Highland To Build New Jr. High

Highland Local Schools will be building a new Junior High building as voters Tuesday approved the district's 5.5-mill bond issue by 54 votes.

According to the Morrow county Board of Elections, the final unofficial tally showed 835 voting for the bond issue, and 781 against. In this county, Porter twp. voters showed their approval of the issue, 35-24.

The bond issue is to raise \$2.3 million over the next 23 years to build the new Junior High. The present building will then be used as an elementary.

The 5.5-mill levy will go on next year's tax duplicate, replacing the 4 mills currently being collected to pay for Highland's high school building. The high school will be completely paid for the end of this year.

Supt. Richard Van Horn Wednesday said the board is looking at a site "very close to the present high school" to build the new high school. Van Horn said more information on the actual building will be upcoming shortly.

Morrow county Elections office reports there may be a recount on the issue, depending on final figures from the official tallies to be made next week.

Lavery, Reed Win Nominations

CONDIT-MILLER COMMISSIONER RACE IS 'TOO CLOSE TO CALL'

Sheriff William Lavery and former county commissioner, Ken Reed, both swept their nominations to compete in this fall's election Tuesday.

On the Democrat ticket, only local contested race, that for county commissioner for the Jan. 2, is still just that - contested - as one vote difference separates Earl G. Condit, Genoa twp. and Thomas Miller, Delaware. Condit tallied 1,530, and Miller, 1,531.

Election results from the county's Tuesday Primary are still labeled "unofficial" and the Board of Elections is hoping to complete its official tally sometime next week. The one-vote difference in the Condit-Miller race could still change, and if the difference in the official tallies is still less than one-half of one percent, the loser could call for a recount.

Sheriff Lavery beat challenger

Columbus, led David Dowd, Massillon, in Delaware county voting, but the race was closer statewide as The News went to press.

REFERENDA QUESTIONABLE?

Local Voters Nix Three State Issues

Delaware counties voted down three of the four state issues on Tuesday's ballot, even though all four went down to defeat statewide.

Countians seemed to like the proposed amendment to redo the procedures for notifying voters of changes in charters, as the vote here was 5,446 yes, and 5,173 no. Statewide, the Charter issue went down to defeat.

County voters turned down the Electric Power Issue, 3-2, and the Housing Issue, 7-4. State issue 3, called the Highway Issue, more narrowly went down to defeat here, 5,055 yes to 5,919 no.

In local issues, Berkshire twp. residents vehemently defeated the zoning request of Dave Fox to rezone just under 50 acres south of Berkshire from farm residential to planned residential. Vote on that issue was 100 to 42, but the rezoning of the actual vote still remains to be seen.

Berkshire trustees, who originally okayed the rezoning last November, rescinded their approval just two weeks before the election. Even though it would seem that Tuesday's vote was actually moot, legal questions still are there as to whether Fox may try again in the near future.

In Orange twp., a one-vote difference agreed with Orange trustees that the rezoning request of Harold Schimmel should be approved. Schimmel is having just under 93 acres on S. Old State Rd. rezoned from farm residential to planned residential for a development. Orange voters approved the trustees' action, 298-295, in the unofficial tally.

Delaware county seemed to follow state-wide patterns in other races Tuesday. President Carter and Ronald Reagan received this county's nominations, as expected.

Voting turn-out was low, as the Board of Elections reports 45.4% of the total registered voters in Delaware county actually cast ballots Tuesday. Total of 72,272 persons voted, the 27,028 registered here.

County tallied 7,716 voting Republican, and 4,033 Democrat, with 523 persons voting on issues only. Those figures show just under 63% of those voting wanted GOP tickets, and just under 33% wanted Democrat ballots.

In Other Races

Sen. John Glenn walked away with his party's nomination to run for re-election this fall as a Democrat. And, on the GOP ballot, incumbent Larry Hughes, 66th district, led his two challengers for the Ohio House seat representing the southern half of Delaware county.

Only other race on the GOP ballot which seemed too close to call was that for Justice of the Ohio Supreme Court for the Jan. 2 term. George Rogers,

Board Decides To Sell Harlem Building

Big Walnut Board of Education, in regular session Monday night, voted after much discussion to sell the Harlem school building plus the two acres on which it is situated.

In that same motion, the board stated that anyone wishing to purchase the land south of the building must submit a separate bid.

In a second motion, members voted to sell the two lots north-west of the building, also. Total acreage is 4.9 acres, according to Dr. Richard Miller, superintendent.

Dr. Miller reported that out of 4000 surveys sent to people in the district about their wishes concerning the Harlem building, 210 were returned to the school. He said no real solid conclusions could be drawn from them but about 47% were for selling the building and about 52% were for giving it to Harlem twp.

Betty Wein presented the board with a petition signed by 45 persons, requesting the Harlem building be given to Harlem twp.

Patrol cited Kunze for failure to yield. He was not injured and his '76 Jeep sustained moderate damage. Agnew's '73 Olds was demolished.

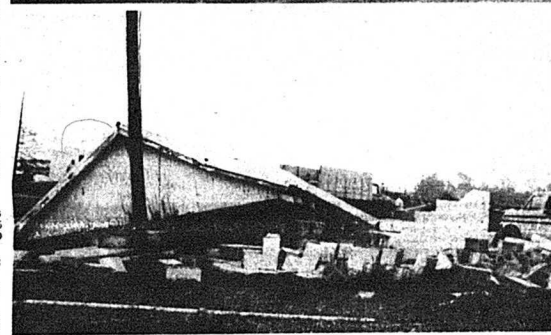
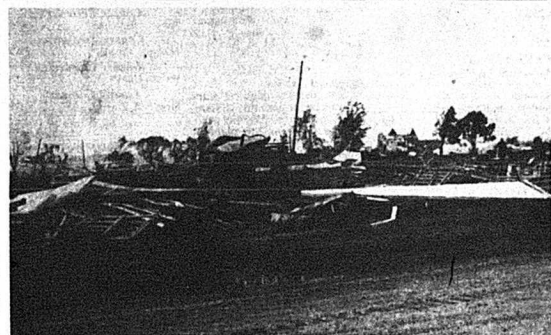

Drier Weather Aids Croton's Twister Clean-up

Drier weather Wednesday enabled clean-up and reconstruction efforts in tornado-torn Croton to really get under way in earnest.

Croton is still digging out from under the Sunday afternoon twister which left two homes destroyed and 14 others damaged, five persons injured, and a still undetermined amount of property damage to farm outbuildings and buildings at the Hartford Fairgrounds.

Fourth photo shows some of the debris dumped next to the pony building, with what's left of a recreation trailer in the debris.

Bottom photo shows Bill Hogue's dairy barn, on Clover Valley Rd., west of Croton. The tornado apparently touched down first at Hogue's, practically destroying his house and barn, before moving on east to Darby Gilmore's and the fairgrounds. Gilmore's house and barn were also destroyed.

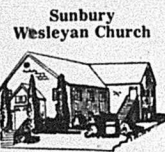

WHY A "TEMPORARY" FILLING?

Have you ever had your dentist tell you he was using a "temporary filling" and wondered why? No, my friend, it is not a ploy so he can get a second crack at you. This is a perfectly proper dental procedure.

It is referred to as "indirect capping", and is used in cases where the nerve (or pulp) would be exposed if all the decay were removed from the cavity. Regarded as a conservative treatment, the application of medicated cement in the temporary filling helps the pulp of the tooth to repair itself by containing the decay and slowing the buildup of a wall of tooth structure between the pulp and the decayed material.

This is a "holding action." When your dentist removes the temporary filling, he may take an X-ray to determine if the pulp has healed. If so, the balance of the cavity is removed, and a permanent restoration, or filling, can be placed in the tooth.

In summary, your dentist is trying to keep your tooth alive, avoiding the need for a root canal filling, pulp capping, or extraction of the tooth.

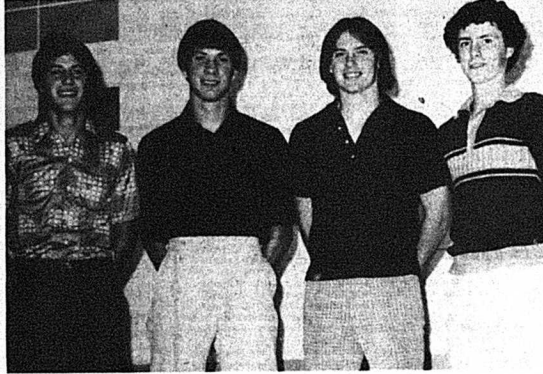

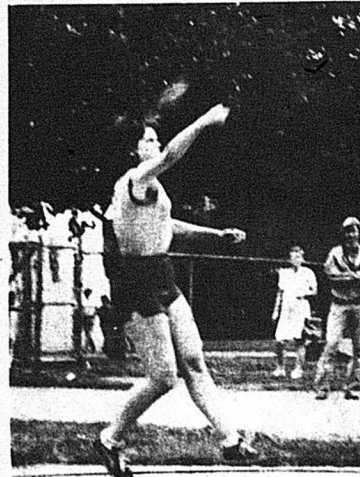

Northridge Supt. Resigns Position

Richard A. Unger has resigned his position as superintendent of Northridge Local Schools, effective July 31, when he will complete his second year with the district. Unger, a native of Dayton and a graduate of Northridge High School in Montgomery county, came to Licking county from Warren county, where he was principal of Little Miami High School in Morrow for five years.

Previous to this he served over 14 years as an administrator or a teacher, both in Ohio and South Carolina. He holds a master of education degree from Miami University and a BA and MA from Bob Jones University. He says he hopes to complete the Ed. S. this summer at Miami.

Unger will assume the position of superintendent of the Licking County Joint Vocational School in August.

In his letter of resignation, Unger thanked the Northridge board for their "exemplary sup-

port" of his efforts during the two years he worked with them. He commended the members for their "conviction and diligence in bringing about the achievements we have shared," and added he would always be in their debt for the opportunity to serve with them.

He urged the district to continue their efforts toward unity among the different communities served by the schools. "We have some very fine teachers and staff here who understand that it is no longer possible to push just for Alex or Hartford or Homer. They know if we succeed, it will be as the Northridge District."

Unger was less optimistic about the financial future of the system. "The future of the small rural consolidation with a declining enrollment does not look bright. Unless the board gets some help from a better funding system from the state, they will, of necessity, be going back to voters."
