training in this field and is an officer at the present time and he knows how the men want it to run. There would be no problem in the takeover since with Chris but a big disturbance could arise by bringing in another man.

Also I feel that the men and women on the dept. should have a large majority on the voting for chief, since they are the ones that will have to work with this decision that is made, not the board. The men on the board I feel are obtaining too much power for the position that they hold. They are not listening to the firefighters for their suggestions or ideas to better the dept. that they have. They are the ones out on the runs, working with the equipment, they know when something doesn't work or when it needs to be repaired. The board is there to listen to the firefighters and make a decision, not to think of their own ideas and make decisions.

We just passed a levy for the department and yet what have we seen. Yes, a used truck was purchased and one of the old engines repaired, yet still there is a lot of money still just sitting in the bank. The building needs repaired, trucks repaired and much of the equipment. The money is there, why not use it.

What the department really needs is to have the community's support. No hear 'you're suggestions, how you feel about the new chief possibly coming from a different department.

The department is there for the community - you pay to have it there, put in your ideas. Go visit the dept. sometime, meet the men and find out what they are doing for the community. Even try to go to one of the meetings and see how the board is working - give your suggestions. This is the 80's and we must function as so, not as if we are back in the 60's.

These are my opinions and I would like to hear yours, or stop by the department.

Harlem Twp. Names Dean Hoppe as New Fire Chief

Harlem Twp. trustees last Wednesday evening appointed Dean Hoppe, pictured above, as new fire chief.

Chief of the Harlem Twp. Fire Dept. Hoppe, 45, of 13543 Bievelsmeier Rd., becomes the second fire chief of the all-volunteer dept., replacing Bill Fling.

Hoppe, who had served as Fling's assistant chief since the Harlem dept. was formed in 1973, expected says there'll be "no drastic changes" in the way he runs the department. "We have a good bunch of dedicated guys and I have no problems with the way Bill ran it, and plan to keep things about the same."

Fling, last week, was appointed as the new chief of the BISTAG Fire Dept., replacing Acting Chief Bill Fisher, who'd been in that post since the end of 1982. Hoppe reports the Harlem roster presently totals 24, and the department has two pumpers and a tanker truck, grass truck, squad and its newest addition, the rescue truck, in front of which Dean stands (above). Chief Hoppe points out that the Harlem firefighters are not in the squad business, but "use it as a back up when the county emergency squad needs us."

As far as the rescue truck, Hoppe tells with pride how the men of the department have worked hard to put it together and equip it. "They paid about \$10,000 for the truck, itself, and

put the 'box' enclosure on the back themselves."

Hoppe says the rescue truck, besides having the 'cherry picker' platform as seen in the picture, also carries a portable power tool, air cascade system, cutting saws and other tools used for rescue operations.

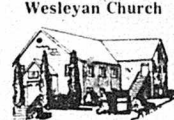

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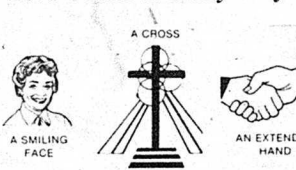

## Care to Share?

Its in the Meat Loaf!

If you or your family are tired of burgers, why not give this tasty loaf a try? Our daughter, Renee DeMint always receives compliments on this one.

**Empress Meat Loaf w/Mushroom Stuffing**

2 cans (10 oz) sliced mushrooms  
1/2 c. minced onion  
1/4 c. butter  
1/2 c. soft bread crumbs (cubes)  
2 1/2 lb. ground beef  
2 eggs slightly beaten  
1 1/2 tsp. salt  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
1/2 c. catsup  
1/2 c. mushroom broth  
1/4 c. minced parsley  
Drain mushrooms, reserve broth. Sauté mushrooms and onion in

butter until onion is transparent. Combine with bread crumbs and parsley. Lightly mix together ground beef, eggs, salt, pepper, catsup and mushroom broth. Pack half of the meat into 9"x5"x2 1/2" inch loaf pan. Pack stuffing on top, then remainder of meat. Bake in 375° oven, 1 hour and 15 minutes. Drain juices. Turn out onto serving plate. Serves 8.

For the inexperienced cook here is a simple little recipe. It makes just one serving and can be baked in your toaster oven if you wish.

**Beef and Bacon Loaf**

1 beaten egg  
2 T. milk  
2 slices bacon, crisp-cooked, drained, and crumbled  
1/2 c. soft bread crumbs  
1/8 tsp. garlic salt  
Dash of pepper  
1/2 lb. lean ground beef

In a mixing bowl combine the egg, milk, cooked bacon, bread crumbs, garlic salt, and pepper. Add the ground beef and mix well. Place meat loaf mixture in a 4"x2"x1 1/2" inch loaf pan. Bake in countertop oven at 350° till done, about 35 minutes. Drain off any excess fat, if necessary. Makes 1 serving.

This last recipe isn't really a loaf but it's a budget stretcher. Two pounds of beef can be transformed into a nutritious and satisfying entree for eight. Truthfully though, the main reason I make it is 'cause we like it.

**Florentine Beef-Noodle Bake**

2 lbs. ground beef  
1 medium-size onion, chopped  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. nutmeg

## 'Where's the Beef?'

1/8 tsp. pepper  
1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce  
2 pkgs. (10 oz. each) spinach, defrosted  
1/4 c. butter or margarine  
1/2 c. all-purpose flour  
2 tsp. salt  
3 c. milk  
1 pkg. (8 oz.) wide noodles  
4 cts. shredded cheddar cheese  
2 T. grated Parmesan cheese  
Calena

Lightly brown ground beef and onion in large skillet. Pour off drippings. Sprinkle 1 1/2 tsp. salt, nutmeg and pepper over meat. Stir in tomato sauce and cook slowly 15 minutes.

Chop spinach, pat dry on absorbent paper. Melt butter or margarine and blend in flour and 2 tsp. salt. Gradually add milk and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened.

Cook noodles in boiling salted water until just tender; drain and fold into white sauce. Place half the noodle mixture in the bottom of a 13x9-inch utility dish. Spread two-thirds of the meat mixture over noodles. Reserve 2 T. of the shredded cheese and sprinkle remaining cheese over meat.

Place spinach in a layer over cheese; top with remaining noodle mixture, distributing evenly, and top with remaining meat mixture.

Cover tightly and bake in a 350 deg. oven for 25 minutes. Remove cover, sprinkle with reserved cheddar cheese and Parmesan cheese. Continue baking 5 minutes; let stand 10 minutes, cut into serving-size pieces. Makes 8 servings.

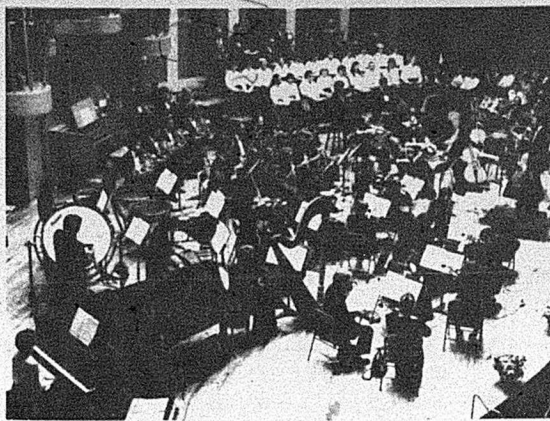

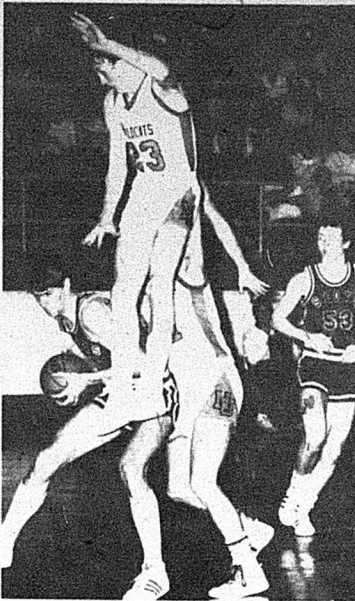






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Scots Keep NU 'Up In Air' During Tourney

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## Poultry Judging Is Explained By Member

by Eric Johnson

Big Walnut FFA annually forms a poultry judging team in the spring. This team practices for about a month prior to the actual contests. We practice judging under actual contest conditions.

The different divisions of a poultry judging contest are: grading eggs, both broken out eggs and the whole eggs, candling eggs, judging past production of hens, judging pullets, broiler carcasses, and a written exam.

To grade broken out eggs, one must examine the eggs as a consumer, to see if the eggs contain any blood or meat spots in them. One also must look at the egg whites and yolks to grade them like the USDA actually does.

To grade whole eggs, students examine the shells for excessive calcium deposits (bumps), and for off-color stains and/or marring.

Members grade live birds both past production hens and pullets, to determine which bird has or will probably lay the most eggs. Sometimes this is difficult, because it is relatively impossible to determine exactly how many eggs were laid.

Members grade carcasses to see if there are any missing parts or torn skin due to the processing of the birds when slaughtered. The written exam encompasses many aspects of the poultry industry, ranging from good laying hens, to questions about eggs.

This contest is set up to provide general knowledge on judging poultry, to marketing poultry products. This enables members to learn what poultry products look like so the consumers buy a quality product.

The members of this judging team are: Eric Johnson, captain; Frank Bink; and Joe Heil. Any FFA members are invited and encouraged to try out for an outstanding team. The team from last year placed second in the state and fourth at the Eastern Regional Contest in Springfield, Mo.

This year's first contest is March 3 at Marysville.

The next meeting will be Mar. 12, 5 p.m., at the Kingston Twp. Hall.

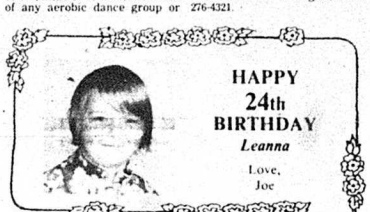
