



### Sunbury Has New Street Commissioner as Corwin Retires

Sunbury village has a new street commissioner with the retirement of Bob Corwin last month.

Bob is pictured above, left, along with his successor, Steve Johnson, named street commissioner at the last village council meeting.

Bob retired effective May 28 after 18 years with the village street dept., coming to work in May, 1968, when Ralph Meeker, now deceased, headed the force.

Bob recalls the he, Ralph and Perry Spangler ran the operation then, with Bob being named commissioner in the early 1970's, when Harold Kintner was mayor.

Today, Johnson heads a force of four full-time men, plus four or five extras hired during the summer months. Steve's been working with the village for seven years, and with the street dept. five years.

"Biggest difference between now and then is the equipment,"

Bob recalls. "We had one ton-and-a-half dump truck and used gasoline operated spreader the village had gotten from the state."

"Back then we did a lot more patching, and the three of us would spread 100 tons of patching material on the village streets each year," Bob adds. "Now we don't use two tons a year, and the village streets are in far more decent shape, thanks to council's maintaining them better."

The Sunbury street dept. today has two dump trucks with spreaders, as well as the 4-ton pickup Bob and Steve are pictured in front of. Steve says the village just had the pickup repainted "and I haven't got the sign back on it yet."

Corwin says another big difference is the maintenance of the cemetery. "We buy a new mower every year for the cemetery mowing, and trade in the trim mowers every three years. We've almost completely eliminated the down-time and have little maintenance on the equipment," Bob adds.

Corwin credits "good councils and mayors, as well as the taxpayers, they're the ones footing the bill," for helping to make Sunbury's street dept. one of the better ones around. "They've all been wonderful folks to work for, and the men doing the work have always appreciated the town. I just want to thank everyone in the community, the businesses, residents, and everyone, who have helped me out," Corwin relates.

With Bob's retirement, the street dept. also includes Joe King and Bill Garre. Fourth full-time person is just in the process of being hired, Johnson says.

### Jaycees Plan Fourth at School

Big Walnut Jaycees are planning lots of activities and food at the Big Walnut High School as part of this community's July Fourth celebration.

Kingston Jr. Farmers 4-H will have their Fun Frolics and Jerry Stambaugh will present his puppet show, Jerry and Friends, during that afternoon.

Annual July 4th Tug-O-War will also be held Friday, followed by the popular Square Dance with

the "Good Times" band and callers at evening. Steve Kessler and Ken Ruel are once again organizing the Tug-O-War, a complete story on today's sports pages.

Of course, throughout Friday and all day Saturday, the Harlem Garden Club's Flower Show and the Antique Tractor and Farm Machinery Show will be going on as well at the high school. Flower Show will be set up in the high school cafeteria, and open to the public Friday evening and all day Saturday, and the Antique Machinery will be on display and in some cases working, out in the eastern courtyard of the school.



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
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## Stirring Up Some Easy Recipes

Those of you who follow The News closely may be surprised to see my name at the head of this column. When I decided on early retirement The News gals asked if I could help out with "Care to Share" column occasionally. This is one of those weeks.

Summer is busy for everyone and often there isn't much time left for the usual things in the kitchen. One of the following quick and easy recipes may be just what you need when you are out of, or need, something a little nicer than a package or a mix.

For a spur-of-the-moment cookout, a picnic or just to refill the cookie jar you'll love this brownie recipe from my daughter, Rene DeMint's files. You'll find it just as easy as a mix from the supermarket, and a whole lot better. It's a Better Homes & Garden recipe and always brings compliments.

### Fudge Brownies

1/2 c. butter or margarine  
1 c. granulated sugar  
1 tsp. vanilla  
2 eggs  
2 (1 oz.) squares unsweetened chocolate, melted & cooled  
3/4 c. sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 c. chopped walnuts  
In medium saucepan, melt butter and chocolate.  
Remove from heat; stir in sugar. Blend in eggs, one at a time. Add vanilla. Stir in flour and nuts; mix well.  
Spread in greased 8x8x2 inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Be careful not to over-

bake. Cool. Cut into 16 squares.

On Mother's Day, Rene treated us to these delicious cinnamon rolls and says she finds them especially easy to make compared to others she has tried. Don't let the lengthy instructions scare you, but note the time she

dough can be refrigerated up to three days that can be a real help at times. This is from Betty Crocker's Favorite Recipes:

#### Overnight Cinnamon Rolls

(Makes 2 dozen rolls)  
1 pkg. active dry yeast  
1/4 c. warm water (105 - 115 degrees)  
4 c. all-purpose flour  
1/4 c. sugar  
1 tsp. salt  
1 c. butter or margarine, softened  
3 egg yolks, beaten  
1 c. lukewarm milk (scalded then cooled)  
2 Tbsp. butter or margarine, melted  
1/4 c. sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
Creamy glaze

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Mix flour, 1/4 cup sugar and the salt in a large bowl. Cut in 1 cup butter with pastry blender until the mixture looks like meal. Stir in yeast, egg yolks and milk. Mix until the dough is smooth. Cover and refrigerate at least 8 hours or until ready to use. (The dough can be refrigerated at 45 degrees or below for up to 3 days. Keep covered.)  
Grease 24 medium muffin cups. Turn half the dough onto a well-floured board and roll into a rectangle, 12x10 inches. Brush with 1 Tbsp. melted butter. Mix 1/4 cup sugar and the cinnamon and sprinkle half the mixture over the rectangle. Roll up, beginning at the wide side. Pinch the edge of the dough into the roll to seal well; stretch the roll to make even. Cut into 1-inch slices and place in the muffin cups. Repeat with the remaining dough. Cover and let rise until double, 1 to 1 1/2 hours.  
Heat oven to 375 degrees. Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until golden. While warm, frost rolls with:

**Creamy Glaze**  
Mix 1 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar, 2 Tbsp. soft butter or margarine, 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla and 1 or 2 Tbsp. hot water until smooth and of spreading consistency.  
Note: You can mix the dough with electric mixer. Dissolve yeast in warm water in large mixer bowl. Add 1/4 c. sugar, milk, egg yolks, salt, 1 c. butter and 2 c. flour. Blend 1/2 minute on low speed, scraping the bowl constantly. Beat 2 minutes on medium speed, scraping occasionally. With spoon, stir in remaining flour until the dough is smooth.

One of my own favorite recipes, this one-bowl quick cake can be used in many ways. Try your favorite frosting, a broiled topping, a canned or instant pudding, or fruit and whipped topping. It is very good for strawberry shortcake if you are tired of, or don't care for those "sponge things" they display

with strawberries at the store.

**Quick Layer Cake**  
Put following ingredients in bowl and beat vigorously with spoon:  
1 3/8 c. flour (1 1/4 c. + 2 T.)  
1 c. sugar  
2 tsp. baking powder  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1/2 c. shortening  
1/2 c. milk  
1 tsp. flavoring  
1 egg

Pour into greased 9"x9" square pan. Bake 30-35 minutes in 350 degree oven.

Thinking of berries brings us to this jam recipe I tried last spring, clipped from the "C.J.". It's a quick, freezer type and requires less sugar than traditional recipes.

#### Strawberry Freezer Jam - Lite

(Do not double)  
4 c. prepared fruit  
2 1/2 c. sugar  
1 box Sure-Jell Lite  
Stem and crush 2 quarts fully ripe berries, one layer at a time. Measure 4 cups into large bowl.

**Measure sugar.**  
Combine pectin with 1/4 cup sugar, gradually add pectin mixture to prepared fruit, stirring vigorously. Set aside for 30 minutes, stirring frequently.  
Step 2: Gradually stir in containers until dissolved.  
Ladle quickly into containers that have been rinsed in boiling water, filling to within 1/2 inch of top. Cover at once with tight lids. Let stand at room temperature overnight, then store in freezer.  
Yield: 6 (8 oz.) containers.

Just heard of a real time-saver when making potato salad:

Put frozen French fries (directly from the package) into boiling water, return to boil, remove from heat and drain immediately in a colander. Run cold water over the potatoes in the colander

until they are completely cool, then drain them thoroughly; cut them (cubed) and finish in your usual way for potato salad.

Hope there is something here that will turn your "kitchen duty" into "kitchen fun" and become one of those recipes you always reach for.

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
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ORDINANCE NO. 86-012

AN ORDINANCE TO INCREASE THE COMPENSATION OF THE CLERK-TREASURER OF THE VILLAGE OF SUNBURY, DELAWARE COUNTY, OHIO.
