



County Election Board Reorganizes

Pictured with Brown above are board member, Dave Staley, his wife, Pat, and Tom Ryther. Staley and Ryther were reappointed to the board by their respective parties to serve four-year terms on the elections board.

Staley and Francis Mahoney represent the Democrat Party on the board, while Ryther and George Hoffman are the Republican members.

The local board reorganized Tuesday night, electing Hoffman, chairman and Ryther, vice-chairman, for the next two years. Dorothy Woldorf, a Democrat, will be the director during that same time, while Virginia Sheets, Republican, will be her deputy.

The board Tuesday approved all five candidate petitions for incumbents who have filed for re-election this year. They include Common Pleas Judge Henry Shaw, Jr., Probate Judge Paul Barrett, Clerk of Courts Betty Porter, Auditor Dave Thomas and Commissioner Jim Whitney. Board also approved a local option issue for the Primary ballot in Porter twp. Deputy Virginia Sheets says voters in both Porter precincts will vote on whether the Big Walnut Golf Club, SR 61, can sell liquor by the glass and on Sundays. Bruce Biddle, owner of the club, filed for the option vote.

Board also awarded the bid for 1974 Primary and General Election supplies to National Graphics, Columbus, for \$7,420.20. Dayton Legal Blank, Dayton, and Fred Proctor Co., Cincinnati, were the other two bidders on the supplies.

Other possible alternatives include keeping things as they are with Sunbury Elementary and the Middle school overcrowded, Opening Harlem as an alternative Middle School at an approximate cost of \$75,000 to \$100,000, or to convert Galena into a 6th grade while moving the elementary students to Souders.

The public hearings will be held on Tuesday, Mar. 28 at 7 pm at Souders and Thursday, Mar. 30 at 7 pm at Sunbury Elementary. After polling the community, teachers, and staff, the board

BW Board to Discuss School Overcrowding

SETS PUBLIC MEETINGS TO GET OPINIONS FROM COMMUNITY

Big Walnut Board will hold public meetings this month to get community feelings on school overcrowding.

At the meeting Monday, night, Superintendent Richard Miller outlined four possible plans to alleviate the overcrowded conditions at the Middle school and at Sunbury Elementary.

The plans Dr. Miller deemed most feasible would hold the three present 5th grade classes at Souders to become 6th graders there. This plan will relieve the Middle school and keep Galena Elementary free for extra students from Sunbury.

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The board voted to pass a resolution commending the boys and girls' basketball teams and coaches for their playing skill and conduct during the 1977-78 basketball season.

In other action the board: —Hired Thomas Peyton as head girls' track coach at \$600; and Barbara Jean Peier as substitute bus driver.

—Granted leave of absence for maternity to Donna Compton and Donna Anderson.

—Adjusted contracts for Lois Baby to \$9937; Patsy Jenkins, \$9796 and Donna Rentier, an increase to \$6437.

—Adjusted contract error for Donna Rentier and granted her back pay of \$923.

—Approved Tasha Blair for home tutoring beginning Feb. 15.

—Accepted a \$50 gift from the CCL to be used for library books for the Sunbury Elementary library.

—Adopted the Akron Board of Education Resolution on Funding. This resolution does not ask for income tax or property tax specifically, but does ask the funding be equitable. The resolution also asks for funding for state mandated programs.

—Requested the superintendent to investigate some type of visual award system to honor students

with high academic standing. William Richardson, board member, initiated the idea, and suggested something along the lines of letters given to athletes.

Vandals Enter Middle School Over Weekend

Vandals broke into the Big Walnut Middle School, on the southern edge of Sunbury, sometime over the weekend, according to Policeman Larry Mettler.

Mettler said two subjects apparently broke into the building through a rear door. They forced their way into the outer part of Principal Tom Hannon's office, and vandalized three vending machines there and in the teacher's lounge.

The Sunbury policeman said they also took an amplifier, valued at \$140, as well as looted about \$5.00 in change from each of the machines.

Treasurer Tops Collections Here Wednesday

County Treasurer Madge Conklin reports she collected \$40,965.88 in collections of first half real estate taxes in Sunbury Wednesday.

Madge says that figure sets a new record for her semi-annual visit to Sunbury, and noted the figure climbs almost every time.

The Sunbury total brings her countywide total to nearly \$1.5-million so far for the property taxes. Deadline for collections is Mar. 20.

Her office, in the courthouse in Delaware, will be open this Saturday and next, 8:30 a.m. till noon, for collections of taxes.

Sounders Heads County CETA Funding Program

Central Ohio Rural Consortium director Hylen Sounders to head the Delaware office of the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) program this week.

Sounders, who retired last spring after 16 years as the head at Big Walnut, started working Wednesday in the Delaware office at 45 N. Washington St., Newark office, which oversees the federal manpower program in Delaware, Licking and Perry counties, says Sounders' replacement Jack Swigart who resigned the CETA post last November. He was hired in the \$12-14,000 classification, the office says. CETA is a federally funded job program designed to aid unemployed and underemployed persons. County Commissioner Jim Whitney represents this county on the consortium board. Sounders and his wife, Iva, live at 1990 S. Galena Rd., Galena.

Vandals Enter Kilbourne School

Vandals broke into Brown School in Kilbourne over the weekend, doing some damage and stealing two fire extinguishers.

Brown Principal Grace Huddleston found the entry Monday morning when she got to school. The vandals had broken through a gym door, and then broke the glass in her office door to get in there. One had apparently been cut by the door, according to Dep. J.W. Lahmon, investigator.

Mrs. Huddleston said a small clock was taken from her desk, in addition to the extinguishers. She gave no damage estimate to the deputy.

Health Commissioner May Echoes Immunization Warnings

Delaware City-County Health Commissioner Dr. Lloyd May echoed federal health officials Monday in pointing out the difficulty of immunizing children against pre-schoolers without parental understanding of the problem.

Dr. May was giving his annual report to the Delaware City-County District Health Advisory Board as representatives from each of the local political subdivisions in the county met in Delaware.

"Much of the enforcement of immunization results from the

school immunization law," Dr. May said "since practical enforcement of immunization under school age is very difficult."

"This situation could leave many small children unimmunized unless parents understand the importance of and take the initiative to provide their children immunizations on the earliest recommended schedule," he continued.

Dr. May noted that with the U.S. Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare's announcement of attaining a 90% goal by October, 1980 of children immunized against the common childhood diseases, more federal funds have become available for vaccine purchase.

"We are feeling good effects from this as the Ohio Dept. of Health starts channeling more vaccine to the local departments," he said.

"Federal health officials estimate that approximately 20 million children in the United States, 14 years of age or younger, have not been adequately immunized," Dr. May continued. "This means that there is adequate immunization in only 61% of children this age."

The district health commissioner said there is no financial reason parents should postpone immunization. "Immunization through our weekly clinic

is available free of charge."

That clinic meets each Thursday afternoon, from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m., and Dr. May adds the health department does require parent or guardian permission signatures for all children being vaccinated. He says the department also requires a physician's referral for children under one year old.

The local health department offers immunizations for diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, measles, rubella, mumps and polio, given in schedules recommended by medical authorities.

"We stopped giving routine smallpox vaccine several years ago, but keep a small amount on hand as some foreign countries require immunization for persons wishing to travel there."

Dr. May also pointed out that the single measles vaccine has been readily available now than has been in the past, giving the health department better coverage in the ten to 18 age group.

"Previously we limited the use of the available measles-rubella vaccine to a maximum age of ten, because of the possibility of exposure of pregnant females to the rubella vaccine."

Dr. May summed up the local department's emphasis on immunizations the past year by

Dr. Miller Gives Plans To Handle Energy Crisis

Dear Parents

We are receiving many questions concerning our plans for handling an emergency created by a lack of electrical energy. There are many unknowns at this time, so we are trying to develop responses to many possible happenings. We will try to give you some of the "if" situations, and our responses.

—If we get two hour rolling blackouts, then we will assess the situation. Darkness, heat loss, and time of day will determine if we will close the schools at that point. If we close, we will alert bus drivers, and begin taking students home in the regular afternoon sequence with the Middle School first and then the High School and Elementaries.

—If Souders Elementary is the only building reduced by 50%, then we will go to a four hour school day from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. at Souders only.

—If after two or three days we can't meet the reduction at Souders, then we will begin a schedule with the following hours:

8:00 - 12:00 Sunbury Elementary at Sunbury.

8:00 - 12:00 Galena Elementary at Galena.

9:00 - 3:00 High School and Middle School.

1:00 - 5:00 Souders Elementary at Sunbury.

—If we are asked to reduce all buildings by 50%, then we will run four hour elementary days and a five hour high school day. These are our plans as of March 8, 1978. Changing conditions might force us to change these plans. We will try to give as much warning as possible before implementing any plan. We ask that you remain alert for any possible changes.

Fred George Named To Sunbury Council

Fred George, 84 N. Columbus St., is the new member of Sunbury Village Council as result of action last Wednesday night at the regular twice-monthly meeting of the group.

George was chosen by the other five council members he will join, filling the seat vacated last month by Randle Hughes. George's term will run through December of 1979.

He has lived in Sunbury for three years and spent another three years in the area. He is employed at the Continental Office Supply Co. in Columbus.

Two candidates appeared before council for an interview. Included were George and Greg Hamm of Sunbury Gardens. A letter was read from another candidate, Bob Reed, who was out of town on business. Gene Sparks was the fourth resident available for the post after Lowell Mullins withdrew his name.

Mayor Harold Kintner told council he is working with other village board members in Delaware County in attempting to set up emergency stations in the area. He said the Sunbury United Methodist Church appears to be the first choice for one in the immediate Sunbury area.

Clerk Becky Jo Hayes said Dr. Carl Goodshall has agreed to be coordinator for the emergency related group.

Mayor Kintner also showed council one of the identifying kits the Sheriff's Department and the Sunbury Police are attempting to have each home owner buy. The kits, distributed by Ohio Farm Bureau and Nationwide, sell for \$1.50.

Other business included the price of materials for a new village salt shed from Street Superintendent Bob Corwin. Kintner said this price did not include the poles necessary for the construction.

Councilman Frank Linnabary said it was reported to him the State Highway Department is planning to give up their garage in Sunbury. If they are not going to maintain a facility here, maybe we should look into buying it.

Mayor Kintner said that facility would be the answer to village storage problems for many years. "The truck height for dumping is the only question," he said. He told council he would check into the availability of the site and report back.

Several prices were given on generators and council talked at length about the buildings where they would be needed in case of an emergency. The matter was later tabled.

The village pay scale was also discussed and tabled until the next meeting. Wednesday, Mar. 15.

Police Charge Columbus Man For Hit-Skip

Sunbury Police arrested a Columbus man and charged him with hit-skip Tuesday night after an incident on the south side of the square.

Patrolman Gary Henthorne reports he arrested Michael Stanley, 19, about 9:30 p.m. after he apparently drove his car left of center and struck a truck parked along the north side of E. Granville St. The truck belonged to Ron Boston, Marengo.

Henthorne says a witness saw the accident, and told police the car went south toward Galena. Police pursued and saw it pull into Jack's Body Shop lot on the north edge of that village, where they arrested Stanley.

He is to appear in Municipal Court Friday in Delaware to face the charge.

Post Offices Shorten Hours On Saturdays, Too

Sunbury and Galena Post Offices are cutting back Saturday hours, too, in the face of the coal miner's strike and electricity crisis.

Postmasters Bill Smith and George Hogg report windows at both offices will be open only two hours on Saturday, from 9 a.m. till 11 a.m., even though the lobbies will remain open from 6:30 a.m. till noon.

The Saturday cutbacks are in addition to daily hours being cut back half hour by the post offices last week. Mail pick-ups at the offices are all half-hour earlier than usual, again to conserve energy.

Ed Foster's wrestlers also did extremely well, winning a first-ever sectional title for the school in his first year here. They were 5-0 in dual matches for the season. And in looking back to last fall we had a great football and golf team. First-year coach Jim McKenna took his team to a third place finish in

the CBL, losing the final game while costing the championship. However, they finished with an excellent 5-2 league, 7-2 overall slate. And first-year coach Dean Duffey's golf team won the sectional, took second in the district (and CBL) while finishing seventh in the state. Bill Borchers had his hand in the golf team's success, as he did in the basketball team. He led the cagers in scoring with a career high game of 31 against West Jefferson and a great 29 points in the sectional title game against Licking Valley. He was honored as the Co-Player of the Year for District 11 while being named to a first team position. Last week he was named to second team All-District. Borchers without a doubt will also be named to the All-CBL squad when it is announced next Monday night at the league meeting at Bexley.

Bill was also All-MOC first team last year in basketball and in baseball. His golf honors extend even further, starting back when he was a freshman. He was the sectional medalist last fall with a 70 and two years ago also was medalist as his team won the sectional. He has broken his own school record several times and leaves a 31 for future players to shoot at. Truly quite an athlete and we're going to miss him. . . . 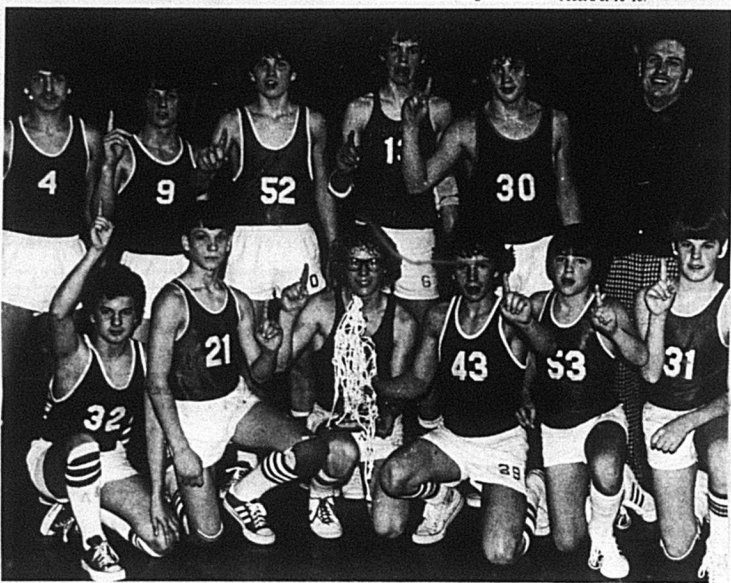

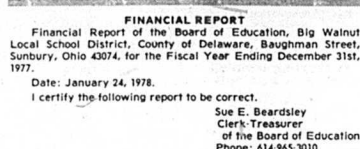

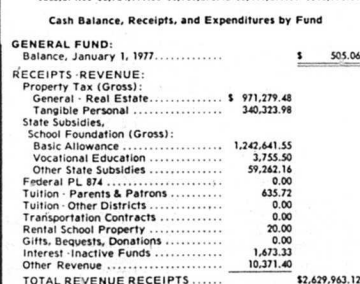

LEGAL NOTICE

DELAWARE COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH REGULATION GOVERNING INSTALLATION OF HOUSEHOLD SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEMS IS CHANGED AS FOLLOWS:

Change Section (HE-29-2) as follows:

(H) Lots on which household sewage disposal systems for dwellings are to be installed shall be of suitable topography and area to permit compliance with regulation HE-29-01 to HE-29-20 of the Ohio Code as herein amended. The minimum lot size shall be one acre exclusive of easements and rights-of-way with minimum frontage width of 150 ft. Variance from this lot size and width may be granted by the Health Commissioner in subdivisions approved before March 15, 1978, for reason of undue hardship.

HE-29-03 (E) is changed to read as follows:

(E) Any new subdivision of more than four lots will not be approved without a central sewage collection and disposal system. The new subdivision without a central sewage system shall be separated in all directions by undeveloped land equal in size and dimensions to those of the new subdivision or by a dedicated public highway.

Add HE-29-03 (F) which reads as follows:

(F) Exception to the separation requirements of HE-29-03 (E) may be permitted at the discretion of the Health Commissioner providing the following conditions are met.

(1) The new subdivision contains no more than two lots with each lot at least two acres in size exclusive of easements and rights-of-way or no more than four lots each being at least three acres in size exclusive of easements and rights-of-way.

(2) On site inspection indicates each lot can accommodate an individual home sewage disposal system incorporating appropriate leaching provided for in HE-29-11.

These changes will be effective on and after March 15, 1978.
