## Police, Deputy Catch Suspect In Early Morning Break-Ins

**LITTLE LOOT TAKEN FROM LANDMARK ELEVATOR, HUB RESTAURANT, SUNBURY LUMBER COMPANY**

Three Sunbury places were broken into Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning and a Berkshire youth was taken into custody, confessing to the robberies and most of his loot was recovered, according to Sheriff Eugene Jackson.

Ricky A. Smith, 17, of Berkshire, was taken into custody by Deputy Phil Longshore early Wednesday morning after the deputy had found a power saw, stolen from the Sunbury Lumber Company, in his car. He confessed to the three robberies and told that he was alone when he broke into the three places.

Places broken into were the Landmark Elevator on South Vernon Street where about \$15 was taken from a coin box in the refrigerator, the Sunbury Lumber Company where a power saw was taken, and the Hub Restaurant where about \$75 and several cigarette lighters were taken.

Ralph Meeker, Sunbury policeman, and Deputy Longshore were watching a car roving around town early Wednesday morning and that led to the arrest of Smith who is being held in the county jail. Sheriff Jackson told the News that Smith contends that he was alone. The power saw and most of the money has been picked up.

Several Sunbury stores have been broken into recently and Sunbury police and deputy sheriffs have been working around the clock in an effort to catch the thieves.

## Stanley Loses Appeal at Canton

Fifth District Court of Appeals has upheld a Delaware County Common Pleas Court verdict against Charles L. Stanley, 39, of Redbank Road south of Galena, who was found guilty of carrying a concealed weapon by a county jury Oct. 1, 1968, and was sentenced to the Ohio Penitentiary by Judge O. W. Whitney, Jr. His attorney filed an appeal with the Court of Appeals in Canton next day and he was released on \$3000 bond.

Stanley was arrested Sept. 17, 1967, near his home on Redbank Road for possession of a rigged dice table by deputy sheriffs. He was freed of the dice table charge in Municipal Court when Judge Tom Clark said that the state failed to prove that Stanley was using the table for gain and the tables was returned to him.

Stanley was later indicted for carrying a .38 caliber revolver which a deputy sheriff saw him toss away when the dice table was picked up and he was charged with carrying a concealed weapon.

Stanley is expected to carry his case to the Ohio Supreme Court.

## Commissioners Approve Zoning During Busy Session Monday

Delaware county commissioners had a variety of business during their session Monday and took care of the following:

Mrs. Alda Skinner of Brown Tap was employed as Welfare Case Worker No. 1 to work in child welfare of the Delaware County Welfare Department. She will start to work July 16 at \$2.42 per hour.

Mrs. Skinner is the wife of Jay Skinner.

A resolution was passed requiring Delaware City to pay the \$3.00 for each inspection made by the county building inspector plus mileage for each trip.

Commissioners adopted a resolution to place a half-mile operating levy for the County Health Department.

## Court Arraigns Three; All Seek Probation

Three men were arraigned in Common Pleas Court Tuesday morning.

Gilman E. Bobb, 22, of Westfield, plead guilty to assaulting a service station attendant in Delaware with a gun but not guilty to shooting with intent to kill and assault with a dangerous weapon. He was taken into custody June 24 after resisting arrest by Delaware Police. His counsel H. Lloyd Jones asked that sentence be deferred until testimony from a Columbus physician familiar with Bobb's condition could be heard.

Judge O. W. Whitney, Jr., set bond at \$10,000 and sent Bobb back to county jail. His hearing is set for July 16 at 1:45.

Ronald Cabbage, 20, of Columbus, charged with the holdup of a Delaware service station June 18, was represented by Attorney Clyde E. Lewis and entered a plea of guilty to grand larceny on information to Prosecutor Henry E. Shaw but did not enter a plea to armed robbery. His counsel asked for probation and hearing on this was set for July 16 at 2:45. Cabbage is being held in the county jail on \$10,000 bond.

Gene White, 30, of Galena, indicted for assault with a deadly weapon, entered a plea of guilty and was released on his own recognizance after an application for probation was filed with the court.

## Vo-Ag Teachers Complete OSU Workshop

Big Walnut Vocational-Agricultural teachers, Gary Bauer and Gary Hambauer, have completed a three-week workshop at The Ohio State University.

Both received six hours of graduate credit toward their masters degree by successfully completing course requirements.

Bauer studied occupational experience programs and curriculum planning and Hambauer studied methods and principles of vocational education. Workshop participants were 150 vo-ag teachers from across the state.

Both Big Walnut teachers will attend a vo-ag teachers summer conference at the Ohio State University, July 8-10.

## Olentangy Hires Superintendent, Six Teachers to Complete Faculty

Olentangy Board of Education has employed Evan D. Belville as superintendent of Olentangy School District by unanimous decision and hired six additional teachers completing the teaching and administrative staff for the district.

County Superintendent Smith Ryan and the Board of Education screened 51 applicants for the position of superintendent of the school system and President Robert Curmode, on behalf of the Board of Education, stated that the Board is most happy to be able to secure such a well qualified man for superintendent of the school.

Mr. Belville comes to Olentangy from Northmor School District at Galena where he has been superintendent for the past five years. He has his AB degree from Ohio Wesleyan University and MA from Marshall University. He also has completed graduate work at Ohio State University.



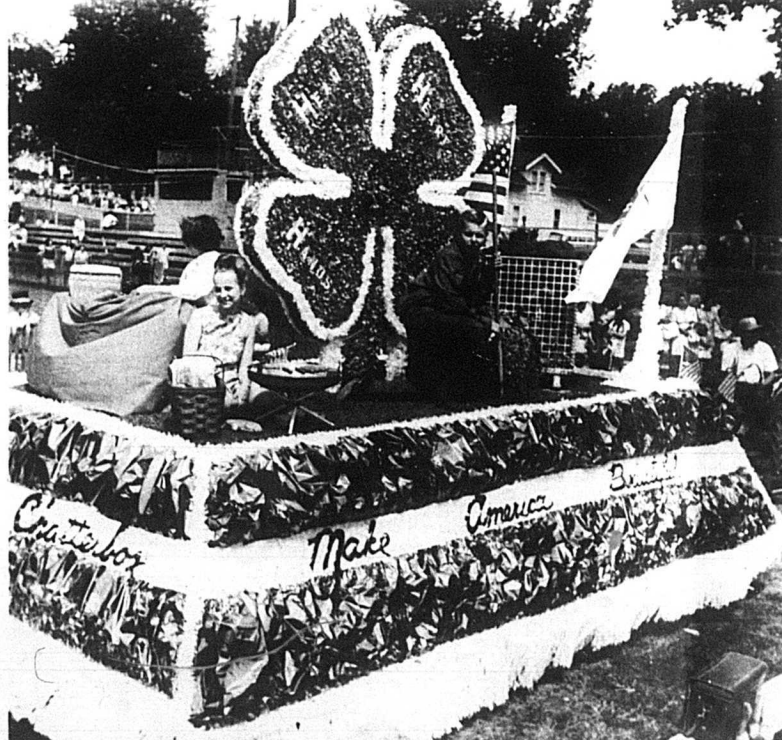

dit Chatterbox 4-H and the Condit Livestock 4-H clubs. The trophy for the winner was given by The Del-

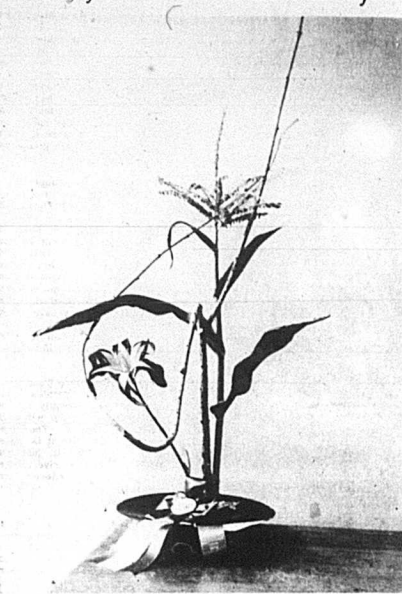

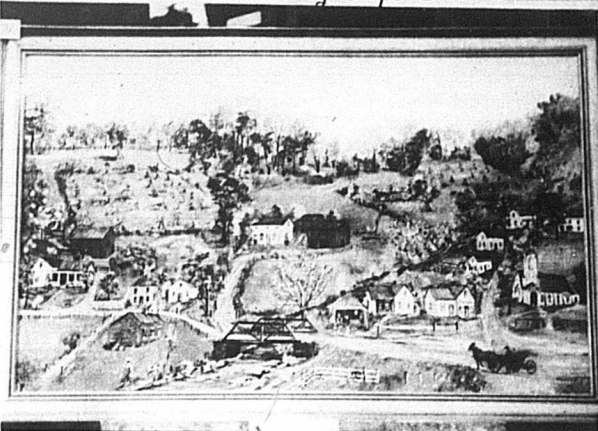

Cream together sugar and oleo. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Add chocolate syrup. Sift together dry ingredients and add. Bake in greased and floured pan at 350 degrees for 20-25 min.

## Icing

1 stick butter

1 stick oleo

1/2 c. shortening

1 c. confectioners sugar

3 T. flour (heaping)

2 T. sugar

1 c. milk

Whip the first four ingredients together. Cook the last three ingredients together until consistency of mashed potatoes. Cool and add to whipped mixture.

## Repeat on Dilly Bread

Mrs. Hallie Day sold some Dilly Bread at a recent bake sale. Some of the women asked her to have the recipe printed. We did run this recipe several months ago but perhaps you missed it and so we will repeat.

## Dilly Bread

1 pkg. yeast

1/4 c. warm water

1 c. creamed cottage cheese (warmed)

2 T. sugar

1 T. instant onion

1 T. butter

2 T. dill seed

1 t. salt

1/4 t. soda

1 unbeaten egg

2 1/2 c. flour

Soften yeast in warm water. Combine in mixing bowl cottage cheese, sugar, onion, butter, dill seed, salt,

soda, egg and yeast. Add flour to form a stiff dough beating well after each addition. (For first addition of flour, use mixture at low speed.) Cover. Let rise in warm place, 85-90 degrees, until light and double in size, about 50-60 min. Stir down dough. Turn into well greased 8 inch round casserole, 1 1/2-2 qt. size. Let rise in warm place until light, 30-40 min. Bake at 350 degrees 40-50 min. until golden brown. Brush with soft butter and sprinkle with salt. Makes one loaf.

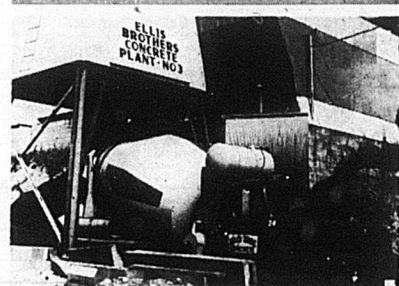

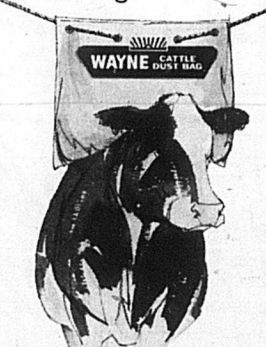

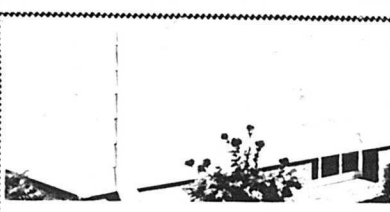

## County Farmers Receive Early Program Payments This Week

Farmers who have contributed to stabilizing markets for food and fiber and to the conservation of soil and water resources by taking part in the 1970 wheat and corn programs are receiving their program payments earlier this year than ever before, according to Earl Ward, chairman of the Delaware County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

The first batch of payments were made July 6.

"Because of the excellent cooperation between farmers and their local ASCS office, 50 percent of the participating producers in Delaware county will receive their payments on or about July 20," says Ward.

Farm program payments help maintain a balance between supply and demand, the chairman explained. He pointed out that both farmers and consumers benefit from this balance.

"Agricultural productivity almost doubled in the 1960's, but farmers' markets take only a third of this increase," Ward says. This means we need new markets.

Farm program help us hold down farm production and maintain farm income until new markets are developed and old ones expanded.

## Must Avoid Surprises

Things should be avoided. They are costly in tax dollars and are wasteful of food and fiber.

Farm programs help farmers make adjustments in their individual farming operations that in the long run will result in more farm income from the marketplace and less from the public treasury.

Since farmers are \$50-billion-a-year purchasers of goods and services produced in our cities and rural towns, the workers and busi-

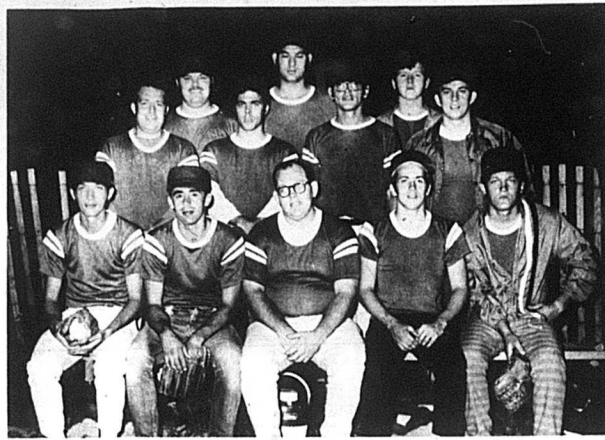

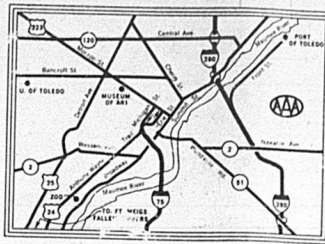

One of the nation's best art museums, a fine zoo, a busy lake port and major historical sites under restoration are included in a tour of Toledo and area that should satisfy all touring appetites.

If you are in town Aug. 23-30, you also can enjoy the German-American community festival at Raceway Park (U.S. 24, north). Celebrated an early Octoberfest, it features a German menu, entertainment, folk dancing and other activity, all on tent-dotted grounds. Toledo's Museum of Art is rated as one of the nation's 10 best and has outstanding works of art, especially glass, a reflection of the city's claim as the world's "glass capital". There are over 40 galleries, many with pushbutton in-

formational recordings. Hours are 9-5 Tuesday through Saturday, 1-5 Sunday, Monday and holidays. Free. Activity at the port area will interest young and old alike. One of the busiest on the Great Lakes, the port has an observation deck which takes visitors within several hundred feet of the docks where they may see "Big Lucas," the huge gantry crane, in operation.

The zoo is one of the largest, most complete municipal zoos in the nation. Especially outstanding are the children's area, the Museum of Science and Natural History, and the aquarium. Open 10-5 daily. Admission charge; under 12 years, free. Saturday free to all.

The University of Toledo campus offers outstanding examples of Gothic architecture as well as the 200-foot Tower of University Hall which is equipped with electronic chimes.

Historical sites in the area include Fort Meigs, under major restoration, on U.S. 25, where, in 1813, General William Harrison's army withstood a siege by the British and Indians in a key War of 1812 encounter. Nearby on U.S. 24, the Fallen Timbers where General Anthony Wayne defeated the Indians in the area to white settlers. Both sites have historical monuments; Fort Meigs includes a military cemetery.

The AAA Club suggests this routing to the tour area: From Sunbury go northwest on Ohio Route 37 to Jct. of US 23 in Delaware, north on Ohio Route 15 to Jct. with I-75, north on I-75 to the tour area.

## County United Appeal Adopts Record '71 Budget

The Board of Directors of the Delaware County United Appeal has agreed to admit two new agencies to the organization in January, 1971, and to accept a budget of \$135,000 for next year.

At a special meeting of the Board July 1, the Directors accepted a proposal from UA's Budget & Admissions Committee to admit the Senior Citizens and the Council for the Retarded as member agencies of Delaware County's United Appeal. The admission of these two agencies increases the number of member agencies in UA from 12 to 14.

The Budget & Admissions Committee also recommended that a total budget of \$135,000, which includes proposed allocations to the two new agencies, be adopted for 1971. Col. Albert C. Weidenbusch, the 1971 campaign chairman, said that the \$135,000 represents the actual needs of Delaware's UA member agencies and that raising the money is a "community obligation."

Col. Weidenbusch said that responsibility for the 1971 campaign begins with the UA's Board of Directors, the 14 member agencies and their boards, and the Drive Team itself. He said, however, that the UA organization and the agencies cannot meet the obligation alone. They must have the cooperation of every citizen in Delaware county.

Col. Weidenbusch said that the 1971 campaign, which will be held this fall, will emphasize "fair share" giving by means of payroll deductions or quarterly pledges. He listed the campaign divisions and pointed out areas which he feels are capable of increasing their levels of giving.

The special meeting of UA's Board of Directors was called at the request of the Budget & Admissions Committee which is charged with the responsibility of recommending allocations of funds to participating agencies.

Mrs. Warren Bailey is serving as chairman of the committee this year. Beginning in May, the committee has

received the proposed 1971 budgets of all member agencies and has been in touch with agency representatives. On the basis of its budget studies and interviews, the committee recommended that UA raise \$135,000 during its 1971 campaign. Mrs. Bailey said that the committee believes this amount is required to permit the 14 agencies to carry on their work in Delaware county.

Members of the committee are Mrs. Warren Bailey, World Wide Games; Mrs. Howard VanBeest, Robert D. Evans, 1st National Bank; Jerry Heston, Don Zerbo, Associated Insurance; Mrs. Robert Holt, Jack Seybold, Barber and Builder; Jack Mitchell, Accountant, PPG Industries.

George Ashman, president of UA, presided during the meeting, which was held at the London Branch of the Delaware County Bank. He paid a special tribute to past and present members of the Budget & Admissions Committee. He called them the "hard-working" group of the organization, who work long hours each year evaluating agency budgets and audits, while checking agency programs against community needs. Mr. Ashman said that members of the committee fill a necessary "watchdog" role not only for United Appeal but also for the community.

The budget allocations recommended by the committee for each agency and accepted by UA's Board of Directors are the following:

Red Cross, \$36,112; Liberty Community Center, \$10,128; Council of Social Agencies, \$8,118; Speech & Hearing Center, \$8,500; Mental Health Association, \$5,335; Mental Health Clinic, \$9,500; Children's Home, \$3,500; Boy Scouts, \$14,400; Girl Scouts, \$10,200; Dental Fund (tentative), \$3,600; Salvation Army, \$8,000; USO, \$1,425; Senior Citizens, \$2,000; Council for the Retarded, \$2,400; UA Office and campaign, \$10,200. Total, \$135,000.

**ORDINANCE NO. 582**  
AN ORDINANCE TO AUTHORIZE THE EMPLOYMENT OF SPECIAL COUNSEL TO PREPARE AND SUPERVISE PROCEEDINGS REQUIRED FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$200,000 SEWER IMPROVEMENT NOTES AND TO RENDER THEIR APPROVING OPINION UPON THE ISSUANCE AND DELIVERY OF SAID NOTES. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE Council of the Village of Sunbury, Delaware County, Ohio:

Section 1. That the law firm of Squire, Sanders & Dempsey, Cleveland, Ohio, municipal bond attorneys, be employed by this Village as special counsel for the purpose of preparing and supervising the proceedings of this Village required for the issuance of \$200,000 Sewer Improvement Notes and the rendering of an approving opinion thereon.

Section 2. That for the services so to be rendered by said law firm a fee of \$325 shall be paid by the Village, which sum it hereby appropriated and set aside for such purpose, and the Clerk of this Village is hereby authorized and directed to make appropriate certification as to the availability of such funds and to issue an appropriate order for the payment of said fee as the same shall become payable.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
