

## County GOP Appoints Porter Clerk of Courts

Delaware county Republican Central Committee Monday evening appointed Betty J. Porter, 41, 186 N. Sandusky St., as the county clerk of courts.

Mrs. Porter tallied 41 of the 57 votes from committeemen present at the meeting, with the other 16 votes divided between two other aspirants, Robert F. Norris, Delaware, and Dale E. Stein, Jr., Galena. Fourteen persons originally interested in the ap-

pointment, Hazel Burnett, Center Village, withdrew her letter of intention over the weekend.

Betty, who is presently director of the board of elections, was to begin her new duties in the clerk's office Wednesday. Swearing in ceremonies were scheduled for her Wednesday morning.

Mrs. Porter fills the post vacated by Ruth G. Scott who retired May 2 after 21 years in the office. Ruth gave health and personal reasons for her resignation.

Mrs. Porter has been in the board of elections since 1966, serving as both director and deputy director in alternate years. Board of elections is seeking a replacement for her in that office, either in a part-time or full-time capacity.

Prior to joining the elections personnel, Mrs. Porter served four years in Ruth Scott's clerk's office. She worked with the Union county clerk of courts in 1953, and part-time in the auditor's office in Marysville and for the Marysville Journal Tribune prior to that.

Commenting on her appointment, Betty said she welcomes any comments or suggestions anyone has toward the operations of the Clerk of Courts office. She said she feels the job will present a great challenge, both for the maintaining of court records and the title registration.

## Sunbury Village Water Rates Could Be Headed for Increase

Sunbury Village water rates could be headed for an increase after action taken at council's regular meeting last Wednesday night in the municipal building.

Council approved 4-0 a request by the Board of Public Affairs to raise water rates up to 15% with Donna Baranek, Burl Sellers, Frank Linnabary and Jack Brehm voting yea. Adrian Abolins and Randle Hughes were absent.

The action came about after Mayor Harold Kintner and Becky Jo Hayes, clerk, reported the water department's reserves were low and needed to be replenished. "We have to be prepared for emergencies," said Kintner, while Mrs. Hayes, who is also clerk of the board, said, "They have to have some money put aside."

She went on to explain last year approximately \$40,000 was spent for repairs, maintenance and improvements in the department. Major items were \$15,000 for a new counter flow (used in mixing chemicals) and an equal amount for sand blasting and applying fiberglass on the inside of the water tank and painting the outside.

## Tour Six Unique Homes Sunday, Stop at Inn for Refreshments

Galena's historic Dustin Inn is one of the many stops on Sunday's Tour of Homes sponsored by the Community Library Friends.

From 1-6, members of the Zoar Rebeccah Lodge will serve refreshments to those participating in the tour featuring different types of architecture in the Big Wet area.

By 1808 Gilbert and William Carpenter had purchased the lands which were later to become Galena. In 1812 Gilbert sold William 113 acres which he began to plat into the village of Zoar. During 1819 Nathan Dustin bought three town lots from William Carpenter to add to his various landholdings.

Dustin tried many things during his lifetime (1791-1874). Not only did he own land, he owned a sawmill, taught school, raised sheep, was an orchardist, was the first president of Delaware County Fair and was given a scholarship to Ohio Wesleyan Female College in 1855. One account of Dustin as a teacher is told in the 1880 History of Delaware County. "He had a very

strict sense of propriety, and was wont to give his scholars short lectures on rules of behavior. One one occasion the big girls got very much interested at noon in a game of ball, and played with all the abandon of light-hearted girlhood. This was too much for Mr. Dustin's spirit of propriety, and calling the girls in he gave them a severe rebuke, imitating their appearance when running, and the unladylike style of the whole proceeding. It proved too much for one girl who broke out crying which ended the discourse. It is clearly explained whether it was on the principle if you don't cry, I'll give you a stick of candy or the natural inclination of his heart, but he made this girl his second of five wives."

Nathan Dustin suggested the change of the name from Zoar to Galena when the post office informed the village there was no Zoar.

begun running from Mt. Vernon to Columbus stopping halfway at Sunbury. Each day the coaches met near Galena bringing the news from both directions. In 1827 Dustin decided to build an inn to rest the weary travelers. To be competitive he offered hot baths in a bathroom behind the inn and a horsekeeping service. After a bath, food and a night's lodging one could complete the journey with fresh horses leaving the tired animals with Dustin. He would care for the animals until the owners made the return trip and then exchange again. The inn is made of bricks unbacked from clay found locally. The woodwork and flooring was made from trees found on the property. Some of the visible floorboards in the attic are a full 18" wide. Beams and the old unrefinished bricks make the attic exciting to those studying building techniques. The fire-escape shows the location of fire-places and ovens.

Second Man Involved  
in Winchell Murder

Delaware county Grand Jury Friday indicted a second man in connection with the Sept. 20, 1975, murder of a Columbus youth whose body was found near Johnycake.

Joseph Eugene Powell, 23, Mansfield, pleaded not guilty that afternoon to a charge of aggravated murder and remains in Delaware county jail in lieu of \$60,000 cash bond.

Powell is accused of taking part in the murder of Samuel L. Winchell whose body was found near the vacant house on the former Jesse Smith farm, S. 3-B & K Road. He was arrested last Tuesday in Mansfield and charged with the murder.

Other man charged with the same murder is William L. Wadell, 25, also of Mansfield.

Mrs. Walter Linnabary recalls living in the inn when it was owned by Nathan's son, John. During the four years the Linnabary's lived in the south half of the inn, John and Hannah Dustin celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. Mrs. Linnabary remembers them as a delightful and easy-going couple. One story which has delighted Mrs. Linnabary's family was in regard to a built-in oven under the back stairs. "One morning Grandpa and Grandma Dustin (as all fondly called them) were eating breakfast when I told them I smelled smoke. John Dustin told me it was all right if it would burn slow. Upon investigation I found the beam of the house above the oven was all glowing coals and the house was burning. The Dustin waited until breakfast was over to be concerned about the fire." Of course, they extinguished the fire without a great deal of damage to anything but Mrs. Linnabary's nerves.

The Dustin Inn remained in the family until 1955 when Dr. and Mrs. L.M. Die bought the house for medical office and apartments. Since that time the inn has changed hands to Jim Whitney and now Willie York. Members of the Zoar Rebekeah Lodge will be serving refreshments Sunday in the parlor of the inn just as they were served on the wedding day of Ohio's U.S. Senator Frank B. Willis to Allie Dustin. Visitors will have a chance to wander through the main floor rooms and even climb the narrow stairs to the attic if they choose.

Tickets for the tour are being sold in the Community Library on the Sunbury square. Children under 12 need a 75¢ ticket while adults may purchase tickets for \$1.50 until the day of the tour when tickets will be \$2.00. Maps are included with the ticket to assist in locating the homes. Signs will also be posted for your assistance. For more information call the library 965-3901.

department for motor vehicles. Mrs. Porter will have to run for reelection in November, 1978. If she wishes to continue the job, State law says that the Republican Central Committee can fill the term by its appointment only until the next General Election in which county candidates are elected.

In other business of the committee meeting, Mrs. Porter presented comments on the progress of Senate Bill 125 on the Ohio legislature. This bill, she explained, will provide instant registration of voters on election day and remove all residency requirements if passed. She reported the Ohio Assoc. of Elections Officials has taken a stand against the bill, as have the Assoc. of County Commissioners, both citing the costs of such an open voter registration policy.

SB 125, the elections director reported, has already passed the Ohio Senate and is presently before the elections committee of the Ohio House. She explained that Secretary of State Ted Brown has already told elections officials he expects the voter registration bill to pass the House without difficulty. She added that work is already underway to have the registration bill put on the ballot in the form of a referendum for next fall, if it passes in the legislature.

Central committee chairman Fred Stults pointed out that County Republicans have a candidate for Municipal Court Judge this fall. William Taylor, Maynard Rd. He also called committee members' attention to the new state chairman, Earl Barnes, Cincinnati, saying Barnes was "hopefully give new direction to the state party."

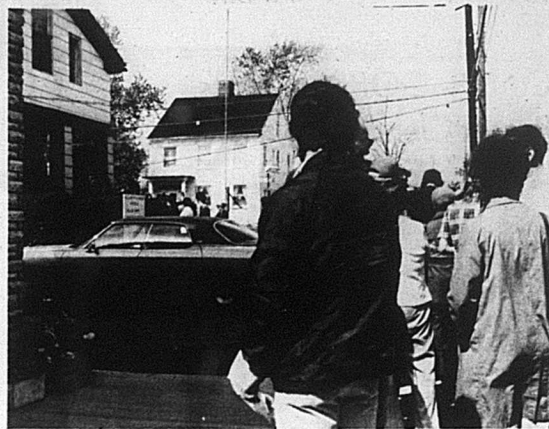

Mower Bid to Sunbury Dealer

Rick Day of Sunbury Lawn and Garden was awarded the contract for a new mower terminating action tabled from April's meeting.

Council purchased a 20 hp Hesston front running tractor for \$3,783 and delivery was made Thursday.

Brehm spoke out in favor of purchasing this tractor while citing several points he thought were advantageous. Mayor Kintner also reported Bob Corwin, street superintendent, favored the Hesston. The motion carried 4-0.

Councilman Linnabary went on record after the purchase that he would back Mayor Kintner, "to the hilt" on any decision he makes on operation of new equipment. The mayor recounted last year when many drove the old tractor and said he would make every effort to keep a qualified person on it.

Model "A" News

The official publication of the Model "A" Restorers Club featured Eldon Wigton's Medicine Wagon on the cover. (This was one of the several antique cars destroyed by arsonists in the Feb. 18 barn fire.) George DeAngelis, the editor of the magazine and a former Ford engineer, described the Medicine Wagon as a typical renovation of a "C" cab truck on a Model "A" chassis. Now, Eldon is working to rebuild his Medicine Wagon and hopes to have it on the circuit this summer.

County commissioners Monday passed a resolution opposing a bill presently in the Ohio legislature providing instant registration and postcard registration requirements enabling persons to register to vote when they go to the polls or through the mail. It also drops residency requirements in elections.

Commissioners also appointed the county's new administrator, Don Fisher, as county Civil Defense Coordinator. The post, although not being a paying position, enables county emergency services to purchase used government surplus equipment for disaster preparedness programs.

Commissioners also signed a contract with Haas & Sons Salvage Co. and the sheriff's department concerning junk cars. That contract is for an indefinite period of time, but can be cancelled if either party gives thirty days written notice to the other.

The contract provides for the county turning over the title of any vehicle worth less than \$100 to Haas to recover any towing or storage payments. For vehicles over \$100 valuation, the contract sets fees for towing and storage.

Contract allows Haas \$15 tow charges for cars plus \$25 if a dolly is used and \$10 per hour if a winch is used in the process. It also grants Haas \$1.50 per day storage fees for cars.

For semi trailers, the fee is \$35 for towing plus \$2.50 per day storage; for semi trailers, \$40 for towing and \$2.50 per day storage; and for entire semi tractor-trailer towing, \$50, plus \$3.00 per day storage.

The contract covers all the unincorporated areas of the county.

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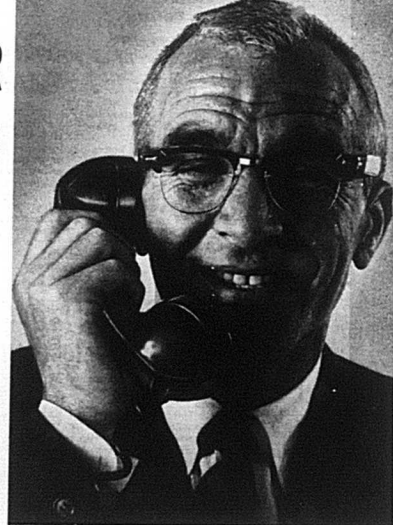

### Local Agencies Promote

### 'Foster Children Week'

Next week has been proclaimed National Action for Foster Children Week and Delaware county officials are asking citizens to observe this proclamation by considering the benefits our society can achieve through a strong foster care program.

John Brown, coordinator of the Delaware county Juvenile Probation Council, says foster care offers homes to children who would not otherwise have the opportunity to live in a happy, well-adjusted home environment. Brown, Juvenile Court Judge Paul Barrett, and Mrs. Peggy Boroff, foster care specialist with the county welfare office, endorse the proclamation of May 15 through May 21.

Brown points out that some children are in institutions for no better reason than that there are no foster homes open to them. "Some of them have no greater handicap than that they

were born prior to 1971," Brown adds, "and many families prefer to take pre-school children." The probation coordinator says others are of mixed racial background, or of minority races. Still others come in sets of siblings to remain together, or have physical or emotional handicaps.

"Many of these children would thrive in foster care," Brown says. "All that is needed by some of these children is a family to love." He says some children can be placed up for adoption, but others would remain in foster care for some reason or another.

The youth probation coordinator says foster parenthood and adoption offers most of the benefits of parenthood. He also points out that schools, neighbors and friends need to be aware of the needs of foster children to receive normal acceptance.

"Discrimination against foster children should be relegated to the past. All of us have a part in creating community sentiment favorable to foster children," Brown adds.

"So let each citizen consider how he or she might observe National Action for Foster Children Week. Those who might wish to become foster parents may apply to either the Welfare Dept. or to the Juvenile Court. Either agency may be reached by calling the courthouse number, 548-7313 (toll free), or 369-8761, and asking for that agency.

## NEWS OF THE BLOOMFIELD AREA . . .

### Finds Old Teacher's Manual Amid Treasures

After Maude Conway passed away several years ago, her daughter, Fern McMullen, found a treasure among her mother's belongings. Fern found the book, "Normal Teaching," a manual for teachers, written by F. P. Adams. It was published in Danville, Ill. in 1880. It was entered according to Act of Congress in 1879 by J. B. Sherrell in the Office of the Library of Congress.

I found the book fascinating as I read through it and read the day-by-day entries in this antique book. The first two pages were refreshers courses in nouns, pronouns, verbs, adjectives, etc.

The first entry was on Thursday, Sept. 18, 1884, and school opened at 9:00 with 38 students present and 13 absent. It listed the names of six students who were tardy; four were unruly and one, "had those days and the little boys while playing ball." The notation said it had been an interesting, except a miserable spelling lesson. The first page was signed by Vade and Oille, Journalist. The writing was in cursive and highbawking and written in ink. Vade, I learned, was a Hubbell.

On Friday, Sept. 19, 1884, there were 38 students and only one with only one incident to mar the day. Emery Adkins used vulgar language in a note written to the girls. At the bottom of the page was an interesting notation. It said, "We had an earthquake today!" This was a startling fact. I do not believe I ever read about it before.

It wasn't until Monday, Sept. 24, 1884, I found familiar names. The names of May Conway and Clair Conway were listed tardy that morning. Clair Conway was the father of Fern McMullen and lived just north of Bloomfield until his death about 10 years ago. It also said Gussie Barr and Clair Conway were quite unruly.

The first teacher was William Sanford. This school burned to the ground in 1923 and a new school was built. They found it was too small and in 1830 a larger one was erected. It proved so nice they used it for a school until it was torn down in 1839. I could find no record of when they remodeled it and replaced the school with the more modern desks. Schools have come a long way in the past 100 years. These were the days.

### SS Questions

This column is presented in cooperation with the Marion Social Security Office to help answer questions regarding Social Security, Medicare, and Supplemental Security Income.

**QUESTION:** My disability claim was turned down as I wasn't considered disabled enough. Does this mean I can never get social security? I'm 36.

**ANSWER:** No, it means only that you were not eligible for social security benefits based on disability at the time of that decision. You can appeal that decision within 60 days from that date you received the notice. Or you may reapply for disability benefits at any time. If you are eligible for social security benefits, you can apply for retirement benefits later on, and your dependents may be eligible for survivors' checks if you die.

**QUESTION:** I have no regular income but the things I own are worth a little more than \$1,500 limit for supplemental security income. Does this mean I can't get SSI checks?

**ANSWER:** Even though your resources exceed the limit by a small amount, you still may be able to get SSI payments if you agree to dispose of the excess assets within a specified time. Check with your social security office.

**QUESTION:** I've had Medicare over a year but haven't had to use it until now. What will Medicare pay for if I have an operation next month?

**ANSWER:** Your Medicare hospital insurance will pay for all covered services that are reasonable charges except the first \$124. Medicare covers the first 60 days and all but \$31 a day for the next 30 days if you stay in a hospital. If you have Medicare medical insurance, it will pay after you meet the \$60 annual deductible—80 percent of the reasonable charges made by your doctor for covered services. Take your Medicare card to the hospital.

He is really saying rules and restraints must be imposed on children because they have an untrained mind. Parents who feel their children will not love them and are fearful of being labeled old-fashioned or straight-laced if discipline is enforced are mistaken. Children not only need but actually want to respect their parents—and they know when they behave badly.

Many of the faults of the "drop outs" of society are directly traceable to undeveloped discipline at an earlier age. Love, discipline and security are the foundation of a child's life. Without these, a child's life is stunted from the very beginning. In fact, it can be said to love is to discipline. These truths are beautifully stated in Proverbs 26:17: "Whoever loves discipline will give you rest; yes, he shall give delight unto thy soul."

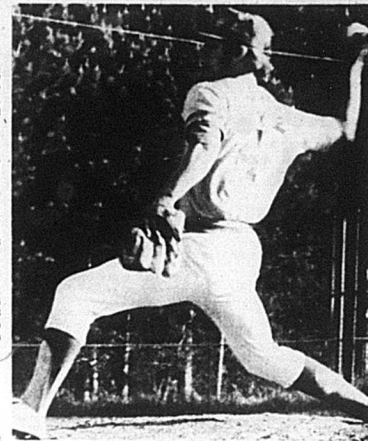

## USDA Aids For '76 Wheat

Program changes designed to establish a farmer-owned reserve and give farmers additional time to obtain a commodity loan on 1976 wheat crop should result in better farm prices for this commodity. Clyde Liming, chairman of the Delaware County ASCS committee reports.

Liming says Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland announced the changes Apr. 4.

"The loan and reserve program changes should also assist wheat farmers in getting a stronger hand than they had under past resale or extended loan programs," Secretary Bergland explained.

The agriculture head extended until May 31, 1977, (an additional two months) the date for farmers to decide whether they wanted to use the loan program on the 1976 crop.

Liming says credit for farm storage is given until the 1976 percent market price level is reached. Farmers will be notified then the total loan repayment will include the loan principal, interest, plus unsecured prepaid storage. USDA will call in all extended loans when the market price reaches 175 percent of the current national loan rate.

Emergency release for wheat to be sold will be authorized if the commodity is endangered by fire, flood, or damage to structure, or if continued storage space is no longer available, the ASCS chairman adds.

Liming concludes all current wheat support loans are eligible for this program, but a ceiling on the total quantity may be imposed in the future.
