## BW To Firm Cuts Mar. 8

Big Walnut Board of Education continues to look at possibilities for budget reductions, whether the May levy issue passes or not, and will make definite plans at its Mar. 8 board meeting, according to Supt. Carl Martin.

The board held a special meeting Thursday morning, prior to the heating system malfunction at the new high school which closed that

building down about 11 a.m. Supt. Martin says his board members "asked for some more depth on some items" as he distributed possibilities for \$300,000 in budget cuts which will have to be made, "whether the levy passes or not."

Martin said the board is looking at possibilities that will have to be made definite at the March meeting. The superintendent also says the

board is looking at a second list of possible budget cuts to come into play if the levy does happen to fail in May. Big Walnut is seeking 12.5 mills of tax, of which 9.7 mills are new, at the May 4 election.

We need to have a plan in place if the levy fails in May. Even if we come back again in August, by then it's too late to put many reductions in effect before school starts," he explains.

The superintendent says the board needs to decide how much it needs to save with the second round of cuts before it can make definite plans. He adds that hopefully that second list can be turned up at the Mar. 8 meeting, as well.

As far as the excitement at the high school Thursday morning, Supt. Martin explains an air handler in the heating system, which operates "similar to a heat pump" sprung a leak. An odor, apparently from the stagnant water within the system, spread throughout the building, leading school officials to believe it may have been natural gas.

The superintendent says officials decided to take all precautions and not only evacuated the building, but called the gas company to check for leakage. Students, after being evacuated to the middle school building, were sent home early.

Martin adds a few students, "maybe five," were transported to the hospital for treatment of "shortness of breath." Those students were transported once they had been evacuated to the middle school.

The air handler was to be replaced this week, Carl says. Meanwhile, heat was shut off the first of the week to the science area of the building.

## Children's Services Levy Campaign Opens

Children's Services levy campaign was officially kicked off at a fund raiser Mar. 2. The evening theme "A Night with the Queen" featured dinner at the Heartland Cafe and a special showing of the African Queen at the Strand Theatre.

Mike Brown, director of the Department of Human Services of which Children's Services is a part, introduced Nancy Frankenberg and

Gene Noggle as honorary chairmen of the Save Our County's Kids (S.O.C.K.) campaign committee. Also identified were Debbie Martin, campaign coordinator, Joann Phipps, endorsement committee, Joann Manning, media committee, and Steve Hanson, volunteer committee. Mike Nagy is the campaign's treasurer.

The one mill property tax proposal

for abused, neglected and abandoned children is the first time voters have been asked to support Children's Services. The five year levy would generate approximately \$1.3 million per year.

It would not replace funds currently being contributed by the county general fund, nor would it provide anyone with additional welfare benefits. "It's use would be

solely for supporting services for children and their families," Brown says.

The money would be used for modest but necessary system improvements required to care for children in need, Brown explains. These improvements include increasing prevention services to

## 'ABC' Group Forms To Help Pass BW Levy

Group of parents, teachers, administrators and other concerned residents of the Big Walnut community has formed "to insure that the children in the area's needs are met" through the passage of the May Big Walnut levy.

The new group is calling itself the Action to Benefit Children (ABC) committee, with Tony Marconi as its leader.

Marconi explains, "Our group began with a handful of people who were interested in working on the school levy and when we actually met, they were elbow to elbow in Mr. Martin's conference room. We knew that working on getting the levy passed was our first goal and primary responsibility to the children."

He continues, "Right now, we have 12 main action teams who are led by some of your neighbors, soccer coaches and children's teachers. These team captains work with small groups of volunteers in specific areas, such as information, voter registration, publicity and signs. We are especially excited about some of the special events that planned: a spaghetti dinner, flea market, walkathon, poster contest and parade, just to name a few."

Action to Benefit Children (A.B.C.) will be hosting a 10 kilometer walkathon (approx. 6 1/2 miles) on Saturday, Mar. 27, starting at 9:00 a.m.

Sponsor sheets will be available at Townley'sIGA, Fling Hardware, the Community Library, and all school offices beginning this Saturday. A \$5 registration fee will cover the cost of a T-shirt.

Walkers will register in one of four age groups: elementary and younger, middle school, high school and adult; with prizes being awarded for the top sponsor-obtaining walkers in each age group. Donations will also be accepted.

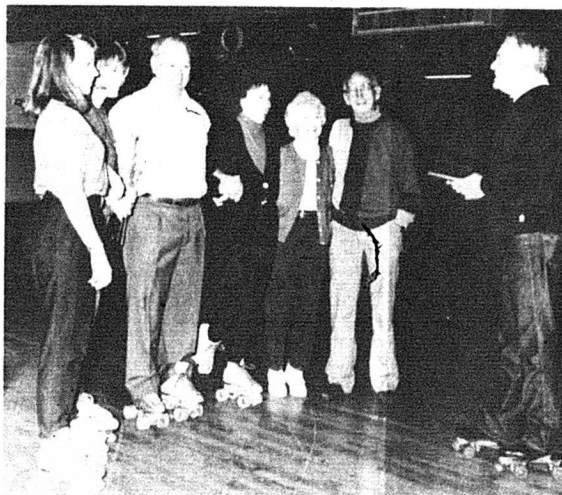

## BW Kindergarten Registration Begins

Kindergarten registration for the 1993-94 school year in the Big Walnut Schools will be held Mar. 8-19 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. (school days only). Registration may also be completed during the afternoon of Mar. 19 from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. reports curriculum coordinator Fred Fulton.

All children who will be 5 years old on or before Sept. 30, are eligible for Kindergarten and should be registered. The age of compulsory school

attendance is 6 years of age. However, Ohio law requires completion of a successful Kindergarten experience prior to entry into first grade. In certain exceptional situations and within restrictions defined by law, this requirement may be waived by the school district's Pupil Personnel Services Committee, Fulton advises.

Any parent or legal guardian whose legal residence is within the Big Walnut School District and who has a child eligible for Kindergarten is requested to register the child at either Big Walnut Elementary School, Hylen Souder Elementary School, or Harrison Street Elementary School during this registration period. "It is important that children be registered now so that arrangements can be made for the Kindergarten screening process to occur in June and so that an accurate count of incoming students can be made," says Fulton.

When registering for a child, the parent or legal guardian must furnish the following documents: 1) the child's birth certificate (or other legal document verifying the date of birth); 2) home deed or rental lease agreement as proof of residency in the Big Walnut School District; and 3) if applicable, court order establishing legal custody or guardianship. Each child's Social Security Number will also be requested.

In addition, the parent should be prepared to schedule an appointment for screening, which will occur June 8 and 9. Details of the screening process will be explained at the time of registration, Fulton adds.

## Elections Office Has No Special Registration Hours

Delaware county Board of Elections director Janet Frenston reminds area voters there will be no special registration hours for this May's Special Election.

Big Walnut, along with about every other school district in the area, has an issue on the May 4 ballot. But, as there is no primary election this year, the election is considered a Special Election, Frenston explains.

Since there are no special hours, voter registration is going on now at the elections office in the courthouse basement, and at the Community Library in Sunbury. Deadline for voter registration is Monday, Apr. 5, with the closing of the Library, at 8 p.m., being the final time.

People can also register by mail, Janet adds. "All they need to do is give us a call and we'll mail them a registration card."

### First Sunbury Golf Club Greenskeeper, James Beaver, 80, Dies

First greenskeeper at the Sunbury Golf Club, James N. Beaver, 80, of Xenia, died Feb. 25 at Greene Memorial Hospital in Xenia following a brief illness.

Beaver kept the greens at Sunbury Golf Club in 1932 and 1933. He then joined the CCC in Yellowstone National Park, where he served two years.

Beaver retired in 1972 after 27 years of teaching math at D'S & S-O Home where he was a junior high basketball coach and scoutmaster. He was a member of the Retired Teachers Assoc. of Greene county and was a charter member of the Greene Co. YMCA. He was Plainfield High School's first basketball coach, where he also coached baseball and track.

Beaver earned his master's degree in education from Columbus University, after completing undergraduate work at The Ohio State University in 1939. He was a World War II Army veteran, serving in communications.

Survivors include a son, James N. Jr. and wife Christine Nestor Beaver, of Mad River Twp.; eight grandchildren, two sisters, Janet Fenney and Mary O'Hara, both of Columbus, and a brother, Donald Beaver, Edinborough, Scotland.

Seven members of the Big Walnut varsity wrestling team will continue competition in the Division II this Friday-Saturday at Olathe High School.

Peerey, a senior, is currently 26-12 after dropping a tough 13-5 decision against Circleville's Josh Crummett in the 160 finals. He preciously

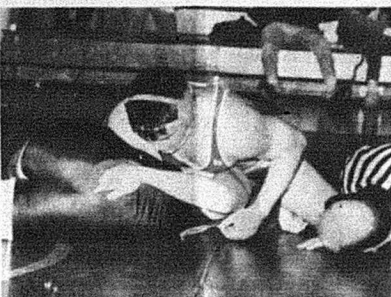

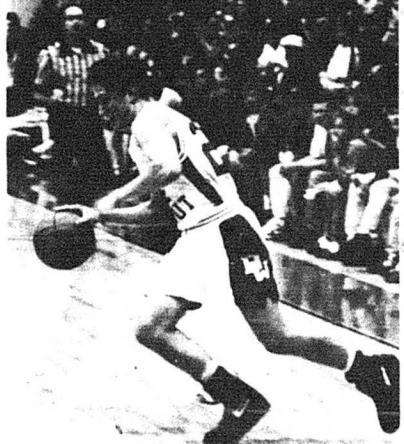

The Saxs came out in the opening moments of that third frame and outscored BW 6-1. Junior center Chad Morrison sank the ball of a

During the remaining of the period, Stumpf swished in two goals, one a three-pointer while Oman powered in another. ## Cold Shooting, Rebounding Woes Eliminate Eagles

A combination of cold shooting from the field and rebounding spelled the end for the Big Walnut varsity girls basketball in the post season tournament trail.

Coach Dean Duffey's crew hit just 27 percent of its four attempts and was out rebounded in a 54-46 Division II Sectional finals setback against Beechcroft at Westerville South last Thursday evening.

"We had good offensive movement of the ball and got good open shots that did not fall," commented Coach Duffey of his team's 16-59 showing. "Probably the biggest key was not effectively controlling the boards, which enabled them to get several putbacks."

The Cougars took an early 7-3 advantage before BW rallied back. Sophomore guard Amy Hughes — scored in for a lay-up and junior forward Alyssa Hicks sank the back of a two-shot foul to put them up 12-11 after one quarter.

Senior center Kary Walko opened the second period with a rebound basket to give the Eagles a three-point margin. Beechcroft then scored eight straight points to grab a 19-14 edge with 4:12.

Hughes and Hicks both completed charity tosses, with Walko later closing BW to one at 21-20 on a high off the glass rebound with 2:18. After a Cougar three-point goal, junior forward Ade Ibbell and Hughes each netted one foul shot in getting the Eagles within two at halftime.

Senior forward Amanda Cruse canned a two-foot jumper and senior guard Amanda Monroe connected on a twisting ten-footer to give BW a 26-23 edge with 6:15. Beechcroft then ripped off six consecutive points for a 26-26 lead with 4:41.

Monroe stopped the run by swishing another ten-footer with 4:22 but the Cougars went on another three-point blitz for a 36-28 lead with 2:00. Hughes fired in a seven-footer and gained in a three-point that bounced off the rim, went high in the air and into the net with six seconds left.

Beechcroft grabbed a seven-point margin with two straight goals as the fourth quarter began. Hughes responded with another trey and a 15-footer to cut the deficit to 40-35 with 5:41.

After calling timeout, the Cougars used two three-point goals for a 40-38 and a 46-38 advantage with 2:40 remaining. Hicks and Hughes rebounded BW get within eight twice over the last few minutes.

BW closed to five with 27 seconds left when Hughes hit both ends of a two-shot freebie and Monroe found the range on a 15-footer. Beechcroft made a one and one in the final 20 and BW could not get any closer.

"If we went back to study the game film, I'm sure we'd find out offensive rebounds on second and occasionally third shots was the difference," added Coach Duffey. "Every time we got momentum

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### "EMERGENCY MEASURES"

Restorations (fillings, caps, bridges, etc.) have a way of breaking or getting lost at the most inconvenient time - like when you want to look your best. The only permanent kind of repair is that made by your dentist, but here are a few emergency measures.

If a filling falls out and it happens in the best of families it has to be replaced by the dentist. You can ease some of the discomfort by rinsing with lukewarm water and then placing a piece of cotton dipped in oil of cloves into the cavity.

If a crown, jacket or cap pops out, don't put it back with commercial glue. If you can leave it out until you see your dentist - do so. If you must have it in place for appearance's sake, vaseline or denture cream will hold it in place temporarily. Don't wear it to bed.

Don't try to repair a broken denture or bridge yourself. It could damage both the appliance and the tissue against which it rests. A broken denture is a real emergency and can be repaired quickly by the dentist. A single fractured tooth in a denture can also be replaced quickly by the dentist.

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
