Recyclers Seek \$70,000 in Next Grant

Delaware Waste Watchers Recyclers, which operates the recycling pick-up in Sunbury each month, is seeking nearly \$70,000 in state grant money for its 1989 fiscal year. Recycler coordinator Ben Wickmeyer told county commissioners Monday his group hopes to expand hours, materials taken, and buy back programs, as well as purchase a newspaper baler next year. Recyclers operate this year on a \$49,320 grant from the Ohio Dept. of Litter Control and the Ohio Dept. of Natural Resources.

Westerville, Johnstown Taxes Go Down Tuesday

Both Westerville and Johnstown-Monroe School levies went down in Tuesday's two area Special Elections, both for the second time. Westerville Schools' 6.5-mill additional operating tax went down 6,033.7, according to the Franklin County Board of Elections. In Delaware county, voters turned it down, 279-583, local director Ginny Sheets reports. In the Johnstown district, voters were 617-1,003 against the 9.7-mill additional tax, also for operating expenses. Eighteen registered voters in Harlem township were asked to vote at the Monroe Twp. hall in Johnstown on that levy. Sheets reports. Both taxes had been defeated by voters once before, this spring. Both were operating taxes, to be collected over continuing periods of time. Precinct voting on the Westerville tax in this county was Westerville precinct, 106-123; Genoa A & B, 12-54; Genoa C & D, 63-214; and Genoa E & G, 98-192.

Cable TV Company Reports Expansion Plans

In other grandstand entertainment, action starts with the motorcycle races at 8:00 p.m., followed by the Pedal Tractor Pull. And on Wednesday, Phil Ditt and the Dozers drop by at 8:00 p.m. for their third visit to Croton.

Thursday through Saturday, harness racing takes the track at 2:00 p.m. After Hollywood Stunt World, Randy Clayton will perform at the pavilion. Show runs from 8:30-11:30 p.m.

For music lovers, the Licking County 4-H Band will perform daily. The Come Alive Singers will perform Friday at the pavilion. Saturday night at 9:00 p.m., one can hit the dance floor with a Square Dance with the Good Times Band at the pavilion. Livestock sales start Thursday with the rabbit and poultry sales. Saturday is the Steer Pull, Junior Fair Steers and Market Lamb Sale.

WHTH will broadcast country music Monday-Friday from 6:00-8:00 p.m. ABN News will stop by from 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. Tuesday. Also broadcasting will be WCCT of Newark.

Pre-fair festivities begin Sunday at 4:00 p.m. with a lamb cook-off at Wright Arena. Also, at 4:00 p.m. the King and Queen Contest will take place at the pavilion. All is followed by a dance at TAHA amphitheater at 7:00 p.m.

Larry Hughes, fair board president, comments that the fair is special because there's so much community effort. He also states, "It's one of the few independent fairs left in the state."

In addition, he notes the emphasis on the youth, stating, "The reason it's as successful as it is, (is because) it's based around the kids."

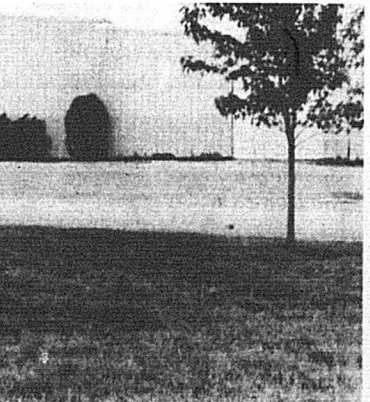
Admission to the fair is \$3.00 per person Monday and Tuesday until 5:00 p.m. After that, admission is \$5.00 per person.

Organizers are also already looking ahead to next year. Money is now being raised to construct new restroom facilities as well as a Jr. Fair Board office. According to Kenny Buell, past fair board president, the facilities and the office are expected to cost in the neighborhood of \$25-30,000. However, Buell says they hope to cut the cost down with donations.

Buell says they've received donations from various organizations totalling about \$13,000. So far, according to Buell, the blueprints have been donated, and they've also had offers for electrical work and plumbing. He says he expects the facilities to be completed by next year if all goes well.

Pet Hemorrhoid - Please check the collars on your cats and dogs, and halters on horses and ponies. The collars and halters can become embedded in the fur of the animals as they grow. Also, be sure your animals have access to shade and plenty of fresh water during this extreme hot weather.

August Showers - It's been a couple of months since those refreshing April showers, but August promises a good chance to see a different type of shower - the meteor shower. According to National Wildlife magazine, you will be able to see over 30 "shooting stars" in one hour during August's Perseid meteor shower. The showers reach their highest on August 12. So start making a list of summertime wishes.

Expensive Alternative - Interest in bottled water has increased during the drought. But bottled water isn't cheap, says Judy Wessel, management and equipment specialist at Ohio State University. It can cost more than \$1 a gallon compared with tap water's average cost of a few cents a gallon.

Concern about wells going dry would be better addressed by conserving water outdoors or in the bathroom, Wessel says. Conservation would be cheaper and more effective than buying bottled water for drinking, she adds. Have the water tested if you are concerned about the safety or taste. Water should be analyzed by a certified health. County Extension offices have information about how to obtain free bulletins about water testing. Ask for Water Testing (AEX-314) and Water Testing Labs in Ohio Water Testing Labs in Ohio (AEX-315).

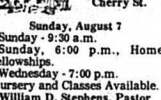

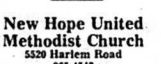

Communities groups demonstrating include the Ohio Fruit Growers Association with the Ohio Apple Marketing Program, Ohio Beef Council, Ohio Pork Producers, Mid-East United Dairy Association, Ohio Soybean Association, Ohio Poultry Association, with the Ohio Egg Marketing Program, Ohio Grape Industries, and the Natural Food Co-op with the macrobiotic Learning Center.

"Heartland Cuisine" recipe booklets will be given to fairgoers visiting the agriculture exhibit and demonstrations, or can be obtained by calling 466-6198.

The following are just a sample of recipes using fresh Ohio agricultural products:

Surprise! Quiche

4 large eggs
1 c. milk
1 c. shredded Cheddar cheese
1 c. diced turkey ham
1 c. frozen Oriental vegetable medley, thawed and drained
1 sm. can mushrooms, stems & pieces, drained
1 sm. can sliced black olives
1 1/2 frozen deep-dish pie shell

Beat eggs and milk together in medium bowl.
Add all remaining ingredients to egg-and-milk mixture; blend

well.
Pour into pie shell; bake in 375 degree F oven for 30-40 minutes, or until knife inserted in center comes out clean.
Let stand 5 minutes before serving.

Microwave Baked Apple Slices

4 medium apples
1/2 c. granulated sugar
1/2 c. light brown sugar
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 Tbsp. margarine

Peel and quarter apples; arrange in 9" pie plate.

Combine granulated sugar, light brown sugar, and cinnamon; sprinkle over apples; dot with pieces of 1 Tbsp. margarine.

Microwave, uncovered, for 4 minutes on High.

Rearrange and turn, if necessary, for even cooking and microwave for 4 more minutes, or until tender.

Combine peas, cheese, celery, and onion in large bowl.

Combine sour cream, mayonnaise, milk, mustard, salt, pepper, and hot red pepper sauce in small bowl, mixing until smooth.

Variation: Add 2 hard-cooked, chopped eggs to the pea mixture before chilling.

Fresh peas may be substituted for the frozen, if desired. Cook 4 cups shelled peas in small amount of boiling, lightly salted water, covered, for 10-12 minutes, or until tender. Quickly cool under cold running water; drain well. Proceed as recipe directs.

UNEVEN VISION

Q. If one eye is nearsighted and the other is farsighted, are glasses necessary?

A. When one eye is nearsighted and the other is farsighted, the patient suffers from a condition called anisometropia. This could cause eye strain because the brain is receiving dissimilar images from each eye. Glasses may be prescribed to correct each eye, so the two eyes function as a team and see images in the same way. Frequently, however, contact lenses are far more effective in correcting this condition.

If both eyes are nearsighted — or farsighted — but the visual acuity in each eye is significantly different, the condition is known as anisometropia. Here, too, glasses may correct the patient's blurred vision, but contact lenses are generally far more effective.

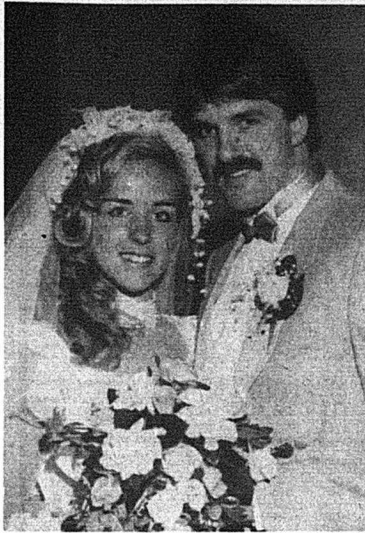

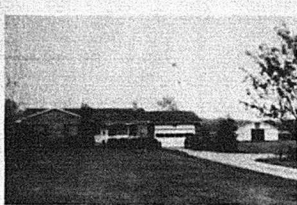
