## BW To Firm Cuts Mar. 8

Big Walnut Board of Education continues to look at possibilities for budget reductions, whether the May levy issue passes or not, and will make definite plans at its Mar. 8 board meeting, according to Supt. Carl Martin.

The board held a special meeting Thursday morning, prior to the heating system malfunction at the new high school which closed that

building down about 11 a.m.

Supt. Martin says his board members "asked for some more depth on some items" as distributed possibilities for \$300,000 in budget cuts which will have to be made. Another levy package, not yet Martin said the board is looking at possibilities that will have to be made definite at the March meeting. The superintendent also says the

board is looking at a second list of possible budget cuts to come into play if the levy does happen to fail in May. Big Walnut is seeking 12.5 mills of tax, of which 9.7 mills are new, at the May 4 election.

"We have to have a plan in place if the levy fails in May. Even if we come back again in August, by then it's too late to put many reductions in effect before school starts," he explains.


The superintendent says the board needs to decide which cuts need to be made with the second round of cuts before it can make definite plans. He adds that hopefully that second list can be firmned up at the Mar. 8 meeting.

As far as the excitement at the high school Thursday morning, Supt. Martin explains an air handler in the heating system which operates "similar to a heat pump" sprung a leak. An air pipe burst from the staging water within the system, spread throughout the building, leading school officials to believe it may have been natural gas.

The superintendent says officials decided to evacuate the building, not only because of the leak, but also because the gas company to check for leakage. Students, after being evacuated to the middle school building, were sent home early.

## 'ABC' Group Forms To Help Pass BW Levy

Group of parents, teachers, administrators and other concerned residents of the Big Walnut community has formed "to insure that the children in the area's needs are met through the passage of the May Big Walnut levy."

The new group is calling itself the Action to Benefit Children (ABC) committee, with Tony Marcom as its leader.

Marcom explains, "Our group began with a handful of people who were interested in working on the school levy and when we actually met, they were eager to elbow in Mr. Martin to come over to us. We knew that working on getting the levy passed was our first goal and primary responsibility.

He continues, "Right now, we have 12 main action teams who are led by some of your neighbors, soccer coaches and children's teachers. This group is comprised with small groups of volunteers in specific areas, such as information, voter registration, publicity and signs. We are especially excited about some of the areas we've planned: a spaghetti dinner, flea market, walkathon, poster contest and parade, just to name a few."

ABC is to benefit children (ABC) will be hosting a 10 kilometer walkathon (approx. 6 1/2 miles) on Saturday, Mar. 27, starting at 9:00 a.m. at Towley's IGA, Flig Hardware, the Community Library, and all school offices beginning this Saturday. A \$5 registration fee will cover the cost of a T-shirt.

Walnut will register in one of four age groups: elementary and younger, middle school, high school and adult; with prizes being awarded for the top sponsor obtaining walkers in each age group. Donations will also be accepted.

## BW Kindergarten Registration Begins

Kindergarten registration for the 1993-94 school year in the Big Walnut School District will be held Saturday, Mar. 12, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. (each day only). Registration may also be completed during the afternoon of Mar. 13 from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m., reports Superintendent Fred Fulton.

All children who will be 5 years old on or before Sept. 30, are eligible for Kindergarten and should be registered. The age of compulsory school

attendance is 6 years of age. Brown says Ohio law requires completion of a successful Kindergarten experience prior to entry into first grade. In certain exceptional situations and within restrictions defined by law, this requirement may be waived by the school district's Pupil Personnel Services Committee. Fulton advises.

Any parent or legal guardian whose legal residence is within the Big Walnut School District and who has a child eligible for Kindergarten is requested to register the child at either Big Walnut Elementary School, Hylen Souders Elementary School, or Harrison Street Elementary School during this registration period. "It's important that children be registered now so that arrangements can be made for the Kindergarten screening process to occur in June and so that an accurate count of incoming students can be made," says Fulton.

When registering a child, the parent or legal guardian must furnish the following documents: 1) the child's birth certificate (or other legal document verifying the date of birth); 2) home address; 3) lease agreement as proof of residency in the Big Walnut School District; and 3) if applicable, court order establishing legal custody or guardianship. Each child's Social Security Number will also be requested.

In addition, the parent should be prepared to schedule an appointment with the school which will occur June 9 and 10. Details of the screening process will be explained at the time of registration, Fulton adds.

Questions concerning Kindergarten registration may be asked of the school principal of Big Walnut Elementary School (965-3902); Melissa Zarich, principal of Hylen Souders Elementary School (965-3201); or Wes Newland, principal of Harrison Street Elementary School (965-2291).

Delaware County Board of Elections director Janet Frentz reminds area voters there will be no special registration hours for this May's Special Election.

Big Walnut, along with about every other school district in the area, has an issue on the May 4 ballot. But as there is no primary election this year, the election is considered a Special Election, Frentz explains.

Since there are no special hours, voter registration is going on now at the Board of Elections, 101 W. Main, basement, and at the Community Library in Sunbury. Deadlines for voter registration is Monday, Apr. 5, p.m., being the final time.

### MARCONI SAYS BUXTON CONCERNED BASED ON INCOMPLETE INFORMATION

Dear Editor:

Last week, in response to my letter of support for the levy in May, Mr. Ron Buxton raised several concerns that were based, in my opinion, on misconceptions and incomplete information. I hope the following comments will create a more accurate picture of the situation.

First of all, the levy is continuing rather than limited for a very good reason: our district is growing and we cannot afford to do anything else. As a result, many more students will need the services of our schools. The cost of educating these students will not be any less three, five, or even ten years from now.

If the proposed levy were limited, the school board would repeat the expensive and time-consuming process of re-balancing over and over again. This is unproductive and a waste of time and money.

Please make no mistake about it.

The cost of providing a basic quality education for our students has gone up. But the burden of this increase will not be all that much. For the person with a \$100,000 home, the additional expense will be only 80 cents a day. And every year, as more homes are built and state-required roll backs are enacted, the cost goes down. In other words, we start out at budgeted rates, prices and pay less and less as we go.

Complaining that we are already paying enough when we are actually 2 million dollars short, doesn't make a lot of sense. Of course we don't want to have this much debt, but arguing against continuing our debts is like saying that if your roof developed a leak, you won't want to fix it because you're already paying for a leaky roof.

The whole idea of letting our home be destroyed just because we are annoyed at incurring an additional expense is unthinkable. Why, then, should we regard our schools any differently?

Mr. Buxton does this distract a service when he attempts to draw lines between the board of education and the rest of the community. Remarks about how we think we have to do this or that are from the administration and school board indicate that he feels that these people have some personal agenda that works against the electorate. Anyone who has attended a board meeting or has been invited to one, would know how absurd this notion is.

These are our neighbors and friends who have taken on an important and often thankless job out of a sense of civic responsibility. This is not something gained only with these positions. People who think that they will somehow 'get back at the board' or 'send a message' to its members by voting against the levy are being very careful about what they're doing. It's not the board who's hurting its your children, your home values, and your community.

The board of education and the superintendent have done an excellent job of planning the annual budget. They have been judicious in their hiring of personnel. When Mr. Buxton complains that the greatest expense in our school system is personnel, he is simply failing to understand that this is true of all school systems since they exist to provide a service (teaching) to our children. It would be a poor system, indeed, that did not spend most of its money on personnel.

Does Mr. Buxton note that our teachers' salaries are well below the area's average and that the money we spend per pupil is less than is spent by twenty other school systems around the country? This points to fiscal management and indicates that we are doing well in providing a solid, basic program that is unburdened by excessive frills.

The real issue is that the state has reduced funding drastically over the past few years, and nobody could have predicted just how hard we would be hit by those cuts. Mr. Buxton states that the board has referred to the public by making cuts in exchange for a lesser amount of additional taxes. This is simply not true. Last year, over \$250,000 worth of cuts were made, and this year—even if the levy is passed—over \$100,000 more will be slashed from the budget. Mr. Buxton and I discussed this very matter after the last board meeting, so I know he was aware that these cuts had already been agreed to. Perhaps he was unclear about this situation at the time he wrote his letter.

I believe Mr. Buxton is genuinely concerned for the welfare of Big

Walnut citizens. It is in this belief that I remind him of the bottom line that every voter in this system needs to remember: The average cost to help our schools continue in their fine work is, as I have already said, less than a cent a day.

That's right. Friends-les than what you're already spending in pocket change without a second thought. Less than you'd drop on a few cups of coffee or soft drinks. Not exactly a天文大數, but it's there, is it? Certainly not worth risking the quality of life in this community just to let off a little political steam. Vote against a candidate in the election, not against your taxes in May.

Less than 80 cents!

Are our children's futures worth 80 cents? Are the values of our homes and the well-being of our families worth a few nickels and dimes? Or are we so poor that we're throwing pennies around like they were manhole covers?

I think, as a community, we're better than that. And I'll be you, too.

We're running an entire new building and teaching more students than ever before. The teachers I have had have made presentations to the school board, superintendent, and building principals.

We urge you, the citizens of the Big Walnut School District, to VOTE YES on May 4 for your children and your community.





Third row includes Scott Bowman, Brittany Holly, Allison Ledin, Erica Whitt, Lauren Craig and Amy Phillips.



**EMERGENCY MEASURES**

Restorations (fillings, caps, bridges, etc.) have a way of breaking or getting lost at the most inconvenient time - like when you want to look your best. The only permanent kind of repair is that made by your dentist, but here are a few emergency measures.

If a filling falls out (and it happens in the best of families) it has to be replaced by the dentist. You can ease some of the discomfort by rinsing with lukewarm water and then placing a piece of cotton dipped in oil of cloves into the cavity.

If a crown, jacket or cap pops out, don't put it back with commercial glue. If you can leave it out until you see your dentist, do so. If you must have it in place for appearance's sake, vaseline or denture cream will hold it in place temporarily. Don't wear it to bed.

Don't try to repair a broken denture or bridge yourself. It could damage both the appliance and the tissue against which it rests. A broken denture is a real emergency and can be repaired quickly by the dentist. A single fractured tooth in a denture can also be replaced quickly by the dentist!
