began running from Mt. Vernon to Columbus stopping halfway to Sunbury. Each day the coaches met near Galena bringing the news from both directions. In 1822 Dustin decided to build an inn to rest the weary travelers. To be competitive he offered hot baths in a bathhouse behind the inn and a horsekeeping service. After a bath, food and a night's lodging one could complete the journey with fresh horses leaving the inn at 6 a.m. for the next day. He would care for the animals until the owners made the return trip and then exchange again. The inn is made of bricks surrounded from clay locally. The windowsills and floorboards made from trees found on the property. Some of the visible floorboards in the attic are a full 18" wide. Beams and the old unfurnished bricks make the attic exciting to those studying building techniques. Four chimneys show the location of fire-

places and ovens. Mrs. Walter Linnaberry recalls living in the inn when it was owned by Nathan's son, John. During the four years the Linnaberry's lived in the south half of the inn, John and Hannah Dustin celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. Mrs. Linnaberry remembers them as a delightful and easy-going couple. One story which has delighted Mrs. Linnaberry's family was in regard to a "One morning Grandpa and Grandma Dustin (as fondly called them) were eating breakfast when I told them I smelled smoke. John Dustin told me it was time to turn back now. Upon investigation, it was the beam of the house above the oven all glowing coals and the house was burning. The Dustin waited until breakfast was over to turn back about the first time. Of course, they extinguished the fire without a great deal of damage to anything but Mrs. Linnaberry's nerves."

The Dustin Inn remained in the family until 1955 when Dr. and Mrs. L. W. B. Bissell, who had moved to the inn in 1948, sold it to the youth whose body was found near Johnnycake.

Department for motor vehicles.
Mrs. Porter will have to run for
re-election in November, 1978. If she wishes to continue
the job. State law says that the
Republican Central Committee
can force her to step down if
she is unable to serve until the next
General Election in which a
candidate is elected.

In other business of the com-
mittee meeting, Mrs. Porter pre-
sented comments on the progress
of Senate Bill 120, the election
legislation. This bill, she ex-
plained, will provide instant regis-
tration of voters on election day
and remove all residency re-
quirements if passed. She re-
ported the Ohio State Board of
Elections has taken a stand
against the bill, as have the
Assoc. of County Commissioners,
both citing the costs of such an
open voter registration policy.

SB 120, the elections bill, has
been introduced in the Ohio Senate
and is presently before the elections
committee of the Ohio House. She explained
that Secretary of State Ted Brown
had already passed the House
bill to the Senate.

She added that work is already
underway to have the regis-
tration bill put on the ballot in
the form of a referendum for next
fall. If it passes in the legis-
lature.

Central committee chairman
Fred Stultz pointed out that
County commissioners have a
duty for Municipal Court Judge
this fall, William Taylor, May-
nard Rd. He also called com-
mittee's attention to the new
state chairman, Earl Barnes,
Cincinnati, saying Barnes will
"hopefully give new direction to
the state party."

Mower Bid to Sunbury Dealer


Rick Day of Sunbury Land

Commissioners Oppose Voter Registration Bill

County commissioners Monday
passed a resolution opposing a
bill presented in the state legislature
which would eliminate registration
and postcard registration.

Going on record as members
of the state association of county
commissioners, the local board
urged the state legislature to
abandon the bill, the resolution
said, and the two state senators
representing Delaware county.

The resolution says the regis-
tration proposal legislation (SB
125) will place an "unbearable
financial burden" on Delaware
county and "open the door
throughout the state for
fraudulent registrations."

The resolution also argued that
the bill would "allow political
parties to discriminate in voter
registration." It also argued that

Commissioners also signed a
contract with Haas & Sons Salvage
and Wrecking Co. and the sheriff's
department concerning the cars.

The contract is for an indefinite
period of time, but can be
cancelled if either party gives
thirty days written notice to the
other.

The contract provides for the
county turning over the title of
any vehicle worth less than \$100
to Haas to recover any towing
or storage payments. For vehicles
over \$100 valuation, the
contract sets fees for towing
and storage.

For semi tractors, the fee
is \$35 for towing plus \$2.50 per
day storage, for semi trailers,
\$40 for towing and \$2.50 per day
storage, and for entire semi-
trucks, \$40 for towing plus
\$3.00 per day storage.

The contract covers all the un-
incorporated areas of the county.

Bishop Sheen expressed an obvious truth: "Parents hold authority from God over their children and are responsible for them." He is really saying rules and restraints must be imposed on children because they have an untrained mind. Parents who feel their children will not love them and seem fearful of being labeled old-fashioned or straight-laced if discipline is enforced are mistaken. Children need rules and boundaries to respect their parents—and they know when they behave badly.

Many of the faults of the "drop outs" of society are directly traceable to undeveloped discipline at an earlier age. Love, discipline and security are the foundation of a child's life. Without these a child's life is stunted from the very beginning. In order to be aid to love is to discipline. USDA Aids For '76 Wheat

Program changes designed to establish a farmer-owned reserve and give farmers additional time to repay a commodity loan in 1976 wheat crop should result in better prices for this commodity." Clyde Lining, chairman of the Delaware County ASCS committee reports.

Lining says Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz has announced the changes Apr. 4.

"The loan and reserve program changes should also assist wheat farmers in getting a stronger hand than they had under past reserve or extended loan programs," Secretary Bergland explained.

The agriculture head extended until May 31, 1977, (an additional two months) the date for farmers to decide whether they wanted to use the loan program on the 1976 crop.

Lining says credit for farm storage is given until the 140 percent market price level is reached. Farmers will be notified, then the total loan repayment will include the loan principal, interest, plus unearned prepaid storage. USDA will call in all existing loans when the market price reaches 175 percent of the current national loan price.

Emergency release for wheat to be sold will be authorized if the commodity is endangered by fire, flood, or damage to structures or if continued storage space is no longer available, the ASCS chairman adds.

Lining concludes all current wheat support loans are eligible for this program, but a ceiling on the total quantity may be imposed in the future.
