



Tri-County Religious Education Flea Market Draws Large Crowd at Sunbury

Sunbury Elementary School was a bustling and busy place Saturday, Nov. 28, when the Committee for Religious Education sponsored a flea market. Mrs. Loy Perfect, committee chairman, reported the event was a big success with around sixty dealers present and a large crowd of nearly seven hundred people attending.

Luncheon was served by the Child Conservation League Federation Club, with all proceeds going to this worthy cause. Most people who attended the flea market ate lunch there and the ladies sold completely out of food.

Miss Sarah Kern of Delaware is the religious education teacher for the tri-county program. She teaches classes at Prospect, Brown, Sunbury and Harlem schools and is planning a course of study for Galena.

Sunbury's share in the expense of this program is \$2800 a year, more than the other schools because of the larger number of classes. Although the flea market was helped, bringing in over \$500, the program is badly in need of more money, running on a month to month basis, as the money comes in. Last month's expenses are being paid from the flea market proceeds.

## Judge Asks Continuation of Columbus Men's Jury Trial

CASE CONTINUED UNTIL JANUARY 18; WILL HEAR AUTO ACCIDENT SUIT MONDAY

Common Pleas Judge O. W. Whitney, Jr., asked the defendants' attorneys Monday for a continuation of the combined trials of two Columbus men who allegedly held up Spot's Carry-Out in Delaware last August.

Next Monday, the jury will hear an auto accident suit concerning two Delaware residents as Dewey Hughes, 144 Joy Ave., is suing Dorothy D. Hudson, 158 E. Winter St., for damages in the amount of \$75,000.00.

The trial of State vs Joseph A. Barker and Benjamin Gary Blackburn was continued until Jan. 18, 1971, because of illness in the judge's family. Barker, 25, and Blackburn, 24, both of Columbus, are facing charges of grand larceny and armed robbery as a result of the hold-up in August.

Both men were arraigned Sept. 21 and pled "not guilty" to the charges and the trial was then set to begin Monday. Their attorneys hope to prove that the two were in a bar in Columbus when the hold-up occurred and have a number of witnesses to testify to their allegations.

Paul Loader, owner of the Carry-Out, claims the two robbed him of \$318 in the mid-day hold-up, one holding a gun while the other handled the money. The jury was not impaneled Monday before the case was continued.

In next week's case, Judge Whitney is allowing four days for the jury trial. Hughes claims that the Hudson car slammed into the rear end of his car as he was making a left turn off N. Sandusky St. The accident occurred Jan. 29, 1965.

He claims that his turn signal was working and that as a result of the accident he has incurred numerous medical bills for his back and neck treatment.

Attorneys John Jensei, III, and Richard L. Miller, both of Delaware are handling the suit for Hughes. Delaware attorney Fred Wickham is arguing Mrs. Hudson's side of the case.

NEWS EDITOR REMAINS IN CRITICAL CONDITION

Bill Whitney, editor of the Sunbury News, remains in critical condition in the intensive care unit at Riverside Methodist Hospital. Whitney was taken into the hospital four weeks ago and after two weeks in intensive care was assigned a room on the fifth floor. However, last Tuesday, he was re-admitted to ICU with pneumonia and as yet has not been able to show much recovery.

## Delaware County Fair Receives Most Tax Money from Pari-Mutuels

Forty-four county and two independent fairs shared in the distribution of \$64,268.19 in refunds of state taxes collected on pari-mutuel wagers during the current fiscal year. State Auditor Roger Cloud said today.

This was an increase of \$11,865.24 over the previous year, according to Cloud's figures.

While the state law requires that the tax be assessed and collected at all tracks in the state, provision is also made for the refund of the tax to the county and independent fairs which conduct pari-mutuel, upon application to the state, after deductions of the one-half of one percent for the Ohio Fairs Fund.

Largest single payment, amounting to \$25,264.96, was made to the Delaware County Agricultural Society which annually conducts the Little Brown Jug pacing classic. This was an increase of \$97.29 over last year.

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## Two Youths Face Charges For Kilbourne Vandalism

Two youths signed written statements confessing their parts in vandalism at Kilbourne Saturday. Arnold Harrel, 15, Kilbourne, and Wayne Williamson, 15, Ashley, are presently free in the custody of their parents awaiting hearing before Juvenile Judge Paul Barrett.

The boys face charges for vandalism and malicious destruction of property after their early morning spree in Kilbourne. According to their statements, Harrel was spending the night with Williamson when the two climbed out a basement window about 2 a.m. Saturday and pushed the Williamson family car out of the driveway so as not to be heard.

The youths then started the car in front of the Williamson home and headed for Kilbourne. While one boy would drive, the other would spray gold paint on parked cars in Kilbourne, according to their statement.

The boys drove through some lawns and then headed for the Kilbourne school where they slid the vehicle around the soft baseball diamond and playground. While at the school, the car hit a tree near the basketball courts, damaging the rear.

The boys drove to an Ashley car wash to inspect the damage and then went back to Williamson's. There they parked the car with the rear end against a tree so as to make the Williamson think someone had tried to steal it and wrecked it there.

Later Saturday morning, Mrs. Williamson called the sheriff's office to report the wrecked car. Deputy Sheriff Robert Terry found on (Continued on Page 2)

## Christmas Mail Should Be Sent

Special 1970 Christmas stamps which went on sale nearly a month ago are going like "hot cakes," according to Sunbury Postmaster Hoyt Whitney. Christmas mail should be sent soon. All Airmail packages and cards being sent to Armed Forces in the States should be mailed no later than Dec. 11. All domestic packages should be in the mail by Dec. 11 and cards by Dec. 15 to local and nearby states. Packages and cards being sent airmail to Alaska and Hawaii should be on their way by Dec. 14.

All international mail parcels to Canada and Mexico are to be mailed by Dec. 4 and to all other countries, 16 cards by Dec. 9. South and Central America parcels and cards should already be sent and air parcels by Dec. 14. Air parcels to Europe should be mailed by Dec. 14, cards by Dec. 18. Africa air parcels by Dec. 10, Near East air parcels by Dec. 10.

A slip of paper showing the name and address of the sender and also the name and address of the addressee should be placed on the inside of each package. If the wrapper, placed on the parcel, the Postal Department will replace the wrapper, place a new address on it and mail it on to its destination.

Parcel should be addressed on one side only and the return address is very important. Zip Code is a must on every package.

## State Subsidy Payments Reach \$645 Million for Four Months

State subsidy payments to finance education, health and welfare programs returned to the taxing district local governments reached upward to \$645,242,637.00 in the first four months of fiscal 1971, it was reported today by State Auditor Roger Cloud.

These disbursements were up \$134,504,811.00 over the comparable period of last year. A portion of this increase was attributed to the extra school foundation distribution of \$26.1 million of last August.

A breakdown shows that the largest distribution of \$22,191,781.00 went for elementary and secondary education, up \$45,780,053.00 over last year, while higher education received \$79,290,760.00 for an increase of \$6,067,227.00.

The various welfare and health programs received \$187,654.00 for an increase of \$31,330,474.00, while revenue distribution funds totaled \$136,228,161.00. The latter category included \$68,838,237.00 for health, local governments, \$29,578,100.00 in auto license fees,

County School Superintendent Wonders Where Schools Are Going

After examining and analyzing the results of the Nov. 3 vote on tax levies and bond issues, I am re-examining the "hot cakes," according to Sunbury Postmaster Hoyt Whitney. "Quo vadimus?" "Where are we going?"

To say that the voting record on school issues in Ohio this year was bad would be an understatement. A more accurate description would be catastrophe or tragedy. Statewide, the voters passed 27 of 47 of all new operating levies and 21 of 27 of all new bond issues.

In Delaware county, our record did not even approach the state average for new issues. The operating levy received 32.7 "yes" vote and the bond issue received 35.9 "yes" vote. Had it not been for the 35.9 percent vote on our renewal, we would have had a "shut-out" in the vote of our county schools.

In Delaware county, we face several critical problems, not only are we faced with steadily increasing costs, but we are also faced with several new problems—loss of \$220,000 income county wide because of re-appraisal, loss of Penn Central's tax payment of \$50,000, 8300 plus acres of land taken off the tax duplicate for the Alum Creek Dam project and loss of federal monies due to a cut-back and possible closing of North American Rockwell.

As one can easily see, the schools are faced with problems not easily solved. Our costs continue to rise, we are losing operating monies and face a general voter resistance to new taxes. I can't feel this resistance is due to anti-school feeling but to one of anti-taxes.

A stock answer to the school cost is "cut the fat" from the budget. A careful look at the budget of each school district will show that there are many areas where we can adequately equipped vehicle, admonished and advised, get necessary repairs, advised and admonished.

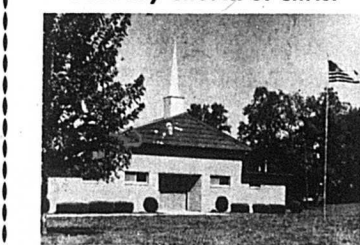

### Otterbein Student to Study In Sierra Leone Winter Term



Shirley Dillon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Dillon, 166 Daughman St., Sunbury, will study abroad during her winter term at Otterbein College students leave for ten weeks in Sierra Leone, Africa.

Shirley, who is a junior, will travel under the auspices of the United Methodist Mission which has close ties with the leaders in Sierra Leone, according to Miss Dillon. The group's aims are to "analyze the role of education in economics, political, and social change in a developing nation."

They will visit Fourah Bay College, Milton Margal Training College, Freetown Teachers College, and numerous primary and secondary schools in Freetown. Then the students will depart for Mayama and the Njala University College.

During their stay, members of the group have their choice of teaching

at any one of three secondary schools. Each student will teach on the basis of aides for four days with the remainder of the week to work on research projects. They will attend some classes at Njala University College.

Otterbein's program began last year and around 100 students, mostly juniors, are selected to be part. The students begin in the fall term preceding their trip by studying comparative surveys of educational systems and the country and culture to which they plan to go. The trip itself serves as field study with the project as the student's report on his findings.

In the spring term, after the students have returned, they continue their studies and research in comparative education. The group will leave Freetown March 13 and fly to Frankfurt, then to Zurich. They will spend time in central Switzerland and return to Amsterdam and New York March 17. Throughout the trip, the students will be escorted by Dr. Chester L. Addison, chairman of the Education Department at Otterbein.

Shirley is a member of several organizations at Otterbein and hopes to have made the Dean's List this last term. She belongs to Phi Sigma Iota, the national Romance Language honorary, Ohio Student Education Association and is secretary of Otterbein chapter, and Kappa Phi Omega sorority.

Mrs. Roy LeFlore, president, introduced the speaker, Dr. Amy, assistant professor of religion and philosophy at Otterbein College. Dr. Amy, with his family, spent a year in Asia on a fellowship. He was there to study Buddhism, principally, and they spent much time in the area of Kyoto, Japan. However, they visited such other countries as Ceylon, Thailand, India, and Nepal. Members were taken on a picture trip to the very ornate temples, shrines, pagodas, tea houses, and the very famous Taj Mahal in Agra, India. One slide showed row after row of shoes outside a temple, depicting the reverence shown for their temples and shrines.

Other slides were of the beautiful gardens for which the Japanese are so famous. Hundreds of different kinds of moss are grown in moss gardens. In others, sand and fine rock are used, the rock being kept raked into patterns that make very attractive gardens. Much water is

evident and lily pads float upon the water, adding their beauty. There was, but a very light sprinkling of bright colored flowers among the various shades of green.

And still other slides were of the rice fields, the silkworms, the canal boats laden with produce, the produce carts drawn by bullocks, and the bathing places in the streets. Dr. Amy followed the showing of these with a talk comparing the culture of the East with that of the West. Here are some thoughts from his talk: "Usually we think the two cultures are quite different, but in many ways they are very similar. Their music we can learn to like and we do appreciate their art, pottery and landscape gardening. Really, the culture of the East is as varied as that of the West. Their religions, of course, are very different. In technology, they are on a par with the West, being third only to Russia, second, and to the United States, first."

Japan is becoming westernized at a slow pace. The Japanese are influenced by the saying, "Time hastens away; why spend all of it preparing to live?"

"The Japanese consider nature sacred and join with it to create gems of beauty, using whatever is available, and do not disturb the balance of nature. We, on the other hand, conquer nature and fail to recognize its sacredness." Dr. Amy quoted from Tennyson's poem, "Flower in the Crannied Wall" and stated that the Easterner would gaze upon that flower, commune, and feel a sense of unity with the reality of the universe while a Westerner would pluck the flower and fail to feel that sense of unity. The Oriental thinks in logic while we trust

in reason. He feels one must go beyond reason for reality and use meditation to pass beyond reason to find a oneness and unity with all men. Their sense of unity is found in families, clans, nations and in their arts.

Another quote by Dr. Amy was Kipling's "Oh, East is East and West is West, and Never the Twain shall meet," but he felt that Kipling was but half right as today the "twain" are meeting. The youth of the East are trying to preserve the basic values of the Orient, while struggling to make money like the West. The West can learn from the East just as they can learn from us, and, perhaps, we can discover what we are meant to be.

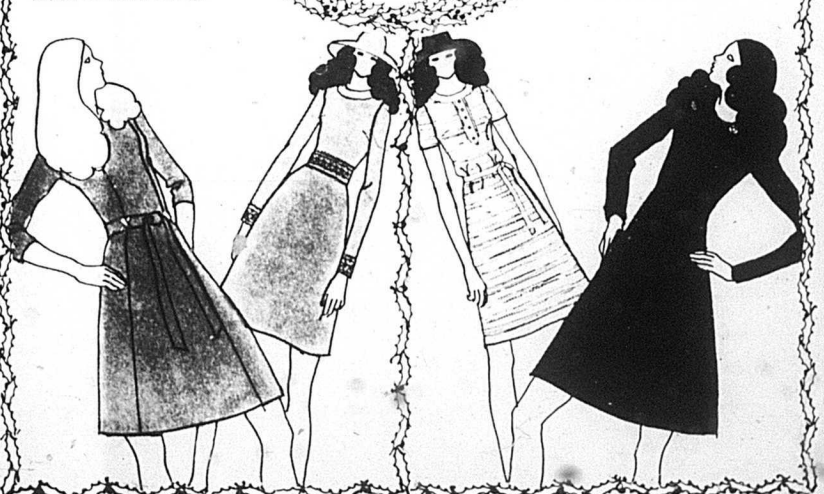

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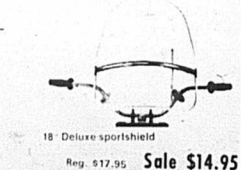

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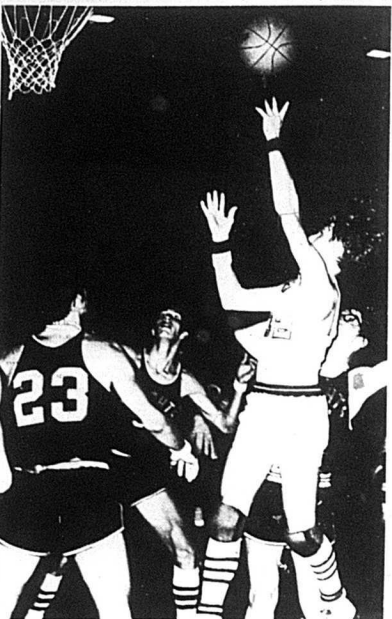


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## EAGLES 3-0 AFTER IMPRESSIVE WINS OVER NORTHMOR 69-31, OLENTANGY 81-40

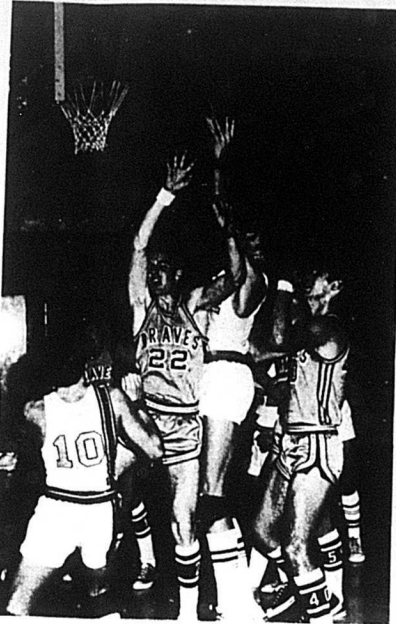
## Lawrence Leads Over Northmor

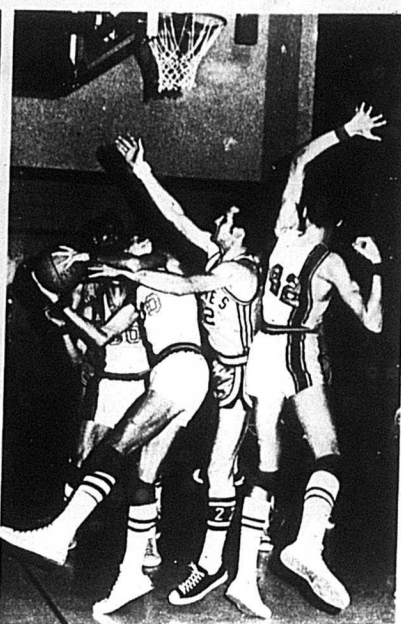

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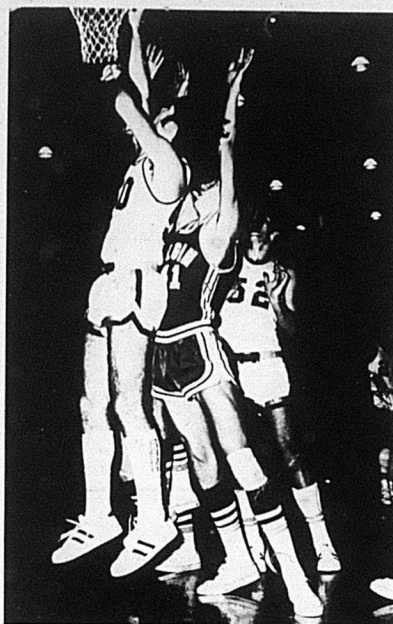

## Teachers Present BW Board With Negotiation Agreement

Seventeen members of Big Walnut Education Association, several parents, and two students awaited the audience at Big Walnut School Board's monthly meeting, Dec. 1. The meeting was moved to a room in the high school to accommodate visitors.

Teachers presented the Board with a negotiation agreement which the Board moved to consider in special session with members of the BWSEA Negotiations Committee, Dec. 17.

At several points during the almost four-hour session individual board members, Board President Clyde Cochran, and Supt. Hylen Souders affirmed that, to use Souders' words, "I think what we're doing is working together to get a job done, all of us, the Board, teachers, administration, and others in the district."

Middle school parents, Mr. and Mrs. Russell Stringer, Mrs. R. M. Kiamfoh, and Mrs. Don Brown, questioned the Big Walnut dress code. They were requesting that girls at the Middle School be allowed to wear pants suits. Supt. Souders explained that members of Student Council are currently working on revision of the existing dress code. The Board told parents that they would hope to have a report from the student group or action by their special Dec. 8 meeting.

With faculty advice a group of Middle School students also will consider the dress code revision prior to the Dec. 8 meeting and offer their suggestions.

Students, Jeff Raming and Charles Maynard, also raised a question having to do with grooming. Maynard asked if he had to get his hair cut in compliance with a request to do so from the administration. Board member Richard Wetherbee spoke to the question. He complimented Maynard on taking his question through proper channels and on his manner of presentation. He then affirmed that, "the rules of the

school should be obeyed. If you were told to cut your hair, cut it." Maynard indicated he would comply. BW policy on personal and professional leave was reaffirmed by the Board. Teachers are authorized 1 day professional and 3 days personal leave annually. The Board moved that requests beyond these stated days be presented in writing for consideration by the Superintendent and the Board.

Consideration of changes in the length of the school day was tabled until advice is obtained from the Chief of Transportation for the State of Ohio. Supt. Souders has already been in touch with that office and expects to have counsel from them shortly, he said.

In answer to a request by letter from County Supt. Smith Runyan, for a grass-roots legislative committee chairman for BW School District, Dave Meek was appointed. Mr. Meek, who was at the meeting, was a candidate for the local Board of Education in 1969.

The board approved changing the site of commencement to Cowan Hall at Otterbein College. The recommendation was made by High School Principal Estel Miller following a request by the Class of 1971.

Larger seating capacity of the college building was listed as principle reason for the change. The class will assume rental payments for the ceremony, set for May 30, 1971. Baccalaureate services will be held in the BW gym.

In personnel items, the board accepted with regret the resignation of Bill Havens as football coach. He will continue to teach at BW. They also approved Middle School Principal Thomas Hannan's attendance at an SMI seminar, Dec. 4-5, and approved the reappointment of Mrs. Jeannette Curran as a member of the board of trustees of the Community Library.

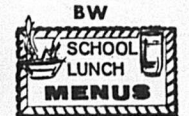
**From the Principal's Desk**

## Day Old Baby May Get Social Security Number



A social security number follows one through life—from the cradle to the grave.

This week, Marcus Horowitz, a claims representative at the Marion Social Security Office, was issued a social security number for his week-old son.

"We can give a day-old baby a social security number," said District Manager Joseph S. Wiland. "The social security number is becoming a universal number, and its uses have spread far beyond social security purposes. The distribution of numbers to young children is an interesting recent development beginning in 1964 with the use of the social security number as a tax identification number by the Internal Revenue Service. Social Security numbers are now required whenever interest or dividends are paid."

Marcus is starting a savings account for his son as he did for his 2-year-old daughter when she was born. He knows that a child may be asked for a social security number at school or in connection with clubs or organizations for identification purposes. In later years, his son will be required to use the number for military service, employment and for his driver's license.

Mr. Horowitz knows a lot about social security numbers and has issued many to people because he helps operate the new, special "claimants participating" in which claimants are asked to partially complete their own applications to speed processing. But this time, because it was his own child, the social security number was issued to him by Mary Kirk, service representative, at the local office.

## Highland Superintendent Answers Questions About 6.5 Mill Levy

Highland School District residents will be voting again next Monday on the district's 6.5 mill operating levy. The tax is an additional levy which will run for a continuing period of time. The special election is a result of the levy's defeat Nov. 3.

Edwin L. Linberger, superintendent, submits the following questions which have been asked him about the levy with his answers:

Q: Why don't we wait to see what Gilligan is going to do before we pass additional property taxes?

A: Gilligan has promised tax revision. However, we must be realistic. Even if this is accomplished in 1971, taxes can't be collected until 1972.

Q: Do you think Gilligan can keep his campaign promise of tax revision?

A: Most politicians try. Gilligan may make an effort, but he is going to have tough sledding. The legislature will still be Republican and tax revision may become a victim of party politics.

Q: What can voters do to help bring about tax revision which would help the public schools in Ohio?

A: Write a letter to the governor, to our state representative and state senator each week until something is done. Join the thousands throughout the state who will be doing the same.

Q: If tax revision is accomplished in 1971, can't the legislature vote enough money to keep Highland open?

A: They could. But do you think the legislature is that concerned about Highland schools? Our district is only one among many.

Q: Did the legislature vote special funds for schools in 1970?

A: Yes, it did. Highland got an additional \$17,000.00.

Q: Was this additional money enough to keep Highland out of the "red"?

A: No. We cannot pay all of our bills in 1970 so we must pay them in 1971.

Q: Why does the school board put an additional operating levy up for vote when the people of the district have voted it down twice?

A: The additional money is needed to operate the schools for 1971. It is better to keep trying to pass a levy than to plan to close the schools in the fall of 1971.

Q: Is it true that Highland High School does not meet state minimum standards?

A: Yes. We do not have an art teacher or counselor and the li-

brary is lacking books.

Q: What other needs do our schools have?

A: Many of our textbooks are old and falling apart. We do not have enough suitable ones. Some of our desks were used by the grandparents of our students. Building repairs.

Q: What do you mean when you say the additional operating levy will actually be only 4.5 mills?

A: Because bonds will be paid in 1970 and the millage decreases 2 mills. 6.5 minus 2 equals 4.5 mills.

Q: Do I have to own property to vote on a property tax?

A: No. All eligible voters should vote.

Q: Do I have to register to vote?

A: Not in Morrow county. If you have lived in the Highland district 40 days (unless you moved in from out of state, then one year in the state), you will vote in the special election Dec. 8.

Q: Mr. Linberger, why did you pick this district, you know it's a poor district and a tough job?

A: I came with my eyes open because I find many fine people here. I have met a few who express a "sour grapes" attitude because of the pre-migration difficulties ten years ago. But I feel the time is ripe for some real progress to be made here at Highland, therefore, I solicit your help and you can begin by voting for the levy. Then let me know by either a personal visit or by telephone what improvements we might make.

Q: Is it true that Highland schools may close next November?

A: Yes. If the levy fails, we estimate that we will have enough money to operate until some time in November. When we run out of money, the schools will have to close.
