**Dear Editor,**

The Village of Sunbury owns 35 plus acres of land that lies along the north side of State Routes 31 and 36 between State Route 51 and County Road 24 or North Old 3C road.

The village has been trying to get an access road from the Ohio Department of Transportation so that the beautiful wooded area can be used by the community for a park and picnic site.

We are going to need help from every organization in the entire community in every direction around Sunbury. We need the Officials of Sunbury supporting their petition for an access road. We need from every civic, fraternal, booster, church, garden club, senior citizens, FFA, FHA and any others not mentioned.

These letters are important and should be sent to Mayor Kintner in Sunbury. Letters from individuals will also be appreciated and will help.

Petitions have been prepared and we need volunteers to circulate these petitions for signatures. The petition forms will be available at Shaw's Drug Store, Bob's Barber Shop, Hoke's True Value-Store, Evans Insurance Office, George Keller's Insurance Office in Berkshire, and the mayor's office in Sunbury.

In order to complete this job quickly we have set the deadline for July 1, 1977 so we can assemble the material to be delivered to the state officials. This is Your Community and we do need your help and cooperation now.

Thirty years ago the State of Ohio planned to build a 4-lane highway on Route 3, and when

the New 3 was built it was made a limited access road. There is no access on Route 3 to the land owned by the Sunbury Village. Plans for the 4 lane road were discarded when Interstate 71 was built.

1 out of 5 miles of this "limited" access road remains "limited" from State Route 31 to the Knox Road. Sunbury has grown in every direction except along State Route 3 due to the "limited" access restrictions. These restrictions should be lifted and access rights should be returned to the landowners along State Route 3.

Sometimes ago we contacted Mr. Donald Olson, Chief of the Outdoor Recreation Services. He and he sent two men from his staff and we met with Mayor Kintner at the proposed park site. Following their visit we received a letter from Mr. Olson stating that they would welcome a development application for an Outdoor Recreation Project from the Village of Sunbury that included the development of a 20-acre reservoir just behind the proposed park area if the village could get the access road. Let's GET to work.

## Parks Board Plans Recreation Programs

Mrs. Marie Wilson, chairman of the Delaware County Metropolitan Parks Board announces plans for supervised community recreation programs for school children of the three county school districts.

The program will commence Monday, June 20th and run through August 2nd and will be held Monday thru Friday each week during this period. Locations for programs are as follows: Olentangy Elementary School, Playgrounds, Souders Elementary School (Big Walnut District), Valley Elementary (Buckeye Valley District), Kibbourne Elementary (Buckeye Valley District).

Times will be announced later. There is no charge for the

nine-week program, Mrs. Wilson says, and in the event of inclement weather activities will be moved into the school buildings. Mrs. Wilson also stresses no pre-registration is required. "Just bring the youngsters to the designated playground at the scheduled time." Playground supervisors will be employed thru the Delaware Manpower Office. C.E.T.A. program and will be under supervision.

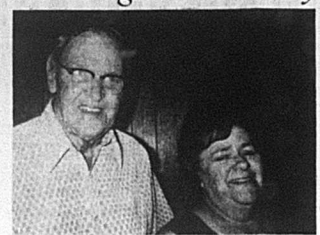

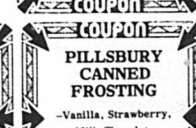

## Psycho-Social Drama Group Performs at Meeting

Those attending the annual meeting of the Delaware-Morrow County Mental Health and Retardation Board last week saw a performance by Jim Millon and his group who use a blend of drama, satire and music to teach about mental health.

Beginning with their "television game show" vignette which is designed to cause viewers to pause and think just where they are with their own lives, the group then moved into other subjects designed to demonstrate maximization of the use of mental health services.

The Columbus based group has traveled across the state presenting such topics as battered women, male/female role changes, abused children, communications between adults and children and worry. Employed by the Franklin County Mental Health and Retardation Board, they frequently use the psycho-

social drama to train staff, particularly those who work in children's services and drug-treatment programs.

During a brief business meeting held prior to the drama, new officers were elected. James Leslie was elected chairman and Robert Corder, vice chairman. John Tewari, center director, presented outgoing chairman, Robert Stephany, with a game from World Wide Games as a token of appreciation for his leadership during the past two years.

In remarks by Stephany on the progress of the board throughout the year, he highlighted the increased services provided by the contract agencies which include Central Ohio Mental Health Center—caseload 1,559; Help Anonymous—client contacts 1,458; and over 13,000 volunteer hours contributed to these agencies. Commenting on the board's de-

cision to place a 7 mill levy for mental health on the ballot in November of 1977, he noted that help from the United Way, coupled with several substantial one-time personnel contributions and realization of social security act reimbursement monies through a contract with Public Welfare Dept., temporarily rescued the board from severe curtailment of services after the failure of a first effort ever by the Board to pass a levy last November.

New appointments to the board this year include Douglas Dewar, M.D., Dale Lautenschlager, Howard Whiston and Louise White. Wilma Garverich has been appointed for a second term.

The group also heard a report of the Mental Health and Retardation Levy Campaign Committee from Jerome Donovan and Esther Simpson, emphasizing the growing demands for service.

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## FARM FACTS

## Now Is the Time To Clean the Grain Combine

By Robert Irvin, County Ag Agent

The grain combine should be cleaned up before this year's wheat harvest, said Delbert M. Byg, Extension agricultural engineer at The Ohio State University.

Combines that have been idle and in storage since last fall may have corn or soybeans remaining in various components of the machine. If these grains mix with the new wheat that is harvested, you run the risk of a market discount for foreign material and/or musty material when the grain is marketed, the engineer said.

A more serious problem, however, is the chance for rat and mouse droppings to be found in the machine, especially if the combine was not cleaned of all grain last fall. Rat and mouse droppings will not be tolerated in any wheat offered for sale or storage. Thus, if rodent excreta is found in a grain sample, the whole load will be rejected and not permitted in normal marketing channels.

Byg recommends the following combine cleaning procedure:

- 1) Move the combine from storage to a washing area where a high-pressure water hose can be used to flush out all components of the machine.
- 2) Remove all inspection covers from the machine.
- 3) Open the clean-out doors on the clean grain auger and the tailings auger.
- 4) Remove the cover from the draft roll in the grain tank.
- 5) Clean the stone trap. On some machines you will have to remove the feeder assembly to do this.
- 6) Use the high-pressure water hose to dislodge and flush all grains and debris from the combine. The water flushing method works well because the stream of water will dislodge material that may have become caked. Also, the flowing water carries the debris out of the machine. Pay particular attention to cleaning the riddle or conveyor area under the cylinder.
- 7) After the combine is clean

and the water has had a chance to drain out, start up the combine and let it run at half throttle for about 15 minutes. This will "air dry" the inside of the machine.

8) Replace all inspection covers and clean-out doors.

9) Lubricate all fittings with the recommended lubricant.

10) Reclean the combine each time you harvest a different crop.

11) Make sure you remember to clean and lubricate the combine before returning it to storage at the end of the season.

## Storage Increases Marketing

The marketing practices of farmers have changed considerably, depending upon the marketing facilities available to them says J. W. Sharp, agricultural economist for the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center.

Farm storage is one factor which greatly increases a farmer's grain marketing alternatives. Sharp conducted a study to determine the marketing practices used by farmers who had invested in 10,000 bushels or more of farm storage capacity and a grain dryer. He says these farmers have the maximum number of grain marketing alternatives. How they use them is important.

In conducting the Ohio farm storage analysis, a 10 percent sample was selected from the list of grain farmers in each Ohio county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office. Of the more than 16,000 questionnaires mailed, a total of 2,219 usable replies were received. Of these, 185 had 10,000 bushels or more of farm storage and a dryer.

These farmers represented most areas of Ohio where farm storage is an important part of the farm production program. Sharp says this group was sent questionnaires to determine the marketing practices of farmers with a significant amount of storage.

Probably the most significant finding deals with convenience during the rush of harvest. Farmers with storage listed convenience as the number one advantage of having farm storage and a dryer.

When grain is stored on the farm, market flexibility is improved and it is reflected in the methods of sale used. Farmers having more than 10,000 bushels stored more than 55 percent of their grain on the farm. Since a large percentage of these farmers have trucks, their market alternatives extended far beyond their local elevator. Price was the most important factor in choosing market location when selling the grain out of storage.

Sharp says very few farmers who had storage used the futures market or sold grain by delayed price. Their excess grain was either sold for cash at harvest, contracted in advance of harvest, or stored commercially.

## ASCS Reminds Farmers To Report Crop Acreages

Farmers who have planted corn or grain sorghum should report their acreage to the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) the earlier of the beginning of harvest, or Sept. 1. Report wheat, winter barley and spring barley acreage before harvest. Clyde Liming, chairman of the Delaware County ASCS Committee advises.

As in other years, producers, who want to furnish 1977 wheat production data for proven yield purposes, must report planted acreages no later than July 1. Farmers who have planted acreages of 1977-crop wheat, corn, grain sorghum or barley, and fail to report such acreage may be ineligible for program benefits in 1978, Liming says.

According to proposed legislation, if the Secretary of Agriculture declares a set-aside for 1978 crops, 1977 planted acreage could be used to determine set-aside requirements. ASCS employees will make random checks of farms to verify that acreage reports are accurate, Liming explains.

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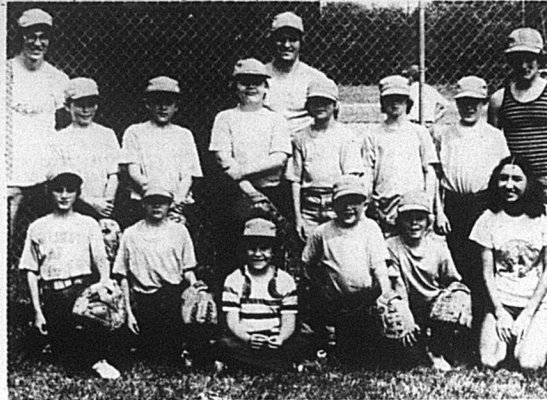

## New Farm Wheat Allotments May Be Established

A new farm wheat allotment may be established for 1978 crop wheat acreage for farms that did not have a 1977 allotment, if they meet eligibility requirements, and file an application at the county ASCS office at 29 Grandview Ave. in Delaware, announced Clyde Liming, chairman of the Delaware ASCS Committee.

A 1978 wheat allotment will be established automatically for most farms that had a wheat allotment in 1977.

To be eligible for a new farm allotment: (1) The operator must expect to receive more than 50% of his income from farming; (2) Neither the farm owner or operator may have an interest in any other farm which will have a 1978 wheat allotment at the time the request is made; and (3) The person making application must have had a least one year of wheat production experience in a prior year.

Applications for a new farm allotment may be filed at the county ASCS office on or before July 1, 1977.

Any interested producer who can meet these requirements should contact the county office before the final date for filing an application.
